P

istols, as both revolvers and autoloaders are referred to, are among the most universal weapons found in the hands of counterterrorist groups throughout the world. With their small size and power, today's pistols are increasingly more common, even in those elite military units in whose parent armies pistols

are relatively rare. New weapons developments, especially in autoloaders, increased dramatically in the 1970's stimulated by the requirements put out in requests for new weapons by European militaries. In the United States, the JSSAP trials for a new US military handgun caused several new designs to become available.

The general trend is for police agencies, especially in North America, to use revolvers while military agencies almost universally use autoloader designs. The revolver has the advantage of relative mechanical simplicity with its concurrent mechanical reliability; the ability to fire a second round in the case of a misfire, and the capacity to be easily produced in very powerful calibers. Along with the ability to use the most powerful of cartridges, revolvers are also able to effectively utilize the widest range of loadings available for a given caliber. The simplicity of a revolver's operation allows training in its use to be equally simplified.

On the disadvantage side, revolvers are relatively bulky and large, especially through the cylinder. The six round cylinder of the revolver is probably its weakest point with the limited ammunition capacity greatly reducing the volume of fire that can be delivered in a short time and slowing reloading.

Autoloaders, most often erroneously referred to as "automatics", have the advantages of a relatively large magazine capacity and easy reloading that results in a very high volume of fire being available. The larger ammunition capacity also allows more targets to be engaged in a shorter time without reloading. The flat design of most autoloaders also allows concealed carry to be more easily accomplished. On the disadvantage side, autoloaders are much more mechanically complex and have a greater range of jams than a revolver. Jams in an autoloader normally require both hands to clear. In a revolver most jams can be

"cleared" by just pulling the trigger and bringing a fresh round into line. Those more severe interruptions often result in the weapon being completely out of action and requiring professional attention. Modern ammunition design has greatly lessened the possibility of jams and misfires for all classes of weapons and has greatly increased reliability.

The small size of handguns allow them to be used in very close quarters, such as an aircraft cockpit, where other, longer, firearms would be a distinct disadvantage if not impossible to quickly maneuver. Other advantages include easy use with one hand while the other may be otherwise occupied. All of these reasons and more will result in the handgun being seen in the hands of counterterrorist and military forces for the foreseeable future. ●

The GB was designed as a replacement pistol for the Austrian military, a competition it lost to the Glock 17, and as such was intended for a very rugged environment where overall size was not a major consideration. The gas-delayed blowback feature of the GB was developed from a WW II German design for a simple semiautomatic rifle, the VG-1 (also referred to as the Barnitske system after its inventor). The gas-delay system of the GB uses the barrel as a stationary piston with the slide acting as a moving cylinder. Upon firing, propellant gasses enter the cylinder through bleed holes in the barrel, and while the gas pressure is high, prevent the slide from opening until the bullet has left the barrel and pressures have reached a safe level. The advantages of this type of system are its mechanical simplicity and a self-regulating feature. The system uses only the pressures generated by the firing round and automatically varies itself to match them, regardless of bullet weight or velocity. The GB

does not have a conventional safety. Instead, it has a decocking lever on the slide that lowers the hammer on a loaded chamber. With the hammer lowered, the firing pin is locked in place and will not move until the hammer is cocked either by pulling the trigger, double-action mode, or manually with the thumb, single-action mode. The Steyr GB (the GB stands for Gazbremser or Gas Brake in English), is a very strong and reliable weapon with excellent ergonomics incorporated into its design. This allows it to be accurate and comfortable to shoot. The safety system prevents there being any switch to be released before firing. Simply point the weapon and pull the trigger. The gas system of the GB allows for any type of 9x19mm ammunition to be used. It also cushions the recoil, adding to the weapon's firing comfort and increasing its accuracy in rapid fire. The sight system includes luminous dots that are simply aligned in a row to allow for aiming in low light conditions. The squared off and checkered front of the trigger guard add to the security of a two handed hold. One of the drawbacks of the GB is that it is relatively large, which makes it somewhat difficult to shoot for people with small hands and limits its concealability. Several Austrian and U.S. police agencies issue or use the Steyr GB and it has seen good sales in the U.S. and abroad.

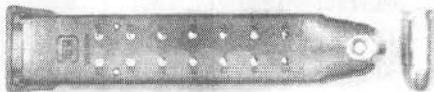

This pistol uses the familiar Browning locking system where the barrel is cammed down from the locked position by a slot in the barrel engaging a stud in the frame. The fact that the Glock is made from only 33 different components including those of the magazine makes for the least possible number of breakdowns of the action, resulting in a very reliable weapon. The weapon is fired by means of a striker that is not cocked until the trigger has been pulled 5mm (which also unlocks the automatic firing pin lock). The trigger must be pulled to activate the weapon as there is a small lever in the center of the trigger that locks it in place until the lever is pressed, preventing the Glock from accidental discharge.

The receiver of the Glock is made from a synthetic polymer plastic, stronger than steel but with only 14% of steel's weight. The Glock 17 has stirred a great deal of controversy with its plastic receiver, resulting in the mass media referring to it as a "plastic" pistol and calling for a ban on the type. In fact, the Glock has more steel in its construction than many other pistols and its ability to pass airport metal detectors is due more to human error than any transparency of the weapon. Media hysteria aside, the Glock is a very well built weapon with a notable record of reliability during testing. The trigger-actuated safety system prevents accidental discharges while allowing the Glock to be very fast to get into action since there is no safety to switch off separately.

The Browning Hi Power was the last design of John M. Browning and contained all the improvements he had developed from his earlier work. The barrel is locked into the slide of the Browning by ribs on the top of the barrel engaging slots in the slide. When the slide moves to the rear, the barrel is cammed downward by a slot in the underside of the barrel engaging a cam in the frame. This cam-slot arrangement allows the Browning to be simple and rigid in design. There is normally a magazine safety in the Browning that prevents the hammer from being released by

the sear if the magazine is not fully seated in the weapon. The double-column design of the Browning's magazine allows the weapon to have a large number of rounds available while still being manageable in size. The Browning Hi-Power is probably the most popular pistol among counter-terrorist organizations. Very prolific, 47 countries either produce or issue the Browning to their forces, this pistol has also seen widespread commercial sales in the U.S.A. and other countries. The extended 20 round magazine gives the Hi-Power excellent firepower but makes the weapon hard to conceal. The magazine safety is also considered excessive by many users but it can be easily removed. The popularity of the Hi-Power is being extended with the introduction of the Mark 2 version as well as a double-action variant.

Essentially the same weapon as the Browning Hi-Power with an enlarged thumb safety that can be used by either right or left handed users (the original was right hand only), an enlarged pair of sights that are easier to see quickly, more anatomically shaped grips, and a hard, phosphated, anti-glare finish that wears well. The Mark 2 is a utilitarian pistol that should see wide use and good sales with military and police organizations though its commercial sales may be limited by the rather ugly look of the new finish.

This is a new pistol design based on the very successful Browning Hi-Power. The most obvious change from the Hi-Power is that the BDA-9S is double action and has a trigger-operated firing pin lock that prevents firing unless the trigger is pulled. In place of a thumb safety there is a decocking lever that allows the hammer to be safely lowered on a loaded chamber without using the trigger. The front of the trigger guard is shaped for two handed shooting and the magazine release can be easily changed from right to left handed operation. The BDA-9 series uses the basic Browning style of locked breech as well as having a general resemblance and the magazine safety. This is a new release from FN and has not yet seen a great deal of use. The design is sound and has some excellent features including the interchangeability of magazines with the Browning Hi-Power. There is also a spring ejector that works on the magazine throwing them clear of the weapon when they are released. Overall the BDA-9 series lends itself very well to quick operation combined with the reliability of a proven design.

This is a variant of the BDA-9S pistol. The 9C is the compact model with a shortened slide assembly and frame. The reduced size of the grip allows

for a special shortened 7 round magazine to be used for maximum concealability. The normal 14 round magazine may also be used. The concealability of the BDA-9C is excellent but some comfort and control is sacrificed for the shortened grip. Fitting the slide assembly of the 9C to the frame of the 9S results in the medium version of the BDA family, the 9M.

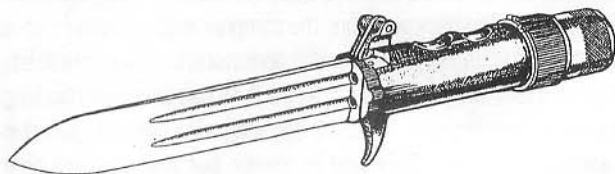

This is a very unconventional design for a handgun which comes from an unusual source, the Norinco Arsenal in the People's Republic of China. The single-edged blade has four deep grooves, two on either side, to allow passage of bullets fired from the mechanism in the weapon's grip. To fire the weapon the knurled ring (safety) at the front of the grip is rotated to the left, which can be done with the thumb of the firing hand, uncovering a red dot and unlocking the trigger. The trigger extends below the weapon and is pulled by the normal finger with the thumb of the firing hand braced against the upper pivot of the trigger. With the arm extended and rotated with the wrist up the sights on the grip may be used but the weapon is intended for very close use. The end cap of the grip contains the firing mechanism and is unscrewed for reloading. With the endcap removed a long pull on the trigger will eject the fired cartridge cases.

This pistol was developed by Czechoslovakia for the export market because they do not use the 9x19mm round in their military. The operating system is taken from several earlier weapons with the locking system being a modified Browning design and the firing mechanism being similar to the Walther designs. The result of this combination is an accurate and reliable design that has not yet been adopted by any major group.

Though officially adopted by the French Services, the P-15 has also seen wide use through its commercial sales. The unusual locking system has the barrel rotating to release the slide with the pistol then operating as a blowback weapon. The complex trigger mechanism is prone to wear when used by unfamiliar operators (the magazine safety being especially so). All of this aside, the P-15 has excellent handling qualities and shoots well. The extended magazine capacity puts it in the same class as the Browning Hi Power, but the relatively poor sights, hard trigger pull, and difficulty in cocking the slide has kept the P15 from greater commercial success.

The Manurhin is the first revolver developed and produced in France since 1892. The MR-73 models were created to answer a demand for good quality revolvers for use by the French police forces and especially the elite presidential security units. Until the advent of the Manurhin design, the demand was filled with custom produced Smith & Wessons and the MR-73 has borrowed heavily from the S&W design. An interchangeable cylinder is available for the MR-73 allowing 9x19mm ammunition to be used, but because of its relative inaccuracy in firing and some difficulties in extraction, this option is rarely used. With an excellent trigger pull and quality manufacturing, the MR-73 has gone a long way toward converting many Europeans to the use of a revolver although automatic pistols have been popular there for a long time. The GIGN are particularly pleased with the Gendarmerie Model of the MR-73 because of its adjustable sights and its availability in different barrel lengths.

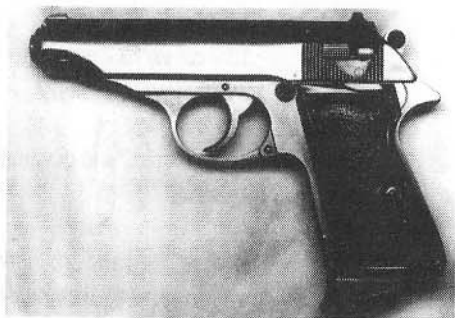

Although originally produced in 1929, the Walther PP still sees widespread use and excellent commercial sales because of its solid, practical design. With several design changes between 1929 and today, the PP has not yet been shown inferior to other, more modern, designs. A major drawback of the PP is that the largest cartridge which its straight blowback design can safely handle is the rather low powered 9x17mm round.

This is the latest development of the Walther P38 series. Though internally much the same as the P38 with several parts being interchangeable, the P5 is externally very different. One of the points of difference is the very high level of safety of the P5. The firing pin of the P5 cannot be struck by hammer until the trigger is pulled to the end of its travel where it lifts the firing pin into the hammer's path. This is the pistol branch of the Heckler and Koch weapons family. Using the roller-locked system of the HK weapons, the P9S is available in two calibers, 9x19 or 11.43x23mm. This very large 9mm pistol is a double action-only attempt to make a controllable machine pistol. This weapon has several design features unique to it alone and center around its cocking system. The front strap of the grip is pulled in by the fingers of the firing hand, cocking the striker and releasing the locked firing pin. Pulling the trigger operates the weapon normally as long as the cocking lever is held in. By releasing the lever, the firing pin is locked and decocked and the weapon cannot accidentally fire. When the last round is fired, the slide locks back and is released by squeezing the cocking lever a second time. The locking system of the P7 series is also unique to the design. This is the same weapon as the standard P7M8 but it has been modified to use the plastic bulletted training ammunition. In order to function with the low power ammunition, the P7M8PT does not have the gas locking system of the P7 family but uses a floating chamber which acts as a gas assist for operation. 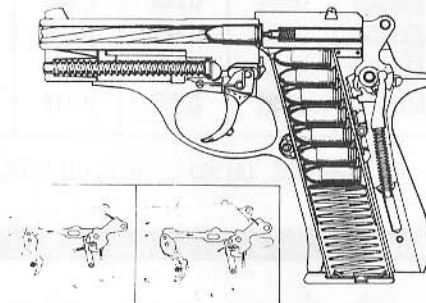

This pistol has been specifically designed for suppressed firing and is presently issued in the Soviet forces. Developed around the Makarov pistol, the P6 has an integral suppressor body built around the barrel which has been ported to insure a subsonic bullet. The slide has a manual latch that locks it shut during firing, eliminating most of the mechanical noise. The latch is pressed with the non-firing hand and

the slide is drawn back and released for reloading. The sights are raised in the rear so that the sight picture clears the body of the suppressor. The P6 is able to be operated with just the integral suppressor with some amount of sound suppression but it is not very efficient. An additional extension suppressor is issued with the weapon that attaches to the muzzle by a slip ring that fits just inside the muzzle of the integral suppressor and locks in place from a plunger underneath the barrel. The extension suppressor significantly reduces the sound signature, making the P6 an efficiently suppressed weapon. The extension suppressor is carried in a pocket in the holster and several of these weapons obtained from Afghanistan have been picked up without the extension. The entire weapon and suppressor assembly can be maintained by the operator in the field.

This is the famous ".45" which has been used by the U.S. Government for over 70 years. Though claimed by many to be inaccurate, the military M1911A1 must put all of its rounds into a 7.46 inch circle at 50 yards for it to remain in service. The heavy use received by military-issue weapons can "wear out" a pistol in a relatively short time, but the M1911A1 has proven itself an extremely reliable and accurate weapon in well trained hands. Target tuned or customized versions are often able to put all of their rounds into a circle of 2 inches or less in diameter at 50 yards. The drawback of these target model M1911A1's is that they cannot accept the same amount of dirt and abuse as the military model and will start malfunctioning much sooner than the more tolerant military weapon.

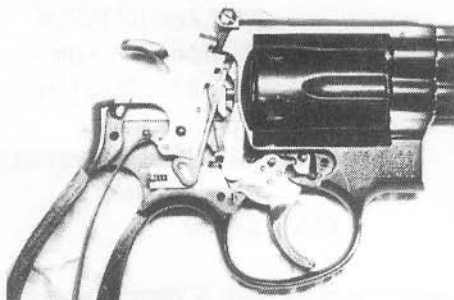

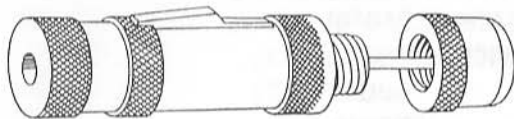

This is a very small weapon developed from an earlier OSS design and intended for close-in defense. Relatively few Stingers were made during the Vietnam War and even fewer suppressors were specially designed for the weapon. The very short barrel of the Stinger was unscrewed for loading and it took a single round. The rounded end cap would be extended until it was caught by the sear mechanism to

prepare it for firing. Pressure on the sear would fire the Stinger. The lack of sights and extremely short barrel prevent the Stinger from being usable at more than the closest ranges, 1 meter at the most. The relatively large suppressor allowed the Stinger to be used as a close-in assassination weapon.

This is a single shot non-reloadable weapon whose chief advantage is its appearance as a popular brand of filtered cigarette. To fire the "cigarette," the tobacco end would be held and the filter pulled with

either the fingers or the teeth of the firer. The round would be fired when a string between the filter and the rest of the cigarette would break, at a predetermined pressure. The fired bullet would blow out the tobacco plug at the end of the cigarette. Obviously, the accuracy would be very limited with the cartridge being specially loaded to get the maximum power from such a small weapon.

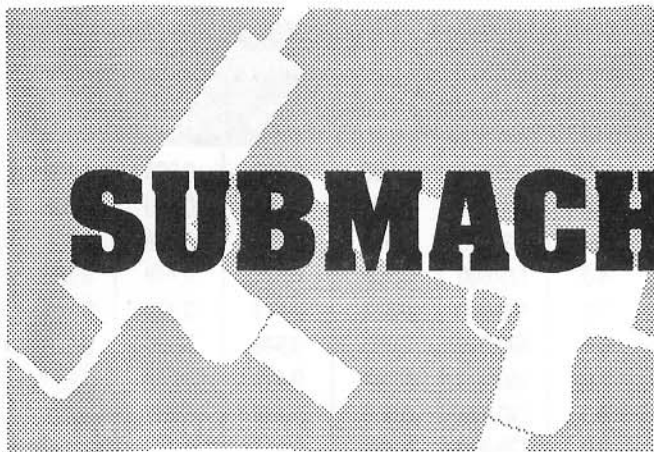

SUBMACHINEGUNS

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radually seeing a decrease in use in the world's armies, submachineguns appeared to be obsolescent and soon to disappear by the mid-1970's. The advent of modern terrorism appears to have created a new demand for the submachinegun and its compact firepower. The specific definition for a submachinegun is a hand held or shoulder

fired weapon capable of fully automatic fire and using a pistol caliber cartridge. The requirement of pistol caliber has become less distinct in recent years with the proliferation of short barreled assault rifles, but, as will be explained, there is a sufficient difference between the pistol and assault rifle rounds to be noticeable. For the purposes of the word, the definition of pistol caliber is what will define the submachinegun from the assault carbine.

Almost none of the first generation of submachineguns is still in use, though occasionally a 1928 Thompson is still found in police armories. The first generation weapons are characterized by being large, carbine-like weapons, mechanically complex and manufactured almost totally by machining. Most first generation weapons were made during the time between World Wars One and Two. Second generation submachineguns were developed just prior to World War II and during the war reached their most popular time with many millions of various designs being made. Characterized by being intended for mass production, second generation guns were made primarily

of stampings and simple metal working. The actions were simplified and reliability increased. The M3A1 submachinegun is an example of a second generation weapon and is still issued in the U.S. military.

Third generation submachineguns are by far the most prevalent form of the weapon found today. The third generation system has perfected the mass production aspect of the design with precision stampings, forgings, and plastic moldings being the primary manufacturing methods. Bolts are telescoped in third generation designs with much of the mass of the bolt surrounding the barrel ahead of the chamber. This telescoping allows the bolt to have sufficient mass and travel to operate as a blowback weapon but with a significantly reduced overall length. The UZI is the first true third generation weapon to see popular use. The Ingram is an example of a very compact third generation system. Machine pistols are also very compact as they are true pistols intended for one or two handed fire. The major drawback with the machine pistol is its very high rate of fire and recoil, resulting in an uncontrollable weapon. Few true machine pistols are presently made.

The Beretta 93R is an example, and it cuts down on the controllability problem by only being able to fire three round bursts.

Fourth generation submachineguns are so few as to make a definition of them difficult. The Spectre M4 and JATI are examples of new systems but they have not yet seen enough use to establish their designs. The MP-5 family is considered by some to be an example of a fourth generation system with the weapon firing from closed bolt for accuracy and obtainable with a controlled burst option. With their use of pistol ammunition, submachineguns give an excellent compromise between size and firepower. Rifle caliber rounds would have too much chance of overpenetration in many situations to be usable. The compact size of submachineguns also makes them maneuverable in crowded conditions such as in a vehicle, aircraft, or building hallway. The submachinegun is particularly adapted to close-in, rapid confrontations with multiple targets where only light cover is available. Used in short two and three round bursts, the submachinegun is able to quickly neutralize a target with precise bullet placement. ●

This is a conversion of the AUG system. The conversion can be obtained in either a kit form or as a complete weapon. The kit consists of a barrel, bolt group, magazine adaptor, and magazine. The magazine used in the system is the same one used in the Steyr MPi 69. Firing from a closed bolt gives the AUG 9mm excellent accuracy on the first shot while the bullpup design allows for a relatively long barrel in a compact package. The use of the 9mm conversion now allows the AUG to be employed in situations where the penetration of the 5.56 x45mm round would be excessive.

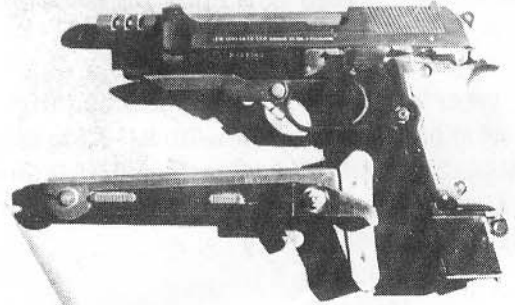

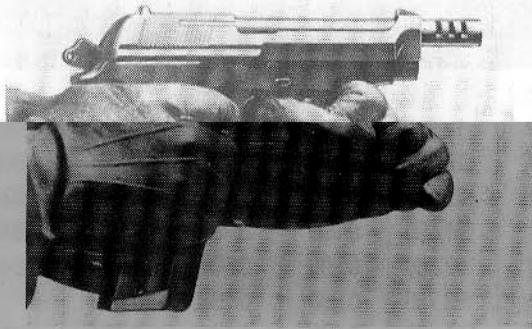

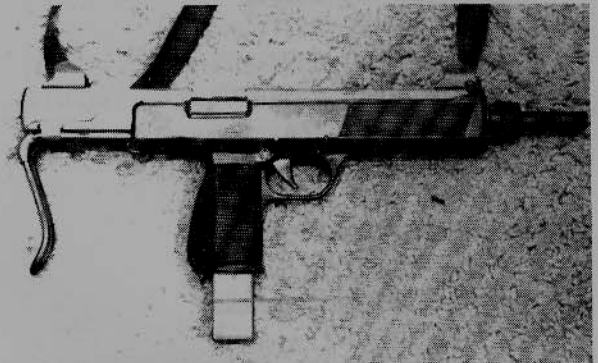

The MPi 69 is a very easy to handle, strong, and simply designed submachinegun. Having the same general lines as an UZI, the MPi is even simpler to operate. The trigger is of the progressive type with a half-pull to the rear giving semiautomatic fire and pulling the trigger all of the way back giving full automatic fire. Although it sounds complex, this manner of selecting the type of fire is quickly mastered and is the fastest for switching from one type to the other. The safety is a standard push through type located in front of the trigger guard with an additional series of safeties preventing accidental bolt movement in the event that the weapon is dropped or jarred. By pushing the safety to the halfway position, the trigger is locked into allowing only semiautomatic fire. The cocking method of the MPi 69 is unusual in that the weapon has no recognizable cocking knob. Instead of the regular knob, the front sling swivel is attached to the bolt. It is first drawn out from the gun to unlock it and then drawn to the rear to cock the gun.

In the MPi 81, the sling-cocking feature has been replaced with a conventional cocking knob and there is also an increase in the cyclic rate of fire. Other than these differences, the MPi 69 and 81 operate in the same manner.

This very unusual weapon is a new design from Finland and has some very unique features. The outline and alignment of the pistol grip and barrel are the external indications of the JATI's patented inclined bolt. Instead of sliding straight back, the bolt of the JATI slides up an incline away from the barrel, forcing the weapon down and retarding the bolt's travel. An advantage of this is the ability to place the rear grip higher, in line with the barrel and the weapon's recoil. With the higher grip, the recoil does not force the weapon to pivot upwards in the firer's hand. The JATI also has a progressive trigger, allowing fast and simple access to semi or full automatic fire. The forward folding foregrip does double duty. With the handle folded underneath the weapon, it streamlines the JATI's outline as well as locking the bolt in place, preventing its movement. Unfolding the foregrip unlocks the bolt, allowing the weapon to fire. It can also be drawn to the rear, cocking the weapon. The bolt of the JATI is of the usual telescoping type but has a single cutout in its right side as well as the words FIRE and SAFE inscribed in its right side to the front and rear respectively. With the weapon cocked, the word FIRE can be read through the ejection port. With the bolt in the forward position, the word SAFE is showing. Only while the bolt is moving is the ejection port open to eject casings; this helps seal the weapon from dirt. All these design innovations make the JATI one of the most controllable submachineguns to fire. This controllability is demonstrated in the JATI's lack of a buttstock while it still retains a high accuracy in full automatic fire.

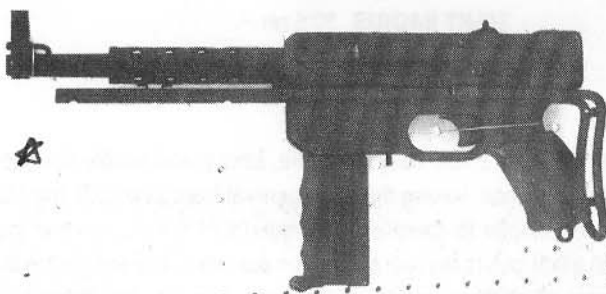

This is the most successful of the post-World War II French designs. The square cross section receiver has a spring loaded cover over the ejection port that flies open when the bolt moves. An unusual feature of the MAT 49 is the folding magazine housing. With or without a magazine in place, the magazine housing will fold forward underneath the barrel and can be locked in place. With the bolt forward, the magazine folded and the ejection cover closed, the MAT 49 is effectively sealed from dirt entering the action. There is a grip safety built into the rear pistol grip that locks the bolt either in the open or closed position. The sliding stock and folding magazine allow the MAT 49 to be closed into a compact package. The design and construction of the MAT 49 make it a very rugged and reliable weapon that is often seen in the hands of the French police.

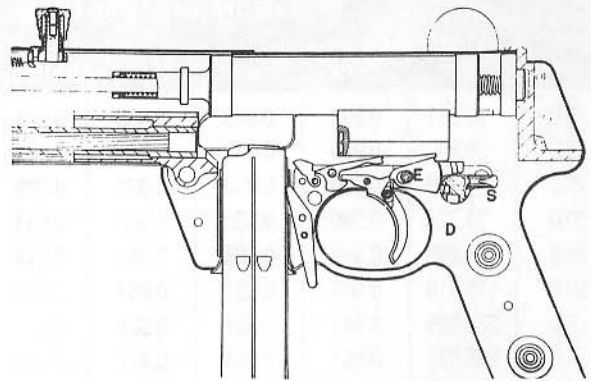

This is one of the first commercially successful submachineguns to use the "L" shaped telescoping bolt. The bolt extends over the barrel, the long arm of the "L" thereby reducing the overall length of the weapon's receiver and moving the center of gravity over the magazine. With the center of gravity over the magazine, the balance of the weapon does not change as the magazine empties. This weapon is often seen in the hands of the German police, especially at airports. The MP-K and L are virtually identical with the L model having a longer barrel and forward receiver than the K (for Kurz - short) model.

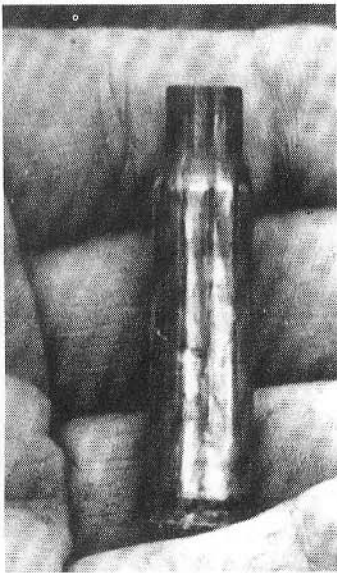
THE HECKLER & KOCH MP5 WEAPONS SYSTEM

Of all the weapons to be found in the hands of counterterrorist forces throughout the world, by far the most common is the Heckler and Koch MP5 submachinegun and its variants. Due to such widespread use and popularity, the MP5 system and its operational concepts will be gone into in some detail here.

In the closing months of World War 2 the German military was developing a new assault rifle, the Stg 45, with the Mauser developed Gerat 06H being the most likely contender. After the war and the fall of Nazi Germany the designers of the Gerat 06 went to the CETME arms works in Spain where the design was perfected. The Stg 45(m) utilized much the same roller locking system of the battle proved MG-42 light machinegun but was chambered for the 7.92x33mm Kurz assault rifle cartridge. The first weapon produced by CETME was chambered for a special 7.9x40mm cartridge firing an exotic bullet but the cartridge was never widely accepted and soon died out. The basic CETME design was modified and perfected for use with the new NATO 7.62x51mm round and was submitted for trials with the new German army. The rechambering and redesign of the CETME was accomplished in Germany by the new Heckler and Koch company as their first major weapons development. The new rifle passed all tests and was adopted by the German military as the G3.

The roller-locking system is in effect a form of delayed blowback that carries with it some substantial problems. The lack of a rotating bolt limits primary extraction and fired cases sticking in the chamber pose a real difficulty. The sticking case problem is solved in the H&K system by the chamber being cut with a series of longitudinal flutes along two-thirds of its length. The flutes allow the hot propellant gases to flow along the body of the cartridge along the area of most expansion "floating" the casing on a layer of gas and easing extraction. The fluted chamber/gas flotation system eliminates much of the sticking case problem but still allows the roller locking system to have a very violent case ejection and the cases, often dented,

have a series of distinguishing marks on them indicating the weapon they were fired from.

The complete roller locking system works via two rollers in the bolt that are driven into locking recesses in the barrel extension by the forward movement of the wedge shaped firing pin. The rearward pressure of the cartridge being fired bears against the bolt and drives the rollers against the rear of the recesses in the barrel extension. The rear surfaces of the barrel extension recesses allow the rollers to force themselves inward against the firing pin, driving the pin backwards but at a great mechanical disadvantage to the force of the rollers. This disadvantage the rollers work against slows the opening of the breech until the bullet has left the barrel and pressures have dropped to safe levels.

The roller locking, delayed blowback system has been applied by Heckler and Koch to a large family of weapons including light machineguns, rifles, submachineguns, and pistols. With the roller locking system eliminating the need for the heavy bolt found in most of its contemporaries, the MP5 is lighter than many weapons of its class as well as being able to fire from the closed bolt position. This firing from the closed bolt gives the MP5 excellent accuracy for its first round and this accuracy is what makes the weapon so popular among the world's HRUs. Though not adopted in quantity by any major military force, the MP5 series is also very popular among the various military elite units of the free world including the U. S. Seals and Special Forces.

To meet this high demand, the MP5 weapon is offered in over a dozen variations all using the same basic action and operating system. This commonality of operation allows quick familiarity with different members of the weapons family by anyone trained in one weapon's operation. At the time of this writing, the following models of the MP5 are, or have been offered by, Heckler & Koch.

HK-54: This was the original designation for the first submachinegun made by H&K and was later modified to the MP5 configuration.

MP5A1: This model has a receiver cap and no buttstock giving it the shortest overall length of the standard MP5s.

MP5A2: The standard MP5 with a fixed buttstock.

MP5A3: The standard model fitted with a retractable sliding metal buttstock.

MP5A4 : The newer model MP5 with a fixed buttstock and a group allows semiautomatic fire, 3-round controlled bursts, or full automatic fire to be selected.

MP5A5: The newer model MP5 with a retractable sliding metal buttstock and controlled burst trigger group.

MP5SD1: The suppressed version of the MP5 with an integral suppressor and receiver cap.

MP5SD2: The suppressed version with a fixed buttstock.

MP5SD3: The suppressed version with a retractable metal stock.

MP5SD4: The suppressed version with a receiver cap and controlled burst trigger group.

MP5SD5: The suppressed version with a controlled burst trigger group and fixed buttstock.

MP5SD6 : Suppressed version with a controlled burst trigger group and retractable buttstock.

MP5K: The shortest MP5 with no buttstock and a vertical front grip as well as adjustable sights.

MP5KA1: Shortened MP5 with nonadjustable, lowered sights for maximum concealability.

MP5KA4: Shortened MP5 with adjustable sights and controlled burst trigger group.

MP5KA5: Shortened MP5 with the small nonadjustable sights and controlled burst trigger group.

MP5A4 PT: Standard fixed stock MP5 with the controlled burst trigger group but designed to fire plastic bullet training ammunition only.

MP5A5 PT: The training MP5 for plastic bullets with the controlled burst trigger group and retracting metal stock.

In addition to the weapons listed, Heckler and Koch make a very comprehensive line of accessories for the MP5 weapon to which they are continually adding. At present the list includes the following:

Magazine clips for holding two magazines together parallel to each other

Blank firing adaptors

Tear gas canister launchers

Rifle grenade launchers

Removable aiming point projectors

Removable telescopic sights

Two types of briefcases that can carry an MP5K and fire it while concealed

Removable starlight scopes

A subcaliber device firing .22 long rifle ammunition that can be fitted to any standard MP5 and allow it to fire .22s instead of 9x19mm ammunition

An infrared sighting scope

A replacement front grip with a built in flashlight for aiming or illumination

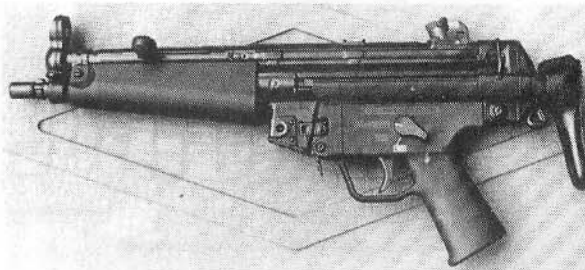
A miniature laser sight for use with night vision goggles that is built into the weapon.

The result of this wide range of weapons and accessories is to make the MP5 weapons system one of the most versatile available. During the early 1970s it was found that curving the magazines slightly allows the MP5 to have more positive feeding. New curved magazines became available around 1978 and are now the only ones used. These magazines are completely interchangeable with the earlier straight type and all MP5 weapons can use both magazines. ●

These are the standard weapons from which all of the other variants are derived. The earlier version, the HK 54, has been improved to what is now the MP5. The MP5A1 version with the receiver cap and no stock is no longer listed in the company's literature but can still be made available. The retractable stock model, the MP5A3, is probably the most common version of the MP5. With the stocks and trigger housings being interchangeable, the model number of a specific MP5 can easily change. The A4 and A5 models utilize the newest trigger housing that is capable of semiautomatic, full automatic, or three round controlled burst firing. Rather than the normal letter or number symbols to indicate the type of fire selected, the new trigger housings use a more universal symbol system. When the selector is pointing at the white symbol of a bullet that is crossed out, the weapon is on safe. The red single bullet in a box is the symbol for semiautomatic fire. Three red bullets in a box indicates three round controlled bursts and seven bullets in an open ended box indicates full automatic fire. The symbols can be seen from either side of the weapon and the new trigger housing can be retrofitted to earlier weapons.

This variant of the MP5 system is designed expressly to fire plastic bulleted training ammunition. The plastic training bullet quickly loses energy and as a result, has a very limited danger area. The roller locking system has been removed and the weapon works on straight blowback. Because the pressure is low on the plastic rounds, there is a floating chamber system in the PT weapons that increase the velocity of the bolt, insuring positive functioning. The blowback and floating chamber system prevent the PT from using standard ammunition. If ball ammo is fired in the PT, the bolt will fly violently to the rear, severely damaging the weapon but not injuring the firer. The A4 PT has a fixed stock and the A5 has a sliding metal stock. The plastic bullets give the PT weapons an effective lethal range of eight meters with a maximum range of 125 meters. Although the plastic bullets can be lethal within eight meters, they will not penetrate the aluminum wall of an aircraft.

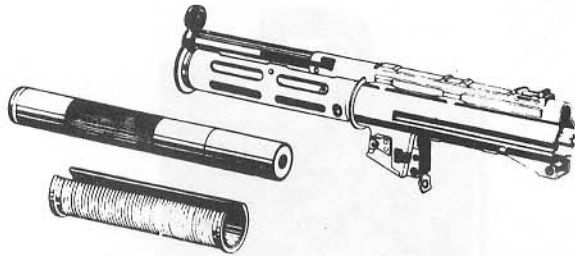

This variant of the MP5 has an integral noise suppression system built into the weapon. The SD in the weapon's name stands for Scholldamper, German for silencer. The barrel in the SD has been drilled with a series of thirty 3mm holes so that some propellant gases are bled away before the bullet has left the barrel, slowing the projectile below the speed of sound. The slowing of the bullet eliminates the supersonic crack that would otherwise be heard and allows the SD to operate effectively with normal NATO ammunition. The drawback to slowing standard ammunition to below normal

velocity is the lowering of the penetration and wounding potential of the round but this is considered of secondary importance to the SD being able to use NATO ammo and still have the maximum sound suppression. The increased weight of the MP5SD in the forward section has been found to increase the stability of the weapon, especially when fired on full automatic. The sound suppression and accuracy of the MP5SD is so good that it is often used, with a telescopic sight, as a close in (under 100 meters) sniper system. The suppressor is built onto the MP5 with the main tube being removable for cleaning of the barrel and ports. The suppressor itself is not designed to be broken down for cleaning and is considered to have a service life of 10,000 rounds or more.

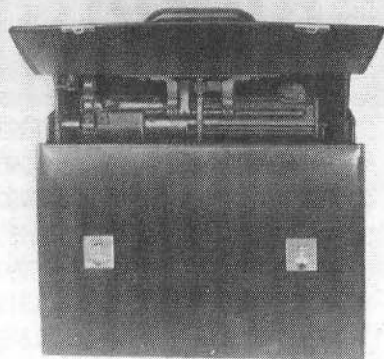

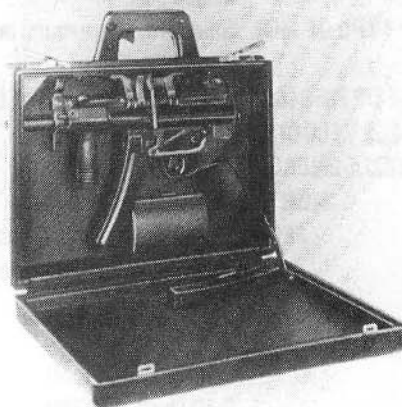

This is the shortest version of the MP5 and was designed for concealed carry. The basic receiver was somewhat shortened with the barrel and front portion being severely shortened. The modification to the receiver prevents any of the buttstocks from being mounted on the MP5K and the weapon is issued with a modified receiver cap. The MP5K and KA4 have the same adjustable iron sights as are found on the other weapons in the MP5 series with a large ringed front sight and an adjustable aperture rear sight. To increase the concealability when carried under clothes, the MP5KA1 and KA5 have only a small front sight with a rectangular rear notch much like a normal pistol sight to eliminate any snagging on clothes when the weapon is drawn. Since the front of the weapon is so short, a special front grip is made with a guard to prevent the firer's hand from slipping into the muzzle blast. The K and KA1 models are fitted with the older trigger housing with the KA4 and KA5 models having the trigger housing with the three round burst option.

Two of the most unusual accessories for a weapon are specifically made for the MPK series by Heckler and Koch. The accessories, a hard sided brief case and a soft sided attache case, are designed to hold an MP5K or KA, a spare magazine, and cleaning kit and allow the weapon to be fired while inside the case. The hard brief case has a trigger mechanism and safety built into the handle with the weapon firing through a small port in the end of the case. While the handle safety prevents the weapon from being accidentally fired, the trigger mechanism has to be set to the type of fire desired while the case is open. The soft sided leather bag has a vertical slit in the end that allows the weapon inside to be held and fired while inside the case. The normal safety selector and trigger are used in the leather case. The upper section of the soft bag is removable by releasing four snap connectors and the weapon comes with it when the top is released. Both cases hold the weapons in place with a quick release clamp and can retain a loaded (thirty rounds) weapon, spare thirty round magazine, and cleaning kit securely.

The MP 2000 was developed, in part according to specifications put out by the U.S. Navy SEAL Team Six, and various other counterterrorist and police forces. A primary intent in the design of the MP 2000 was to combine the best aspects of the MP5 weapons family in a single flexible package. The retractable stock lies flush with the receiver when folded, eliminating any projections. The general layout and size of the MP 2000 allows it to be carried concealed in much the same manner as the MP5 K series. The vertical forward grip also allows for quick point-and-shoot techniques to be effectively used with the stock collapsed. The barrel is completely enclosed by the square front portion of the receiver with cutouts along the sides to allow for cooling air circulation. The most unusual points of the MP-2000 center around the removable suppressor. A long extension on the rear of the suppressor threads onto the barrel and gives a very rigid mount which when tightened, enhances accuracy. There is a gas valve lever just in front of the magazine well that accounts for either normal or subsonic ammunition to be used. When being used without the suppressor in normal firing or when using subsonic ammunition with the suppressor, the gas lever is set to the high pressure (H) position. With the lever set to the low pressure (L) position, ports are opened in the barrel just in front of the chamber leading into an expansion chamber below the barrel. Propellant gasses are bled off into the expansion

chamber, lowering the muzzle velocity of normal NATO ammunition to below the speed of sound, eliminating the supersonic "crack" of the fired bullet. To further limit the sound of firing, the cocking handle can rotate 90 degrees, locking the bolt closed but still allowing the weapon to be fired. With the bolt locked, most of the mechanical sound of firing is eliminated and the MP 2000 is turned into a suppressed manual repeater. To account for different ballistics at supersonic and subsonic ammunition fired in the same weapon, the sights can be switched by the operator to easily match either ammunition. Luminous inserts are also available to increase accuracy in low light situations. The MP 2000 fires from the closed bolt position, retaining the accuracy of the MP 5 series but the new weapon has eliminated the roller-delayed locking system in favor of the mechanically simpler system of recoil operation. To increase the reliability and service life of the MP 2000, all components are completely interchangeable between weapons and the system is made of corrosion resistant materials. The magazines are polycarbonate plastic for light weight and strength. They are not interchangeable with MP5 magazines. There is a bolt hold open device that locks the bolt to the rear when the last round is fired. The bolt and magazine release buttons are located just ahead and above the trigger on either side of the weapon, allowing for comfortable use by either right or left-handed firers. A standard sight mounting bracket is integral with the receiver of the MP 2000 and allows the weapon to accept any sight system with a NATO standard base. A forward bolt assist is found on the right side of the receiver to aid in closing the bolt in dirty conditions.

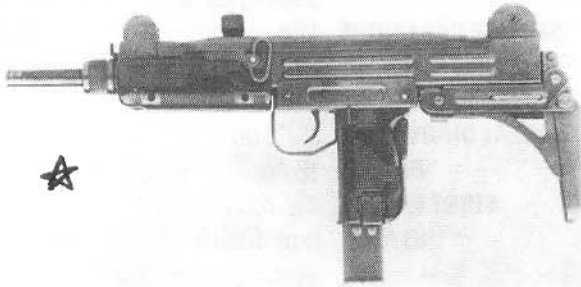

Next to the MP5, the UZI is the most widely seen submachinegun in the hands of HRUs and special police forces. Considered the first of the third generation submachineguns, the UZI is easily recognized by the public to the point where the name UZI is something of a "buzz" word and is applied to almost any weapon by some members of the media. Developed in Israel during the early 1950's, the UZI is manufactured in several countries and is the primary submachinegun of several of the world's militaries. The telescoping bolt of the UZI surrounds the barrel, putting much of the weapon's weight forward as well as allowing a shorter receiver length. Seen most commonly with a folding metal buttstock, the UZI originally had an easily removable wooden buttstock and this is still available today. The overall ruggedness and relative simplicity of the UZI has given it a reputation as a very reliable weapon, capable of operating under the severest conditions. Safety is also paramount in the design of the UZI and the weapon has three safeties. The fire selector on the left of the weapon is a locking safety that can be operated with thumb pressure. There is a grip safety that locks the sear, preventing the bolt from moving unless the handle is properly held. Lastly, there is a ratchet safety in the cocking knob that prevents the bolt from going forward if the knob should slip from the operator's hand while the weapon is being cocked.

Two conversion kits have been developed for the UZI that allows the weapon to fire either .45 ACP (11.43x23mm) or .22 long rifle (5.7x17mmR) ammunition. The .45 ACP adaption is considered for field use though it is somewhat restricted by its limited magazine capacity. The .22 LR version was primarily developed for training purposes. There is a carbine version of the UZI with a long barrel that fires semiautomatically from a closed bolt. Many of the carbines are seen by the public in films where they have been extensively modified to fire on full automatic from a closed bolt and with their barrels cut back.

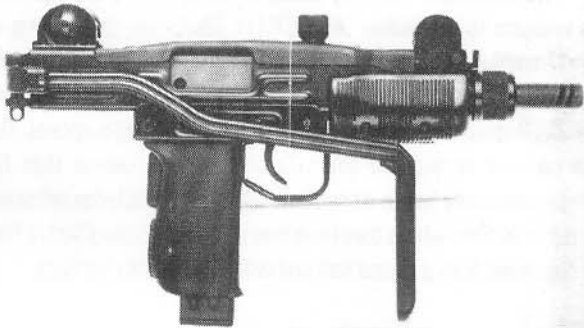

This is a shortened, lighter version of the standard UZI submachinegun with all of the basic operating principles remaining the same. The shorter length of travel and lighter breechblock result in the Mini UZI having a cyclic rate of fire which is 50% higher than the full sized weapon. The stock on the Mini UZI is vastly different from the full sized model. The stock is a single strut covered with a padding material and folding to the right side of the weapon. When the stock is folded, the buttplate, which protrudes down slightly further than the pistol grip, can be held with the non-firing hand, resulting in a very secure grip. The stock can be unfolded quickly in a much simpler manner than the more complex folding metal stock of the full sized UZI. There are several subvariants of the Mini UZI besides the standard model. There is also a heavy bolt available with tungsten inserts that reduces the cyclic rate of fire of the standard Mini UZI to 750 rounds per minute.

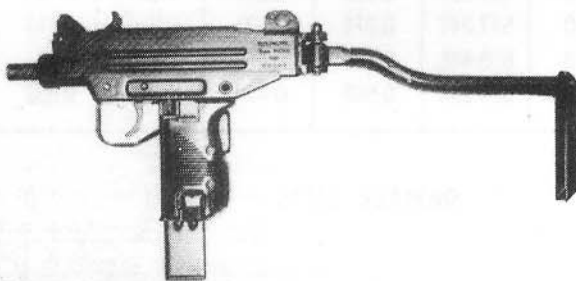

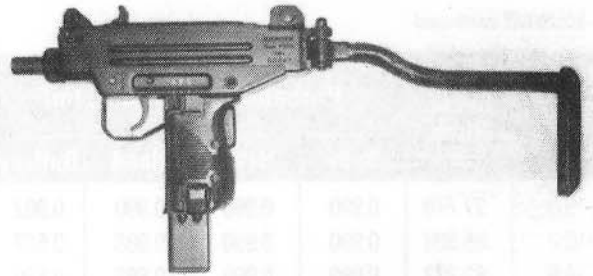

This S model of the PM-12 series is the latest and most popular of the post World War Two Italian designs. The telescoping bolt gives the PM-12S a reasonably short overall length and this, combined with the two vertical grips, make the weapon very fast handling. An unusual grip safety is found on this Beretta with the safety being in the form of a trigger-like projection on the front of the rear grip, below the trigger guard. The location of the safety allows the weapon to be firmly held and the safety unlocked only when the operator pulls in the lock with the middle finger of his firing hand. The tubular receiver has longitudinal recesses built into it to allow the bolt to operate in very dirty conditions as well as to add to the overall strength of the weapon. The 32 round magazine is now standard in the Beretta PM-12S but earlier 20 or 40 round magazines may still be used.

The Spectre is a very new design with several unique features. The most innovative feature of the Spectre is its system of double action firing from a closed bolt. The bolt of the weapon is drawn to the rear by the cocking knob and returns to battery to chamber a round. When the bolt closes a striker block is held to the rear and can be released to fire the weapon by simply pulling the trigger. If the weapon is to be held in the loaded condition, the smaller lever above the rear grip is used to decock the weapon, lowering the striker safely without firing the round in the chamber. With the striker lowered, the weapon is completely safe to handle and will not fire until the trigger is pulled to cock and release the striker. This double action feature eliminates the need for a separate safety and there is no manual safety on the weapon. The double action feature and lack of a separate safety combine to make the Spectre one of the fastest weapons of its class to get into action as only the trigger has to be pulled to fire the weapon from the safe condition. A four column magazine system, referred to as a 4-file system by the parent company, is used in the Spectre to greatly increase magazine capacity without increasing size by a large amount. The compact magazines are only 3.5cm thick with the 30 round magazine being 16cm long and the 50 round 21cm long, an average double column 32 round standard magazine is 2.5cm thick and 28cm in length. To help eliminate the cook-off problems raised by the closed bolt system and large magazine capacity, a forced-air cooling system has been developed. In the Spectre system, air is forced through and around the barrel by the movement of the bolt to help cool the weapon with the system working well enough to give the Spectre a practical rate of fire equal to or greater than comparative open bolt weapons. Sinusoidal rifling is used in the Spectre's barrel

to also help in cooling and increase the useful life of the barrel. In sinusoidal rifling, the lands of the barrel have rounded and not sharp edges so that the bullet may pass through more easily and cut down on heating of the barrel through friction. The selector and decocking lever are duplicated on both sides of the weapon with the cocking knob being on the top and sides of the receiver and the magazine release being at the front of the trigger guard. The location of the controls make the Spectre completely ambidextrous with the ejection of spent cartridges being to the right side. Designed for quick use in close-in reaction situations, the Spectre M4 is considered by some to be the first example of a fourth generation submachinegun.

This Z-62 is a Spanish made weapon that has seen good commercial sales as well as use by the Spanish military. There are several unusual features in the Z-62 with the most obvious being the long trigger with the double inset curve. The lower notch of the trigger is pulled for semiautomatic fire while pulling by the upper notch results in full automatic fire. There is also an unusual bolt locking safety that engages when the bolt is closed, on an empty chamber. When the cocking handle is pulled, the safety automatically unlocks. An updated and improved Z-62 has been put on the market as the Z-70/B replaced by a standard type trigger and thumb actuated selector lever. The automatic bolt lock of the Z-62 is replaced in the Z-70/B by a bolt blocking sear that prevents the bolt from being closed without the trigger being pulled.

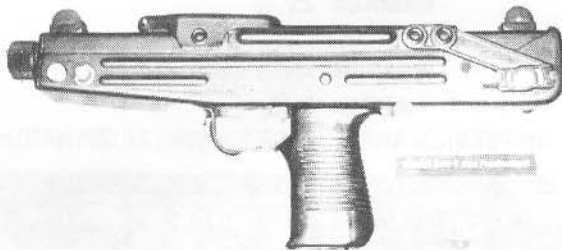

This is the newest submachinegun design to come out of Spain. Following modern tactical requirements, the Z-84 is a balanced, light weight, and simple weapon, rugged enough to work under hard usage. The pistol grip/magazine well follows the "hand-finds-hand" principal coming into common usage. There is a manual sliding safety/selector above the trigger on the left side of the weapon. In addition to the manual safety there is an automatic bolt lock that will lock the bolt in the forward position until opened by the cocking handle. Should the cocking handle slip from the firer's grasp, there are additional notches in the bolt that prevent its forward movement unless it is fully cocked. 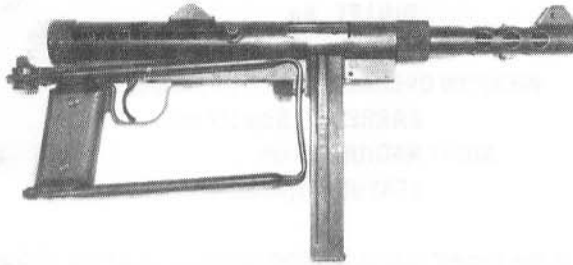

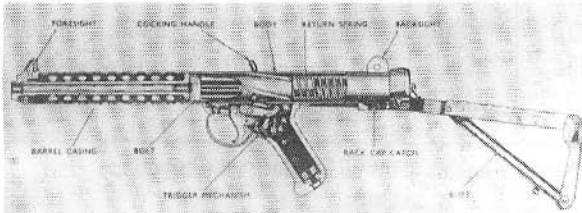

The Sterling, as it is more popularly known, is the British post war replacement for the STEN series of weapons. Extremely robust and easy to operate, the Sterling has achieved good commercial success with over 2 million being produced and some 90 countries having purchased it. Light and handy with its folding buttstock, the Sterling continues the left side horizontal magazine mounting established in the Sten. Though unusual to most who are not familiar with it, the side mounted magazine allows a very low profile to be shown when firing from the prone position. The magazines were designed to be very reliable with several short models available for use in areas of limited space, such as a truck cab. Cleaning surfaces on the bolt help scrape the receiver while being fired, and the Sterling has a wide reputation for reliability. There is a semiautomatic only version of the Sterling made which is called the Sterling Police Carbine. It is identical to the normal weapon but fires from a closed bolt. A long barreled version of the carbine is marketed for the U.S. Civilian market. The Police Carbine was widely sold in Kenya to farmers during the Mau Mau uprising.

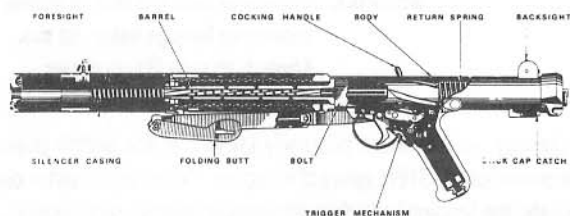

This weapon is a silenced version of the L2A3 Sterling. Available commercially as the Mark 5 Sterling, the L34A1 is the standard suppressed weapon found in the British forces. The wide commercial sales also sees the L34A1 in a great range of hands. The Mark 5 is popular among Argentinean commandos where it faced the L34A1 in the hands of the SAS during the Falklands conflict. The standard stated by the British military was for a weapon whose "mechanical noise is to be unheard at

30 meters and not to be recognized as a firearm at 50 meters". The L34A1 achieves these requirements well and fires the NATO standard ball round while achieving them. The long sleeve of the barrel contains the silencer and it is an integral part of the design. The barrel is perforated with 72 holes along a good deal of its length to lower the standard NATO ball projectile to below the speed of sound. The overall soundness of the design shows, as the L34A1 is considered the most quiet production open bolt weapon on today's market.

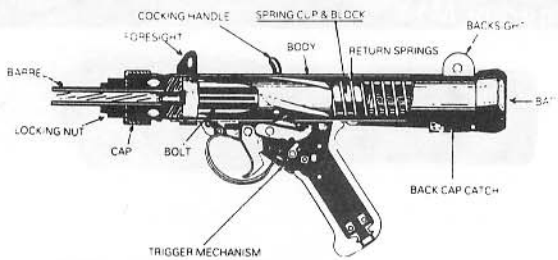

Probably one of the most publicly recognizable submachineguns, the Ingram is seen far more often in popular movies and in criminal hands than in official use. Developed as a possible replacement sidearm for the U.S. military, the Ingram is a very compact weapon, while still firing a powerful round. The M10 was made in either 9 x 19mm, using the Walther MPL magazine, or in 11.43 x 23mm, using a slightly modified M3A1 magazine. Both weapons were dimensionally and functionally identical. The sliding buttstock is too short for really comfortable use by most firers and the front strap, hanging under the barrel, is a useful but not very satisfactory front handgrip. The very high cyclic rate of fire makes the Ingram a difficult weapon to master, but it can be fired in controlled bursts, contrary to some beliefs. A muzzle suppressor was designed for use with the Ingram and this makes the weapon much more manageable to use. The Ingram is most successful when used as a close-in weapon where its high rate of fire can quickly put a number of rounds on target.

This is the most recent version of the Ingram submachinegun series. The M11/9mm, also known as the M11 long, has the same cross section as the M11 in 9x17mm but has a much longer receiver, redesigned shoulder stock, and other slight design changes that make the weapon much better to use. The magazine has been changed from a sheet metal fabrication to a cast Zytel plastic model that saves a good deal of weight. Dimensional changes in the magazine prevent the M11/9mm from using magazines from the earlier Ingrams. The Model 76 was developed by Smith and Wesson as a commercial venture during the late 1960's. Intended for use by both the military and law enforcement agencies, the weapon was not a great commercial success. The U. S. Navy SEALs, who were impressed by the performance and availability of the Model 76, purchased a number of them which they continue to use to the present day.

Closely resembling the Swedish Carl Gustav (M45b) submachinegun in both layout and operation, the Model 76 is a simple and reliable weapon that is relatively light in weight. The placement of the safety/selector switch is poor, requiring one of the hands to release its grip on the weapon to operate the switch. The perforated guard around the barrel is removable and the weapon can be properly operated without it.

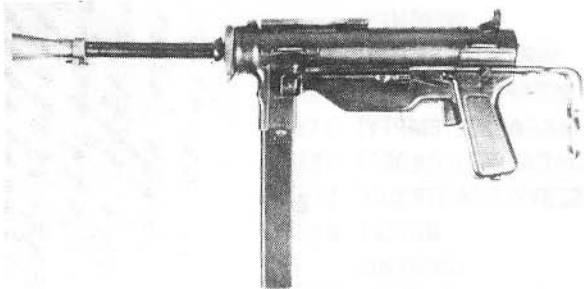

The U.S. military has had very few officially adopted submachineguns with the M3A1 being the last one of these. Developed from the earlier M3, the M3A1 was first used in 1944 and still continues in use as a secondary weapon for armored vehicle crewmen. Though over 40 years old, the M3A1 is still capable of good service and, due to its using the .45 ACP round, has excellent stopping power. Much of the longevity of the M3 design is attributable to the extreme simplicity of the weapon. This simplicity is demonstrated by examination of the weapon, especially the cocking and safety arrangements. Where in other weapons there is some form of external cocking handle, in the

M3A1 there is simply a hole in the bolt so that a finger can pull it back to full cock. The safety is a protrusion in the ejection port cover. When the cover is closed, the bolt is locked in either the forward or cocked position. The sliding metal stock was intentionally made so that the length from the butt to the trigger was the same as that of the issue rifle. In 1944, the OSS had 1,000 silencers made for the M3 which consisted of a replacement barrel assembly with the silencer built as a part of it. The silencer assembly will easily replace the barrel of the M3A1 and can be used on either weapon. The silencer adds 16.2cm in length, and 0.626kg to the weight of an M3A1. The muzzle velocity with the silenced barrel is reduced to 234 m/s (768 fps).

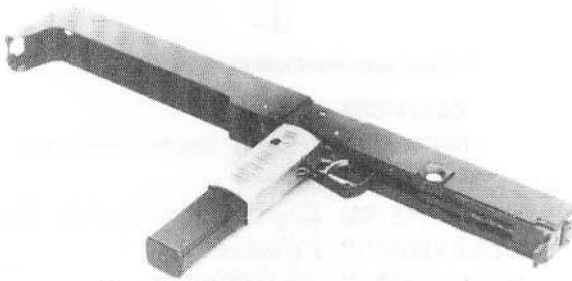

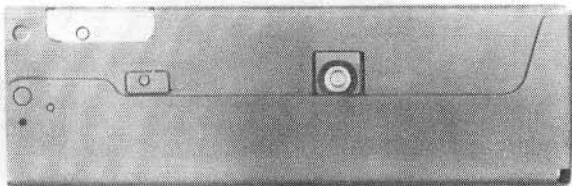

The unusual outline of this weapon results from its using the long handguards of the M16A2 to cover the built in suppressor. The front sight rising from the handguard is anchored to the barrel which ends at that point with the continuation of the guard covering the remainder of the suppressor. The barrel has ports cut into it that allow the weapon to use standard 9mm ball ammunition while reducing the muzzle velocity to subsonic, enhancing the noise suppression. 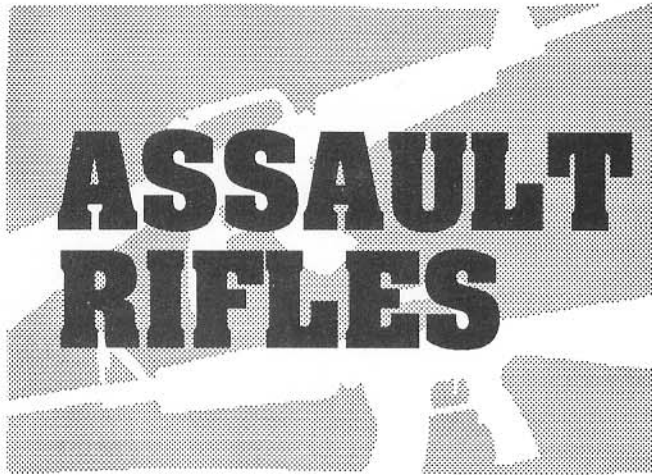

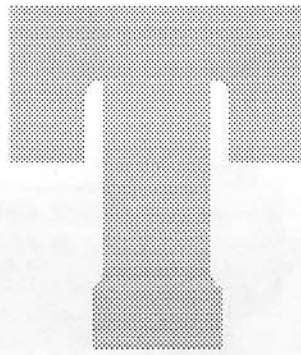

The assault rifle is quickly becoming the most common military weapon. Developed during World War II by the Germans, the weapons class is characterized by being light, short range (400m), capable of automatic fire, having a large magazine capacity, and firing an intermediate sized cartridge. The ammunition has progressed from the shortened military round firing a full-caliber, but lighter, bullet such as the 7.62 x 39mm round, to the modern small caliber, high velocity rounds such as the 5.56 x 45mm round. The lower weight rounds are necessary to give the weapon controllability when fired on full automatic. The light and handy nature of this class of weapon is further increased with the shortened carbine designs such as the XM177E2 or AKR.

Battle rifles are a larger, heavier class of weapon chambered for a long range, full sized round such as the 7.62 x 51mm. Most modern battle rifles are semiautomatic with full automatic capability, shoulder fired, long range (600m+), and have a 20 round maximum capacity. Examples of this type are the FN-FAL and G3 rifle series. ●

This is the most recent version of the G3 rifle that has reached full issue with the German military. The weapon in general has been the German army's standard issue since 1959. The G3 was the first commercially successful rifle to utilize the roller-locked system of delayed blowback. The roller locking system is described in detail in the submachinegun section under the MP5. As roller locking is a form of delayed blowback, the G3 is one of the ten rifle caliber weapons to successfully employ such a system. The heart of the system is the two rollers that resist the opening of the bolt when they are driven outwards into locking recesses by the wedge shaped firing pin carrier. To insure the positive extraction of the fired case, the chamber is fluted for two-thirds of its length.

The same basic roller system is used in almost all of the Heckler and Koch weapons, demonstrating the system's versatility. As the G3 was the first of the HK weapons, it has undergone several changes through the last two decades. The relatively few variations of the G3 are as follows:

G3: The original issue rifle to the German military. The buttstock was made of wood, the handguard was perforated metal, and the rear sight, a flipped over L-shaped type, was very similar to the sight on the FN FAL.

G3A1: Few of this model were made. The stock is a metal foldover style, similar to the type found on the MP-40 submachinegun. Other details are the same as the G3.

G3A2: This weapon has the same stock and handguard as the G3, but with the rotary drum type adjustable sight which has become the standard H & K rear sight.

G3A3: This is the currently manufactured version with a solid plastic buttstock, perforated plastic handguard, a modified front sight protector, and a closed prong-type, flash suppressor.

G3A4: This is the same as the G3A3 but with a retractable sliding metal buttstock.

G3AZF: This is the G3A3 with a removable four power telescoped sight for sniping or observation.

HK91A2: This is a semiautomatic only model of the G3 that

cannot be easily modified to selective fire and is intended for the civilian and police market. The HK91A2 has the same stock and sights as the G3A3 and can use the same accessories, but has a solid handguard instead of a perforated one.

HK91A3: This weapon is the same semiautomatic fire only model as the HK91A2 but with the retractable metal stock.

The G3 weapon series is a very rugged and reliable design that has had a long service life. Because of this long life, many third world countries and various rebel/guerrilla groups are obtaining G3's as other countries sell off their stocks because they are switching to 5.56 NATO designs.

This is a very unusual rifle developed especially for the German antiterrorist police forces but also available for commercial sale. The G8A1 is unusual in that it was developed from the HK11E light machinegun, but is intended to be used as a rifle rather than in the sustained fire role of a machinegun. The quick change barrel of the HK11E was retained but increased in weight and carefully rifled for maximum accuracy. The G8A1 also has a folding bipod and is fitted with the drum type sights associated with Heckler and Koch weapons although the weapon is intended to be used with the available 4 power telescopic sight. The feed mechanism of the G8A1 will only accept magazines and there is a special 50 round drum available. The trigger mechanism has a three round controlled burst facility as well as being capable of either semi or full automatic fire.

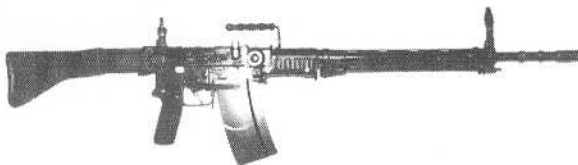

The SG 510-4 is a development of the Swiss Stgw 57 that was intended for export sales. The operating system has its roots in the German Stg 45(M) and as such, is roller locked in the same manner as the Heckler and Koch G3. The locking system is actually a form of delayed blowback and the Swiss system utilizes a round "rocker" rather than the rollers found in the Heckler and Koch system. The rocker seatings are designed to be replaceable and since the hammer forged barrel has a very long accurate life, the replacement feature greatly extends the service life of the weapon. The hammer forged barrel also helps give the SG 510-4 the outstanding reputation for accuracy which it receives. As Switzerland depends on a citizen militia rather than a standing army, the population takes its shooting sports very seriously. The Stgw 57 is very similar to the 510-4 except for being chambered for the 7.5 x 55mm round and is commonly used in competitive shooting in Switzerland. A folding bipod is part of the SG 510-4 as well as a folding carrying handle. The flash hider can be used to launch rifle grenades. Altogether, the SG 510-4 is one of the most accurate production assault rifles available today. It is also one of the most expensive.

After the Vietnam War, many countries have been considering a change from 7.62mm NATO weapons to the U.S. 5.56x45mm round. Not to be left out on possible sales, FN developed what was effectively a 5.56mm version of the FAL rifle, the CAL. Sales of the CAL were poor and in the mid-1970's, the FNC weapon was developed to replace the CAL. The FNC has all of the rugged characteristics of the earlier FAL, but is much lighter in weight. One FNC with 300 rounds of ammunition contained in ten 30 round magazines weighs the same as an FAL with five 20 round magazines (100 rounds). The short FNC has a shorter barrel and cannot be fitted with a bayonet but is otherwise identical to the standard FNC. There is also a "law enforcement" version of the FNC that is only capable of semiautomatic fire. The fact that the FNC uses standard M16 magazines increases its value and makes it an excellent companion weapon to the MINIMI light machinegun.

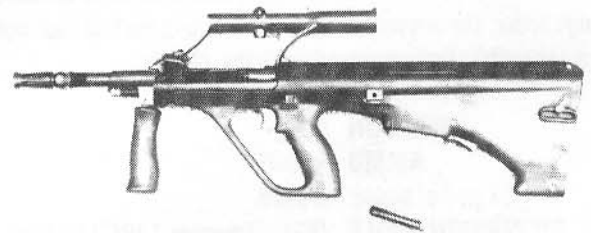

The AUG weapon system is probably one of the most exotic appearing weapons to have found military acceptance. With its bullpup layout and wide versatility with the range of options available, the AUG is seeing good sales with both the Austrian and Australian armies adopting it. The stock and a large portion of the weapon is made of special plastics with the receiver being an aluminum die casting. This gives the AUG a very light overall weight. The barrels of the AUG are easily removable and each has a folding handle which aids in barrel removal as well as acting as a front grip. The normal sighting arrangement for the AUG is a low power telescopic sight built into the handle. The sight has a ring retical that surrounds a 1.8 meter diameter, the height of an average man, at 300 meters and can act as a range finder. The telescopic sight on the AUG is the first such sight rugged enough to find acceptance with the military.

This French design has the distinction of being the first bullpup design to find acceptance with a major military force. Perfected over a period between 1973 and 1979, the FA MAS is now the standard issue rifle of the French forces and is seeing good commercial sales. One of the main reasons for the success of the FA MAS is the elimination of

several major drawbacks of the bullpup design. The largest of these, the need to fire them right handed only because of the ejection of the fired casing, is eliminated in the FA MAS, with it being almost completely ambidextrous. Removal of the cheek rest on the stock and switching it to the other side exposes the left side ejection port as well as accommodating the stock to a left handed firer. The bolt is also easily changed by the operator for right or left ejection. The cocking handle is placed in the upper center of the receiver so that it may be reached from either side. The safety/selector is placed inside the trigger guard in front of the trigger where it can easily be reached by the operator's finger. With the selector pushed to the left, on R, the weapon fires on full automatic. Pushing the selector to the right, on 1, the weapon will fire semiautomatically. The burst fire mechanism is behind the magazine and with it set on 3, putting the selector on R allows the weapon to fire three round controlled bursts. Separating the standard firing mechanism from the burst fire controller prevents operating failure of one system from affecting the operation of the other. NATO standard rifle grenades are easily fired by the FA MAS and it has an integral folding bipod to assist firing.

This is the most recent development by Heckler and Koch and is designed to compete with other 5.56 x 45mm chambered for future NATO trials. The G41 was intended to fit more closely into existing NATO supply systems and for this reason, can use both the magazine and the bipod of the M16. 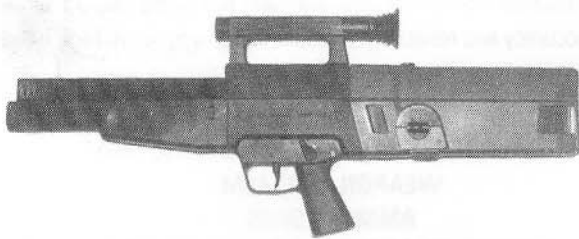

This is presently a developmental weapon using several innovations in its operation. The most obvious innovation is the use of caseless ammunition where the propellant acts as the binder for the bullet and primer. The main advantage of caseless ammunition is the elimination of the metallic cartridge casing. Elimination of the casing saves the use of materials to make it, removes its weight from the weapon system and ends the need for fired casing extraction or ejection. The development of the G11 started with the finding of a suitable material to make up the round's body. The final round is made up of a modified form of the explosive RDX that works as a propellant rather than explosive. Use of modified RDX helps eliminate the problem of cook-off, where the residual heat in the chamber will fire a round. The normal metallic cartridge case removes some of the heat of firing and protects normal propellants. The development of the solid heat resistant propellant opens the door for the weapon's development to commence. The present design of the round is a square cross-section rectangle with the bullet seated fully into the block. The firing mechanism was next developed with the design centering around a cylindrical breech block that rotates to align the round with the barrel. The square crosssection allows the rounds to be closely packed with no wasted space into the G11's 50 round in-line magazine. The magazine is set along the barrel in line with the weapon making for a very streamlined outline. the cartridges are fed downward, nose first into the rotating breechblock. The breechblock is externally operated by the folding knob behind the left side of the pistol grip. The knob can be rotated to load the weapon as well as unload the chambered round through a port in the bottom of the weapon. The unloading port is the only opening, besides the barrel muzzle, to be found in the weapon. This effectively seals out dirt and debris from the action. The action of the G11 is able to move within the stock while operating. The length of movement combined with the action's design and 2000 rpm rate of fire allows a three round controlled burst to be fired with the last round leaving the barrel before the firer can react to the recoil. The 600 rpm rate of fire is automatically set when the weapon is set to full automatic fire. The high rate of fire used on three round burst combined with the effective lack of recoil and muzzle climb greatly increases the probability of a first round hit. On the physical side, the G11 uses

a bullpup layout giving an excellent barrel length while retaining a short overall length for handiness. The upper handle contains a 1 power telescopic sight with a circular reticle, useful for range finding. Still under development, the G11 has been field tested by troops both US and German. Though well received, the weapon is not expected to be adopted in the immediate future by any major military force.

The Galil is a native development of Israel that owes most of its basic design to the AKM-47. The original receivers used for the Galil were from Valmet in Finland's M-62 rifles and so, the Galil can be considered presently to be the most sophisticated of the many AK-47 copies. The three models of the Galil are the ARM (assault rifle machinegun), the AR (assault rifle), and the SAR (shortened assault rifle). The ARM can be used as a light machinegun, and for this role it is normally fitted with the fifty round magazine. The fulcrum of the bipod has a notch cut into it that allows it to be used as a wire cutter by moving the bipod legs. The bipod legs fold under and into the foregrip and the retaining hooks have been modified so that they can act as a bottle opener, probably the most unusual accessory found on any modern rifle today. Without the folding carrying handle and bipod the Galil is referred to as the AR model. The flash suppressor on the Galil can be used to launch rifle grenades. The SAR has a shortened barrel reducing the overall length and cannot accept the bipod or launch rifle grenades but is otherwise identical to the other models. Normally equipped with a folding buttstock, the Galil can be fitted with either a wood or plastic fixed stock. It has folding tritium filled night sights that glow and are zeroed for 100 meters. The cocking handle is raised at a 90 degree angle to the bolt so that the weapon may be cocked from either side, and the selector switch is also arranged so that it can be manipulated from either side. The Galil has developed a reputation for accuracy and reliability, contained in a rugged package which is usable in any environment.

The AR-70 was Beretta's first design in 5.56 x 45 and has met with some success. The number of parts have been held to a minimum, 85 in the AR-70, with as little machining as possible needed to manufacture the weapon. The fixed buttstock of the AR70 is removable and can be replaced with a wire frame folding stock. When fitted with the folding stock, the weapon is referred to as the SC-70. Both models are fitted with front and rear folding sights for use when firing rifle grenades. When the front rifle grenade sight is raised, it automatically cuts off the gas system turning the weapon into a manually operated repeater and allows all the gas from the cartridge to be used propelling the grenade. There is a spring loaded cover that snaps into place behind the bolt effectively sealing out dirt that springs out of the way when the weapon is fired.

The AR 70/90 weapons system is based on the AR-70 rifle with improvements indicated by field experience with the earlier weapon. The receiver of the AR 70/90 is made from a metal stamping with steel bolt guides welded in place. The construction methods result in a lower production cost as well as a stronger and more durable design. The most noticeable new feature is the addition of a removable carrying handle which is attached to mounts at the top of the receiver. With the handle removed, the receiver mounts will accept any NATO standard (STANAG 2324) based sighting device. The handle has a complete set of front and rear sights along its top with luminous inserts for use in low light situations. A set of adjustable iron sights are mounted on the weapon proper and they are used for more precision shooting. The gas system operating the 70/90 has three positions: the first for normal firing, the second for firing under adverse conditions, and the third is a system shutoff for launching rifle grenades. To shut off the gas system for grenade launching, an arched lever is raised which blocks the normal sight line. With the shutoff lever lowered to the normal (open) position, it prevents rifle grenades from being seated over the muzzle launcher. The firing mechanism is designed to allow single-shots, controlled three-

round bursts, or full automatic fire to be selected. The selector is also able to be easily changed for ones allowing only single shots, single shots with three round bursts, or single shots and full automatic fire. The trigger guard can be folded down against the pistol grip, allowing the trigger to be reached by an operator wearing heavy gloves. Both the firing selector as well as the magazine release are duplicated on both sides of the receiver, allowing easy use by right or left-handed firers. The magazine well is designed to accept any M16 type magazines according to NATO standard (STANAG 4179). The AR 70/90 is the standard rifle version of the 70/90 weapons family with the SC 70/90 being a carbine version of the system. The SC 70/90 is identical to the rifle version except for the folding stock. Both weapons will accept a removable bipod which can fold up under the front grip.

The SAR 80 is a development of a design originally from Sterling in England, finalized and improved in Singapore. The SAR, Singapore Assault Rifle, is very much an improved AR-18 and as such, is particularly easy to manufacture. The use of the M16 magazine as well as M16 accessories allows the SAR-80 to quickly interface with units that have already trained with the M16. The firing and operating mechanism is very similar to the AR-18 with most of the improvements being in the outer layout of the weapon. One option available on the SAR-80 is that the weapon is made with either a right or left side magazine release, though the release cannot be changed by the operator. The simplification of the mechanism has resulted in the SAR 80 having an excellent reliability with the weapon commonly passing a 6,000 round firing test without a malfunction.

Plastic is used for the stocks, grips, and magazines and results in a significant weight saving. The magazine being made of plastic allows for a transparent body and remaining rounds can be seen at a glance. One of the more unusual aspects of the 550 is also found in the magazines as clips are cast into the magazine's body, allowing two or more magazines to be attached together. This is the mostly widely distributed and easily recognized weapon manufactured since World War II. Including variants, there have been from 30 to 50 million Kalashnikovs built since the original AK-47 was issued in the Soviet Union. Between 3.0 and 8.7 million AK-47's were manufactured before the design was changed in 1959 to what is called the AKM-47. The earlier AK-47 was made from a milled steel receiver that was extremely strong, but much heavier than the AKM which used a stamped steel receiver: 3.14 kg for the AKM against 4.30 kg for the AK. The AKM, Automat Kalashnikova Modernizirovanniyi, is the model of AK most people have seen and is the most copied version. Having probably the best reputation for reliability of any military weapon, the AKM is also very easy to operate and maintain which makes it especially valuable to undeveloped countries. The sights are unsophisticated and have a short sight radius but the AK series is intended for use on full automatic area, rather than single-shot aimed, fire. The safety/selector on the AKM is on the right hand side and also acts as a cover for the bolt slot when set on safe. The safety clicks down first into full automatic and down further to semiautomatic fire. The setup of the safety indicates the intended role for the AKM, as it is quickest to set to full automatic. There is a loud click heard when the selector is set to any of the three positions. The click was referred to as "AK-CLACK" by U.S. troops in Vietnam and would be a warning before an ambush. The widespread use of the AKM has resulted in it being found in many hands throughout the world with large numbers having been captured by the Western countries. In many covert operations, AK's would be used by troops to help disguise themselves. The folding stock version of the AKM, the AKMS, was issued to mechanized troops with limited space in their armored personnel carriers.

In the early 1970's, the Soviets completed the development of a new small caliber round to be used in a modified AKM-47. The Soviets had been developing a new round of ammunition since the 1960's and have settled on a 5.45 caliber bullet in a 39mm case. The 52 grain bullet of the 5.45 x 39mm moves out at around 900 meters per second and has a relatively low muzzle energy. The construction of the 5.45 bullet allows for maximum destruction to tissue to help make up for its low energy. The bullet has a steel penetrator for about two thirds of its length with a lead plug at the front, behind a 5mm long airspace at the tip. All of this is contained in a very long (25mm) body for its caliber. The effect of this complicated construction is a bullet with excellent penetration for its size and greater wounding power than the original 7.62 x 39mm. At the time of adoption of the 5.45 x 39mm round, the standard AKM was slightly modified to accept the new round. Besides the barrel, few parts needed to be changed. A new bolt was designed to accept the smaller head of the 5.45 round along with a new and improved extractor. Much of the noted reliability of the AK design comes from the bolt carrier and bolt assembly weight ratio which in the AK47 series is 5 to 1 and in the AK74 series is 6 to 1, giving even greater reliability. The new magazine for the AK74 series is a composite of steel and fiberglass of great strength but heavy weight. The most externally visible change is the addition of a large muzzle brake. The brake is very efficient in reducing recoil and keeping the muzzle down on automatic fire, but greatly increases the muzzle blast and noise for anyone on either side of the firer. The brake is also designed primarily for the right handed shooter as is the general AK design. A horizontal finger groove is seen on both sides of the buttstock to aid in identification of the AK-74 series. As in the AK-47, there is a folding stock version of the AK-74 and this model is identified by the S for Skladyvayushchimsya in the designation AKS-74. The folding stock of the AKS-74 is of a triangular shape and folds to the left side rather than underneath as the AKS-47 stock does.

This is an unusual development for the Soviets, being a carbine version of the AK-74 series. The barrel of an AKS-74 was shortened considerably in the AKR as was the gas tube and piston. There is a large cylindrical muzzle attachment that allows the shortened gas system to safely operate using the standard fullpower rifle cartridge. A second feature of the muzzle attachment would be to limit the large muzzle flash that would be found in such a weapon. The muzzle attachment does not act as the normal muzzle brake found on the AK-74 and the AKR would have a greater recoil and muzzle climb than the parent weapon. The action cover is hinged at the front unlike the cover on the AK-74. The rear sight of the AKR is considerably simplified consisting of a nonadjustable, flip-over, L-shaped, notched leaf for two different ranges. The Automat Kalashnikov Ruzhya (AKR) is primarily issued to armored vehicle crews to give them a compact personal weapon of considerable power, making the AKR the closest return to a submachinegun that the Soviets have fielded since the 1950's.

This is the rifle version of the new Enfield weapon system that is reaching general issue to the British military. The L85A1 is a development of an earlier design, the XL64E5, that was chambered for a 4.85 x 49mm round, specially designed for it. The changes that resulted in the L85A1 were primarily a rechambering to 5.56 x 45mm to allow a greater interoperability with NATO as well as modifications to utilize the M16 magazine which is now NATO standard. The bullpup design is one that Great Britain has been championing since the early 1950's. There are a variety of sights that can be fitted to the L85A1 with the standard sight being a four power telescopic sight known as the SUSAT (Sight Unit Small Arms Trilux). The SUSAT is a very rugged optical sight with an illuminated retical system for low light use. The top of the SUSAT has a simple open sight for emergency use and the mounting bracket will accept standard sighting devices such as starlight or infrared sights. An aperture type iron sight is available on an attachable carrying handle that can use the SUSAT sight mounts. The iron sight/handle with the corresponding attachable front sight is intended for all other troops but the front line infantry who are issued the SUSAT sight. There is also a complete bayonet assembly available for the L85A1 that incorporates an insulated wirecutter, serrated rope-cutting edge, and folding metal-cutting hacksaw blade as well as a stainless steel knife blade.

This weapon was developed in the mid-1960's as a more inexpensive alternative to the M16. Utilizing metal stampings for much of its construction the AR-18 can be made with much simpler machinery than its M16 predecessor. The gas system of the AR-18 is a straightforward piston type that eliminates many of the complications of other operating systems. Using a double guide rod mainspring system that telescopes somewhat into the bolt carrier eliminates the need for a rear extended mainspring and the AR-18 has a side folding buttstock as a result. A slightly modified M16 type magazine is used in the AR-18. Though not adopted in any large quantity, the AR-18 and its semiautomatic-only counterpart, the AR-180, has seen good commercial sales, especially in the U.S. for police issue. The AR-18 has been made in the U.S. by Armalite, in Japan by the HOWA Machinery Co., and in England by the Sterling Armament Company. Being manufactured by Armalite resulted in all AR-18's or AR180's used by the IRA terrorists in Ireland, who prefer them for their compactness and accuracy, being referred to as "Armalites".

The M16 series were the first small caliber weapons to be accepted by any major military and also the weapon for which the 5.56 x 45mm round was developed. The original AR-15 rifle was developed in the late 1950's and was first adopted by the U.S. Air Force in 1961 and in 1962, designated the M16. By 1963 the U.S. Army was purchasing the M16 for use in South East Asia and by its various elite forces. The M16 uses a direct gas system to operate the weapon and is one of the very few designs to do so. In the direct gas system, gas from the fired round is tapped from the barrel and guided back into the action of the weapon to directly operate the bolt. To operate the bolt, gas presses back on the bolt carrier, driving it rearward. As the carrier moves back, a cam pin attached to the bolt moves along a camming track, rotating the bolt to unlock it from the barrel. The 5.56 caliber bullet has to leave the muzzle of the M16 at a very high, over 3,000 feet per second, velocity to be effective and this velocity results in a chamber pressure over 50,000 psi. To safely control this high chamber pressure. The M16 uses a multiple lug bolt that locks into an extension screwed onto the rear of the barrel giving a very large effective locking area to the bolt while only requiring a small rotation to unlock it from the

barrel. The receiver and major parts of the M16 are either made from aluminum alloy forgings or cast plastic/fiberglass with high strength steel being used for the barrel and stressed parts of the weapon. Drawbacks were discovered during field use in Vietnam and these resulted in modifications to the ammunition and the weapon. The weapon was changed so that there was a positive forward assist to help close the bolt when dirty, the chamber and bore were chromium plated to resist corrosion, the gas system improved and a new bolt buffer designed to control the rate of fire on full automatic. In 1967 the new modified weapon, the M16A1 was adopted by the U.S. Army as its Standard A issue infantry weapon. Over 6 million M16A1's and variants have been produced to date with production still ongoing in the United States and elsewhere. There is a semiautomatic-only version of the M16 sold in the United States as the AR-15. Many versions of the civilian AR-15 are found but most are like the original M16 and do not have the forward bolt assist.

This carbine version of the M16 is derived from the M177E3 and was originally intended for civilian sale as a semiautomatic only rifle. The carbine has the collapsing buttstock and short, round handguard of the M177E3, combined with a 16 inch barrel to meet U.S. civilian gun law requirements. An interesting point about this weapon is that a military demand for a selective fire version of it developed. In the early 1960's, Colt offered a version of the M16 that had the barrel cut off just in front of the sight, but retained the standard M16 buttstock and handguards. That version did not do well on the market. Today, Colt offers a selective fire version of the carbine with either the 16 inch or a 14.5 inch barrel. The handiness of the carbine combined with its lethality make this a very popular weapon among units where size or weight is at a premium.

This weapon is referred to by a variety of names, XM177E2, CAR-15 (Colt Automatic Rifle), and Commando submachinegun, but all the names describe the short version of the M16 we shall call here the CAR-15. The CAR-15 went through a variety of changes, most referring to a slight, one or two inch, change in barrel length but the most common version was accepted by the U.S. Army in small numbers as the XM177E2. This weapon has a very short barrel and still utilizes the normal rifle cartridge. The firing of a cartridge designed for a 20 inch barrel from one half that length results in a massive muzzle blast and flame. To limit the large muzzle blast, the XM177E2 had a special noise and flash suppressor made for it that helped alleviate the problem. A special mainspring, buffer, and spring housing allowed for a sliding metal buttstock to be fitted that can collapse about one third of its length to help give a short overall length. The short barrel results in the bullet being not as stable as the same round fired from a normal length barrel. This instability gives the CAR-15 a much shorter effective range than other weapons of this caliber. In spite of the shortcomings, the CAR15 is a very popular design for its small size and light weight. Originally intended for Tank and A.P.C. or helicopter crews, the CAR-15 is often carried by officers and NCO's as it gives them good firepower, while not encumbering them as a full sized weapon would.

M16A2 an effective range of 800 meters, a great improvement over the original. The M16A2 can also effectively use the original M193 ball round, allowing older ammunition stocks to be consumed efficiently. A new rear sight is found on the M16A2 that is completely adjustable for windage and elevation to make use of the longer effective range. The handguard, buttstock, and pistol grip are redesigned and made of a stronger material than the original. The handguard is of a cylindrical cross-section with both pieces being interchangeable. The pistol grip has a finger groove for a better grip and the buttstock is longer to better fit taller soldiers. The barrel is heavier for part of its length adding to its strength and assisting in obtaining the longer effective range. A new flash hider is fitted that more greatly stabilizes the weapon during full automatic fire. The firing mechanism is modified to give three round controlled bursts rather than true full automatic fire, though full auto is offered as a possible option by the manufacturer. A cartridge case deflector is forged into the upper receiver to guide ejected casings away from the faces of left handed shooters. Altogether, the M16A2 is a good improvement and has been accepted as standard issue by the U.S. military.

The HBAR, Heavy Barreled Automatic Rifle, is an interesting development from the M16A2 program. Initially, the M16A2 was to have a full length heavy barrel much thicker than the barrel on the earlier M16A1. It was found that some accessories, most notably the M203 40mm grenade launcher, would not be able to clip onto the heavy barrel without modification. Because of the accessory problem, the full length heavy barrel was dropped from the M16A2. In the HBAR model the full length heavy barrel, 0.96 inch diameter up to the front sight, is returned to the M16A2 model with all of its advantages. The primary advantage is that the HBAR model can group its shots to 1 1/2 Minutes of Angle (MOA) against 2 to 3 MOA for the M16A2. The additional weight of the heavy barrel also adds to the stability and quick second-shot recovery of the weapon. The additional mass of the heavy barrel also acts as a greater heat sink, allowing longer periods of full automatic firing. This heat sink effect is allowing Colt to offer the M16A2 HBAR as a possible squad automatic weapon. As the civilian semiautomatic fire only version, the AR-15A2 HBAR is receiving a good welcome from military match shooters as well as police departments for its excellent accuracy.

This weapon is referred to as the Model 723 Carbine by its manufacturer, Colt Industries. The carbine has a shorter barrel than its civilian counterpart, and is somewhat shorter overall, with very quick handling as a result. The same style of handguard is found on the carbine as is on the M16A2 with the guard on the carbine being only half as long as the rifles. Introduced in 1973, the Mini-14 is very much a simplified, scaled down M1 Garand chambered for the 5.56 x 45mm round. Built along the lines of a standard rifle, the Mini-14 was originally intended for the military and police markets but the expected military sales never appeared. The popularity of the Mini-14 for the police and civilian markets has soared, with it quickly becoming one of the most popular semiautomatic 5.56mm rifles available. The action is very similar to that used on the M1 and M14 rifles, but has been strengthened and improved for greater reliability. Early difficulties were addressed by the manufacturer in 1977 and an improved model made available. The improved model is recognizable by its having a "181" or greater serial number prefix. Though only made in a semiautomatic version for the public, the Mini-14 is available in a wide number of variations made of stainless or blued steel and having a selection of sights as well as an available folding stock. The data given above is for the blued steel, walnut stocked version which is the most predominant model.

This weapon is a development of the Mini-14 rifle and is intended solely for military or police use. The standard inside the trigger guard safety is used on the AC-556 with a selector switch found on the upper part of the receiver on the right side behind the rear sight. The action of the AC-556 is designed to give either semiautomatic, three round controlled burst, or full automatic fire according to the selector setting. The front sight is moved back on the AC-556 to allow for a standard M7 (M16) bayonet to be fixed. The moved-back front sight allows rifle grenades to be launched from the modified flash hider. The stock of the AC-556 is made of walnut with a reinforced plastic ventilated handguard over the barrel. This is the newest candidate for the U.S. Army's Advanced Combat Rifle program and, as of the time of this writing, it has only recently been declassified. The weapon is designed around a telescoped, plastic cased round with a metallic base. In the telescoped round, the bullet is set inside the case and does not protrude from the mouth of the cartridge at all. This results in a shorter, more streamlined cartridge with no protrusions. The body of the round is of plastic and is intended only to support the round through handling. The metallic case head contains the primer and receives the brunt of impact when the round is fired. The smooth, cylindrical appearance of the round allows the AIWS to have a unique method of firing. The round is carried in a plastic link belt contained in the magazine. When the action strips a round forward, the used link is ejected to the right. The cartridge is driven forward into a separate chamber piece where it remains through

the rest of the firing cycle. The chamber piece is cammed upward into line with the barrel where its cartridge is fired by a normal firing pin. During the ejection portion of the cycle, the chamber piece is cammed downward to where a fresh round is chambered from the rear. As the fresh round enters the chamber, the fired casing is driven forward and out of the weapon by the incoming round. The use of a separate chamber piece limits the amount of heat to which the loaded cartridge is subjected because the majority of the firing heat is retained in the barrel. As the chamber is cammed upwards when the weapon is fired, the effect is that of a closed-bolt weapon with little disturbance of the firer's aim, while retaining the positive cooling effects of an open-bolt weapon. The receiver of the AIWS is surrounded by a plastic body which both streamlines and protects the weapon. The bullpup layout of the AIWS also gives the weapon a short overall length while still retaining a long barrel length. The long barrel gives the 5mm projectile the same terminal effects as the new U.S. M855 5.56x45mm round. The optical sight is considered a standard fitting with folding iron sights being available for emergency use.

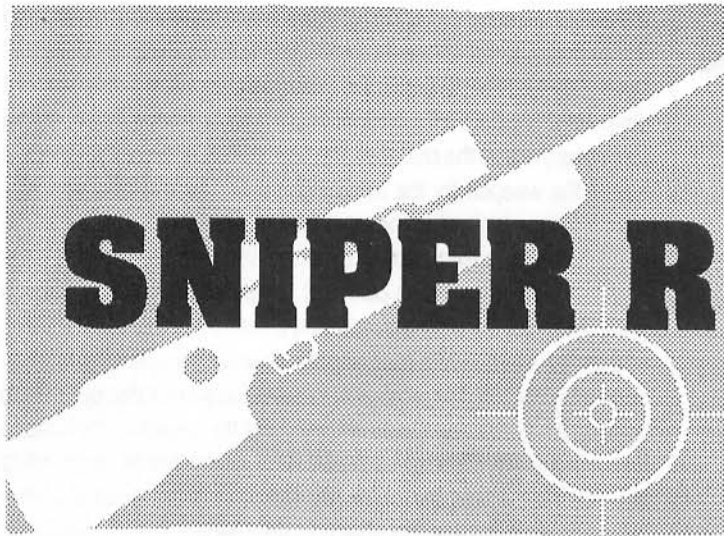

pecifically designed sniper weapons are a relatively new development. With the need for absolute precision of shot placement in hostage situations new, specially-designed rifles, rests, and sighting systems were created. All such weapons share the same purpose of firing relatively few rounds with maximum accuracy. ●

The SSG 69 is considered by many to be one of the most accurate military issue sniper rifles available on today's market. Much of this weapon's accuracy comes from its receiver design and barrel. The receiver of the SSG-69 is of fairly standard outline but of exceptionally long length for the caliber. The long receiver length allows two and a half inches of the barrel to be seated into the receiver giving an outstanding alignment and rigidity between the barrel and receiver. Another point towards the barrel/receiver interface is that the receiver is shrunk fit onto the barrel rather than threaded as in most other rifles. The barrel is made by hammer forging onto a mandrel rather than cutting the rifling into the bore. the forging process allows for very tight tolerances to be held on the bore as well as greatly increasing the barrel's strength. The bolt has the characteristic "butter-knife" Mannlicher handle as well as having six locking lugs. The magazine is of a rotary type long associated with the Mannlicher design, with a 10 round box magazine offered as an accessory. The stock is made of a black Cylolac plastic with earlier models having a green stock of the same material. Removable spacers are found under the buttplate to allow the length of the stock to be changed to fit a variety of firers. A fixed rear sight and adjustable front blade are fitted to the SSG but the weapon is normally fitted with a telescopic sight. The Kahles ZF84 six power scope is offered by the factory as a standard fitting

but any applicable sighting device may be fitted. The result of all this is a rugged military weapon with the accuracy of a fragile custom made target rifle.

This is an improved model of the SSG-69 rifle and is presently the most accurate production sniper rifle available on the commercial market. The excellent receiver and bolt design of the SSG-69 rifle was mated to the barrel of the Steyr UIT Olympic class match rifle. The heavy bull barrel increases the weight of the SSG-P11 making it more stable to shoot than the lighter SSG69 but also, making it less applicable to a military environment. The traditional butter-knife bolt handle is replaced by a newly designed handle that is faster to use but less streamlined than the earlier model. No iron sights are fitted as the SSG-P11 is intended to be fired with a telescopic sight. To assist in changing sights for specialized instances, the scope mounts are of a quick-removable type that retain their alignment with the barrel. The trigger can be either the normal single trigger type or a dual set-trigger can be installed and is the preferred type. In the set trigger, the front trigger has a normal pull adjustable from 2.5 to 4.7 pounds (1.134-2.132kg). When the rear trigger is pulled to the set position, the front trigger has a let-off of from two to eight ounces (57-227 grams) adjustable by the operator. Though the set trigger requires some getting used to by a new operator, it allows the SSG-P11 to have its excellent first-round accuracy for long range shots.

This weapon has been the standard French sniper rifle for the military and GIGN since 1965. Initial problems with native produced 7.62 NATO rounds resulted in the FR-F1 being accepted in the French 7.5 x 54mm Model 29-C chambering with a commercial model offered in 7.62 x 51mm NATO for export sales. The action of the FR-F1 is a manual bolt action modified from the MAS-36 rifle with integral iron sights built on for emergency use should the telescopic sight become damaged. The unusual flash hider on the muzzle is adjustable to help stabilize the barrel and must be adjusted to the specific ammunition being used for maximum accuracy if the factory setting has been changed. The sight normally used with the FR-F1 is the 3.8 power APX L 806 Modele 1953bis telescopic sight that is mounted on a quick release base so that it can be removed or mounted without changing its alignments. With the scope removed, the iron sights may be used. There are colored luminous inserts in the iron sights for use in low-light conditions. To use the iron sights in the dark, the green luminous dot on the front sight is aligned with the two red dots of the rear sight on either side of it. There is an integral folding bipod on the FR-F1 at the rear of the wooden handguard. There are two heights of cheekpiece that can be mounted on the buttstock to adjust for different shooters as well as two spacers for the buttplate, also for size adjustment.

the earlier weapon in general service. The caliber has been changed to the 7.62x51mm NATO round and this change has considerably increased sales. The barrel is surrounded by a thermal shield that prevents heat haze from interfering with the sights and cuts down on the infrared signature of the weapon. The basic action has not changed but the scope mounting rail is NATO standard and will accept a wide range of sighting devices. The folding bipod has been changed and it now pivots on a bearing so that a target can be tracked without moving the bipod legs. A new front stock is fitted on the FR-F2 that is made of a composite material that supports the bipod while allowing the barrel to be free-floating for accuracy. The FR-F2 is an improvement on an already excellent design and has replaced the FR-F1 as the sniper rifle used by GIGN. It is gradually becoming general issue for the French military.

This is the Mauser bolt action Model 66S Super Match version of their Model 66 rifle system and is offered as a military and police sniper weapon. Specially engineered for maximum accuracy as a competition weapon, the SP66 is also rugged enough to serve as a military sniping system, though it still requires more care than a standard issue weapon. The action of the Mauser 66 is unusual in that it has such a short length for the size of cartridge it uses. To obtain this short length the bolt handle is placed at the front of the bolt and the bolt held in a movable carrier. When the bolt is drawn back to the rear of the travel, the bolt carrier then moves back, effectively doubling the length of travel for the bolt. The barrel locks into a lower receiver and the bolt locks into the barrel, resulting in a great rigidity of the weapon when the bolt is closed. The barrel is of the heavy bull type with a combination muzzle brake/flash hider on the muzzle. No iron sights are fitted and the SP 66 is normally used with the Zeiss Diavari ZA 1.5 to 6 power zoom telescopic sight. The stock is of competition lines and is completely adjustable to fit all builds of firers. The thumbhole type stock is regularly seen among competition rifles and results in excellent holding characteristics, but does somewhat slow down the speed with which the bolt can be manipulated.

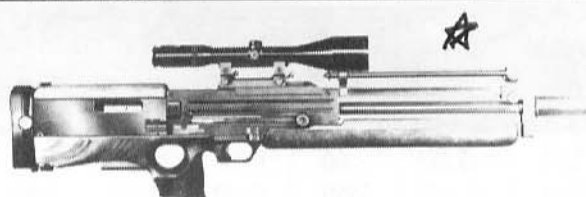

The Walther design team developed the WA-2000 expressly for use as a sniper rifle and not as a modified production weapon. The result is a compact bullpup layout rifle of extreme accuracy and very unusual lines. The barrel is considered the heart of the weapon with all the other parts being in support of it. The rifling was carefully matched to the .300 Winchester magnum cartridge as this was considered the best commercially available round for the purpose. There are longitudinal flutes on the barrel, greatly adding to its strength and cutting down on vibration as well as increasing its surface area for cooling between shots. The barrel is set in a frame that transmits the recoil in a straight line to the shooter's shoulder, eliminating muzzle climb. The frame also acts as a support to the rest of the weapon while protecting the barrel. The caliber of the weapon may be changed as the barrel is easily removable and, by changing it and the bolt, another cartridge may be used. The bolt is gas operated and locks directly to the barrel with seven locking lugs for a very strong joint. The bullpup design allows for a long barrel length with a short overall length resulting in a very compact rifle. The action is to the rear of the pistol grip with the bolt release and ejection being able to be changed to the right or left side, resulting in an ambidextrous weapon. The unusual thumbhole grip is so that it may also be used by right or left handed shooters. The stock is adjustable to fit different shooters and the cheekpiece can be switched from one side to the other, exposing the opposite side ejection port. The large muzzle brake reportedly cuts down recoil by fifty percent without affecting accuracy. The folding bipod is unusual in that it can travel along the rail above the barrel to adjust to a given situation. There are no iron sights fitted to the WA-2000 and the Schmidt & Bender 2.5 to 10 power variable telescopic sight is issued as standard with the weapon. The mounting for the sight is of the quick detachable type and will accept many types of sighting devices. So intent on maximum accuracy were the designers that they did not overlook the smallest detail. An example is the magazine with its two sets of formed guide rails to align the round with the chamber, protecting the nose of the projectile from damage while being chambered or undergoing recoil when still in the magazine.

The only sniper system available in this caliber, the HK94 SG/1 is a carbine version of the MP5 submachinegun. This is the sniper version of the HK 33A2 rifle and is a precision firing weapon of 5.56mm caliber for use in situations where larger calibers could be prone to overpenetration. The SG version is a standard production weapon that is noted for its particular accuracy during testing and put aside to receive the SG type modifications. The primary modification is the addition of a set trigger mechanism to lower trigger pull. In the set trigger system the rectangular protrusion behind the trigger is pulled back to set the trigger to an adjustable pull between 2 and 3.3 pounds (.9 - 1.5kg) with the selector switch set to "E", semiautomatic fire. Setting the selector to "S" or "F", safety or full automatic, unsets the trigger to its normal pull of 5.7 pounds (2.6kg). The standard folding bipod is normally fitted to the weapon. Standard H&K iron sights are on the SG model and it is issued with a Zeiss 1.5 to 6 power variable telescopic sight on a quick release mount. The fixed buttstock has an adjustable height cheekpiece to fit different shooters. The most unusual aspect of the HK33 SG/1 is that it is one of two production sniper weapons capable of full automatic fire. Though full auto fire would quickly degrade the accuracy of the weapon, it would allow a sniper to put down a suppressive field of fire in an emergency.

This weapon, the Prazisions schutzen gewehr Eins (PSG-1), was developed specifically as a police and military snipers' weapon and is not a modified production weapon. The barrel is a smooth bull-barrel design with the H&K polygonal rifling for extended life and accuracy. The action is the same roller-locked delayed blowback system used in most HK weapons with the operating tolerances held extremely close. The trigger mechanism is only capable of semiautomatic fire and has a normal trigger with an adjustable trigger shoe and a crisp pull of 3.2 pounds (1.5kg). The forearm has a rail built into its bottom to allow an adjustable sling to be attached. The bottom of the forearm is also flat and broad to give a stable rest when used with the optional precision adjustable tripod or on the hand. The pistol grip is shaped to fit the hand and has an adjustable palm rest to help eliminate fatigue when the weapon is held for long lengths of time. The buttstock is modified from the machinegun style used by H & K with the flat downward portion intended to be held with the left hand with the weapon resting on a tripod. The stock is fully adjustable for length and height to fit any shooter. A silent bolt closure device is fitted to the right side to allow the weapon to be quietly loaded if the situation demands. The sight is a Hensoldt six power telescopic sight with an illuminated reticle for use in low light situations. The sight mount will accept standard sighting devices but is not of the quick release type. A special aluminum carrying case is made for the PSG-1 and it weighs 10.4kg empty. Filled with the weapon, precision tripod, two filled 20 round and two filled 5 round magazines, the case weighs 21.736kg.

This is a modified version of the 7.62 x 51mm Galil rifle and is intended for military sniping operations. The barrel is heavier than standard as an aid to accuracy and is fitted with a flash hider/muzzle brake. The folding buttstock has a fully adjustable cheekpiece and recoil pad to fit individual firers. The iron sights can be used when the telescopic sight is fixed in place. The Nimrod six power telescopic sight used with the Galil was specifically made for use as a military sight and has a ranging reticle that allows ranges from 200 to 1000 meters to be determined. The mount used with the Nimrod scope attaches to the side of the rifle with a quick release attachment that allows the sight to be removed or added at will without changing its zero. This is a highly refined version of the Sauer 90 short action system intended for high precision fire. The bolt in the Sauer 90 system does not rotate for its entire length but only a short rear section rotates to cam 3 locking lugs outward to lock the bolt. This non-rotating bolt helps give the SIG 2000 its very smooth operation. The barrel is a hammer forged medium weight target (bull) type with an unusual tapered bore. The bore tapers slightly from breech to muzzle to help keep the bullet aligned and improve accuracy. A large combination flash hider/muzzle brake is attached to the barrel cutting down on muzzle rise for a fast second shot. The trigger is of the single set type with a normal trigger pull of 2 1/4 pounds (1.02kg). By pushing the trigger forward, it becomes "set" with a trigger pull of 14 ounces (0.40kg). Lifting the bolt handle or setting the safety removes the trigger from its set position. The standard sight of the SIG 2000 is a Zeiss Dmiata-ZA 8 power telescope sight on a quick release mount. The stock design is taken from competition weapons with a thumbhole pistol grip, adjustable buttplate and cheekpiece, and a rail fitting for accessories under the forend. A Loga Rifle Rest precision tripod is recommended for use with the weapon and can be supplied by the manufacturer. An unusual aspect of the SSG 2000 is the number of calibers in which it is available. Normally used in the 7.62 x 51mm chambering, the SSG 2000 is the only production sniper rifle chambered for the .300 Weatherby magnum round (7.62 x 72mmB).

The SVD, Snayperskaya Vinyovka Dragunov, is a heavily modified version of the Kalashnikov weapon system (AKM-47). First seen in 1963, the SVD is chambered for the older 7.62 x 54mm R round that is still used in Soviet machineguns and is known for its excellent ballistics. The basic mechanism was redesigned to handle this much larger round and accept a 10 round magazine. The action was changed for semiautomatic only fire and the trigger pull improved. The long barrel is fitted with a flash suppressor/compensator that assists the firer in keeping the barrel down for a fast second shot. The buttstock is made of laminated wood for strength and has a distinctive hollow shape. There are iron sights for emergency use with the SVD but the weapon is intended to be used with the PSO-1 telescopic sight. The PSO-1 sight is a fairly sophisticated device with an integral infrared detector, illuminated reticle and range finder, good up to 1300 meters. In the early 1970's, the demand for an example of this weapon was so high with Western intelligence agencies that the CIA offered a \$25,000 reward to the first person who could deliver one! Several were finally captured during the 1973 Israeli conflict and supplied to the U.S.

This is the last member of the Lee Enfield weapons line to still be in active service with a major military. The World War II Number 4 Mark One or Mark 1*(T) Enfield has been modified into a lighter and more accurate sniper rifle. The major modification was a rebarreling and action adaptations to accept the 7.62 x 51mm NATO round. The stock was shortened at the forearm and a cheekpiece added. The original iron sights have been recalibrated to fit the caliber change and a four power L1A1 telescopic sight fitted. Though being replaced by newer designs, the L42A1 has seen extensive service with the British military and specialized police agencies and still commands a loyal following.

This rifle was developed from scratch as a military issue sniper rifle and has been accepted by the British military as their new issue sniper weapon, the L96A1. The receiver of the L96A1 is assembled to an aluminum "chassis" on which all of the other parts of the weapon are mounted. Using this chassis approach prevents any change in accuracy from weather or environmental changes to the stock and greatly adds to the overall strength of the design. The trigger is a two stage type that can be set by the operator for a pull between 1 and 2 kg. The barrel is designed to be easily removable so that other ammunition may be used in the rifle with the barrel optimized to fit the rounds being used. The buttstock is adjustable for length and there is a folding bipod attached to the forend by a ball joint to allow for easy movement of the weapon. There are adjustable iron sights built into the weapon and it comes equipped with a Schmidt and Bender PM six power telescopic sight that was specifically designed for it. A collapsible support spike is available that fits into the buttstock. With the spike extended, the weapon is supported on an effective tripod that would prevent fatigue in an operator holding a position for an extended length of time.

This is presently the standard issue sniper weapon in the U.S. Army. Developed during the Vietnam war, the M21 is a National Match target grade M14 rifle fitted with the ART-I telescopic sight. The standard M14 rifle is fitted with a precision, gauged barrel, the flash suppressor reamed and carefully aligned to the barrel, the barreled action glassbedded to a select epoxy-impregnated walnut stock, and the trigger mechanism tuned and polished for a crisp release. All this work results in a very accurate, rugged rifle with a high level of dependability. The iron sights found on the M14 are replaced with the improved national match sights that are capable of finer adjustment. The sight designed for use with the M21 is the 3 to 9 power variable Leatherwood ART-I telescopic sight. The sight, designed by Captain James Leatherwood, is an automatic adjusting ranging telescope specifically intended for use with the M118 Match 7.62 x 51mm round. The reticle of the scope has a set of stadia lines intended to cover a space of 76cm, the distance from the average soldier's belt to the top of his helmet. With the target set in the sight, the magnification ring is rotated until the stadia lines measure the proper space, that is, mark the space from the belt to the top of the helmet (76cm). As the magnification ring is rotated, a ballistic cam rotates adjusting the aiming point of the sight to match the ballistic arc of the M118 projectile at the distance indicated. The design of the ART-I scope is such that the power setting of the scope is equal to the range in hundreds of meters, i.e. 3x equals 300 meters, 9x equals 900 meters. Though the M21 is a satisfactory weapon, the outstanding feature of the system is the ART scope and this has since been adapted to other weapons.

The U.S. Marine Corps prefers using a bolt action rifle to the Army's semiautomatic M21, and adopted the militarized version of a civilian target rifle during the Vietnam war. The basic rifle is a Remington Model 700 BDL Heavy Barrel Varmint rifle in 7.62 x 51mm NATO. The barrel is of stainless steel darkened with a matte black finish. The stock is of dark camouflage fiberglass that will not swell or warp from moisture. The sight was originally a Redfield three to nine power variable telescopic sight but that has now been replaced by a special Unertl ten power sight specially built for the USMC with an elevation drum ballistically matched to the M118 Match round. The magazine capacity of the Remington action is five rounds and these must be

loaded through the top of the magazine singly. The slowness of reloading is not considered a drawback as the USMC sniper will only fire a few rounds before moving his position.

The M24 Sniper Weapon System has been accepted as the new U.S. Army sniper rifle and will be replacing the M21 system starting in 1988. The M24 weapon is basically a Remington M700 with a heavy barrel fitted into a fiberglass stock. The entire assembly receives a black, non-reflective coating. The telescopic sight is a fixed power scope with a graduated reticle, allowing it to be used for limited range determination. A removable micrometer style set of iron sights are supplied with each weapon to be used in the event of the primary telescopic sight being damaged. A commercially produced Harris bipod, protective transit case, and assortment of spare parts completes the weapon system. A specific intent behind using the long action of the Remington 700 is the possibility of rechambering the weapon to fire the .300 Winchester Magnum cartridge (7.62x66mmB). As the Army is considering the use of the Magnum round for its additional long range capabilities in the sniper role, the bolt-action system allows for this change economically while other systems, especially semiautomatic weapons, have prohibitive difficulties accepting a major caliber change.

This unusual appearing weapon is designed specifically as a long range sniper weapon and has been tested by the U.S. Government. The barrel is deeply fluted for strength and heat radiating surface area and is full floating, that is, unsupported for its entire length. Changing calibers is simply removing the barrel and bolt head and replacing them with one of another caliber. A specific round developed with this rifle is the 8.58 x 71mm. The 8.58 mm round is a .416 Rigby rifle round necked down to accept a .338 bullet. The result of this is a high velocity round firing

a heavy bullet with an overall length short enough to fit in a standard length rifle action. The receiver of the RAI 300 is made from a solid bar of steel with openings only for ejection and the magazine, giving a very rigid receiver. The long bar underneath the barrel contains an adjustable tuning rod that dampens barrel vibration, greatly adding to accuracy. The adjustable bipod is placed on the end of the tuner housing so that it can support the weapon without interfering with the barrel. The buttstock is fully adjustable for length and height to fit a variety of shooters. The scope mounting is interesting in that it can be ballistically matched to the round being used and by adjusting the range wheel, graduated from 300 to 1500 meters in 100 meter increments, the point of aim will center to the point of impact. Any standard sighting device can be fitted to the adjustable mount with a telescopic sight of 12 power or greater being the normal fixture.

This is a companion weapon to the RAI 300 and greatly follows it in design. Chambered for the .50 Browning round, the RAI 500 has both a rearward angled muzzle brake as well as a combination flash hider/muzzle brake mounted on its heavy, fluted barrel. The action is a multi-lug bolt that acts much like the breech plug on an artillery piece. The bolt is removed by rotating it, and a single cartridge is placed under the extractor. The bolt is reinserted to load the weapon. This unusual system of loading results in a very short action and a slow, but very accurate, rate of fire. The Ranging Scope base described in the RAI 300 is used in the 500 model, usually with a very powerful telescopic sight, 24 power or greater. There is a harmonic balancer tuning fork contained in the bipod support underneath the barrel. The RAI 500 has reportedly been used by the U.S. Navy SEALs but little information has been released. The standard .50 caliber M2 and M33 ball will only give an 18 or 24 inch group respectively at 600 yards (45.7cm or 61cm at 549 meters) and will not reach the maximum accuracy available from the RAI 500. A specialized "match" grade of .50 caliber round is available and should be fired from the RAI 500 when used in the field. Accuracy with the standard military ammunition is acceptable in military sniping missions where the targets for a weapon of this power would normally be vehicles and aircraft.

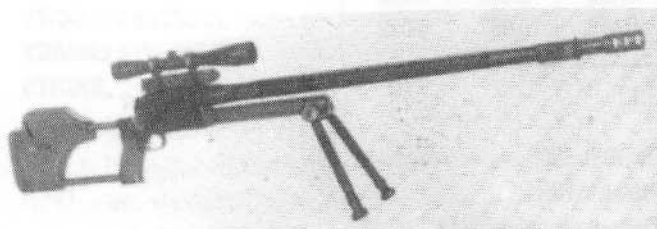

The HBAR, Heavy Barreled Automatic Rifle, is an interesting development from the M16A2 program. Initially, the M16A2 was to have a heavier barrel for its entire length but it was found that some accessories, most notably the M203 40mm grenade launcher, would not be able to clip onto the heavy barrel without modification. Because of the accessory problem, the full-length heavy barrel was dropped from the M16A2. In the HBAR model, the full length heavy barrel, 0.96 inch diameter up to the front sight, is returned to the M16A2 model with all of its advantages. The primary advantage is that the HBAR model can group its shots to 1 1/2 Minutes of Angle (MOA) against 2 to 3 MOA for the M16A2. The additional weight of the heavy barrel also adds to the stability and quick second-shot recovery of the weapon. The use of a telescopic sight as a standard sight also allows the DELTA HBAR to take advantage of the design's greater intrinsic accuracy. The high cheekpiece attached to the buttstock gives the shooter a solid head/cheek rest when using the telescopic sight. The unusual shape of the cheekpiece is dictated by the design of the rifle, with the cutout being needed to clear the cocking handle. As the civilian semiautomatic fire only version, the AR-15A2 Delta HBAR is receiving a good welcome from military match shooters as well as police departments because of its excellent accuracy. This accuracy results in the Delta HBAR being a practical sniper system out to approximately 300 meters.

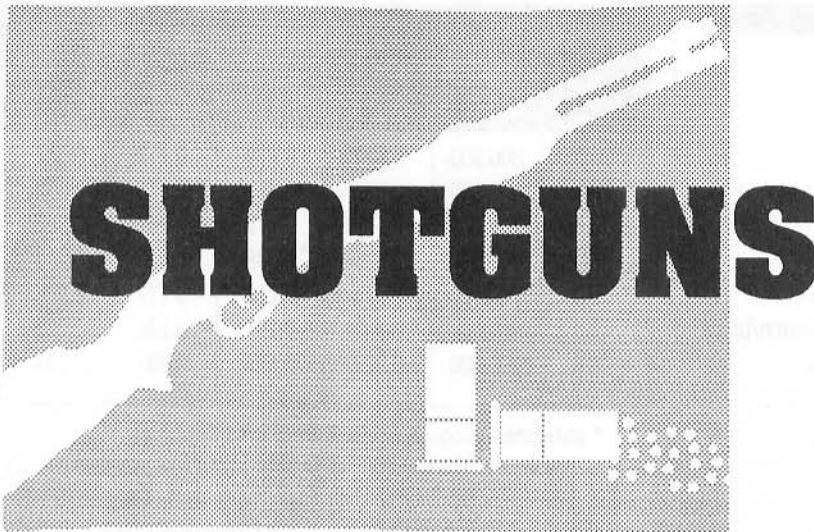

SHOTGUNS

The combat shotgun has long been recognized as an effective close-in fighting weapon in the United States with some military units of the Civil War Confederate Cavalry being armed solely with sawed-off double-barrel 12 gauges. The U.S. has issued shotguns for combat duty since World War One and they were highly valued by troops in the Pacific

Theater of World War Two as well as in the jungles of Vietnam. Police forces throughout North America have also valued the shotgun for its great psychological as well as physical effect. With the possible exception of Italy, shotguns have long been ignored as combat weapons in Europe, but this attitude has been changing in recent years.

The primary reason for the popularity of the fighting shotgun is its great destructive potential and flexibility. The destructiveness is due to the shotgun being able to launch a swarm of projectiles for each shot fired with each sub-projectile having lethal potential. The projectiles gradually spread into a circular pattern as they travel from the muzzle of the weapon with the circle becoming larger as the distance increases. At longer ranges, above 40 meters for most weapons, the circular pattern is so large that only a few or one projectile would hit a man-sized target. Close in, (under five meters), the projectiles would be so closely packed together that they would strike as a single mass and do tremendous damage. The speed at which the pattern opens

over distance is determined by the barrel length and the amount of choke which the barrel has. The shorter a barrel is, the more rapidly the shot will spread, although not at the great rate depicted in modern cinema. A very short barrel will still have all of its projectiles strike as a single mass at close range, but the muzzle blast and recoil will be very great and cause the weapon to be difficult to control. Choke is the constriction at the muzzle of a shotgun's barrel and the amount of this constriction is the degree of choke. "No Choke" is referred to as a cylinder with the maximum construction being called "full choke." Any constriction tighter than full choke tends to damage the shot as it is fired in addition to it being forced outward by the pressure of the shot passing through. Between the two extremes of cylinder and full choke, there is improved cylinder and modified, with additional grades for specific applications. Most combat shotguns have relatively short barrels for quick handling plus cylinder choke for quick shot spread.

The most common type of shotgun used today is the pump or slide action weapon

which has seen wide use and acceptance. Some of the limitations of the pump action are its requiring two hands for use as well as its being difficult to operate in a prone position. The semiautomatic shotgun is becoming more common with its ability to be operated with one hand from almost any position. The fast firepower of the semiautomatic has also led to a new idea in shotguns: that of the machine shotgun which is capable of full automatic fire. This class of weapon is still relatively new, but has seen some field use in the hands of combat troops. The United States Navy's Close Assault Weapon System (CAWS) trials are an attempt to combine the massive firepower of a selective fire shotgun with a new family of ammunition, making it combat effective on a single target at a range of 150 meters. In combination with the new weapon is a requirement for it to be loaded from removable box magazines, greatly increasing the speed of reloading the weapon over the cumbersome tubular magazine style loaded with single rounds. ●

This is an Italian design by the Luigi Franchi company that is marketed by the Heckler and Koch company of Germany. The Model 512 has been primarily sold to German police organizations with over 500 being sold. The outline of the weapon follows standard lines with a fixed stock and extended magazine. The major difference between the HK 512 and the original Franchi PG 80 is the addition of a two-to-one shot diverter on the muzzle of the HK weapon. The shot diverter changes the pattern of the shot from a simple circle to a vertical oval twice as tall as it is wide. The pattern works out to an oval with a vertical spread of 80 cm and a horizontal spread of 50 cm at 20 meters when fired with buckshot. The use of a vertical rather than horizontal spread increase allows the shotgun to be used in a hostage situation where a target could be taken out with less risk to innocent bystanders, and by simply firing with the weapon held on its side, allows a much greater probability of a hit on a single target.

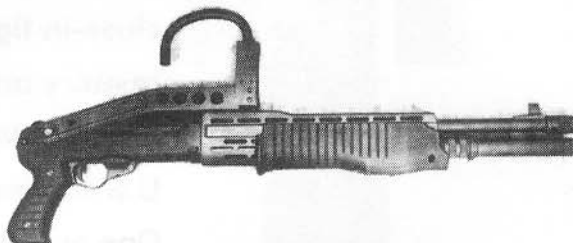

The SPAS 12 is a very unusual weapon both in appearance and action. SPAS stands for either Special Purpose Automatic Shotgun or Sporting Purpose Automatic Shotgun, depending on who the weapon is being sold to. The sporting purpose of this weapon is hard to see from its appearance as a massive weapon of very lethal intentions. The action of the SPAS can be switched from gas operated semiautomatic to pump action repeater by a simple action of the operator. When in the semiautomatic mode the weapon is capable of firing up to four rounds a second using the most powerful ammunition available. In the pump-action mode the act of operating the weapon can deter a situation and prevent escalation. In the pump action mode the SPAS can repeatedly fire rounds such as light shot or tear gas shells that would not have enough power to operate the weapon on semiautomatic. The barrel is threaded at the muzzle to accept a variety of accessories. The accessories include a grenade launcher for canister type grenades, an assortment of chokes, and a shot diverter much like the one on the HK 512, but one which can be rotated to put the long axis of the pattern horizontal or vertical. The folding stock locks solidly into position either open or closed. With the stock closed the SPAS can be hung over the seat of a vehicle by rotating the hook attachment. This same hook attachment acts as an arm brace with the stock unfolded and allows the SPAS to be controllably fired with only one hand. The mechanism is complex and takes some getting used to, but the SPAS operates effectively though it is quite heavy for its type. The tubular magazine is loaded from underneath the weapon, just in front of the trigger guard. The manufacturer states a qualified operator can load the seven round magazine in 15 seconds, giving the SPAS a rate of fire of 25 to 30 rounds per minute.

This is a modified version of the SPAS-12 intended primarily for military sales. The major change is the switch from a tubular magazine to a removable box magazine. Besides the obvious changes to accept the magazine, the gas operation system was placed over the barrel to shorten the distance that the shell must travel from the magazine to the barrel. The SPAS-12 system of semiautomatic and pump action is retained in the SPAS-15 and the mode of operation selected by a thumb switch on the top of the slide grip. This is one of the smallest large caliber shotguns presently being produced in Europe. The action is a straightforward manual pump action developed from the pump system used in the SPAS-12. There is a large safety switch on the forward right hand side of the trigger guard that can be easily operated by the firing finger. The two pistol grips allow for good control of the PA3215 with a fast second round recovery. The muzzle of the PA3 is threaded to accept the full line of Franchi shotgun accessories, choke tubes, diverters, and a canister grenade launcher, though the recoil with its use would be severe. The

folding stock locks into position, either open or closed, and may be easily removed to allow for maximum concealability of the weapon (such as under a coat during VIP protection). The psychological and physical effect of a shotgun is well known in the Americas but is just now being accepted in Europe. The PA3 design originates from Franchi in Italy where the shotgun has been used as a combat weapon for some years.

This is a pair of weapons developed for the military and police markets. The B4 model can be switched from a gas operated, semiautomatic mode to a manual pump action by a simple selection lever. Utilizing a unique system of recoil operation, the Benelli is the fastest operating semiautomatic shotgun available and is found in the hands of the British SAS, amongst other organizations. The speed of operation is a direct result of the recoil operation that uses the inertia of the bolt carrier to unlock the rotating bolt after pressures have dropped to a safe level, but before the weapon has reached full recoil. An expert operator is able to fire all eight shots before the first empty shell has hit the ground, under one second. Another result of this recoil action is the excellent reliability of operation for which the system is noted. The requirement for a recoil spring extending into the stock prevents any type of folding stock from being fitted to the M121. The receiver separates into an upper and lower section, easing cleaning and maintenance. The stocks are of walnut and are found to be somewhat

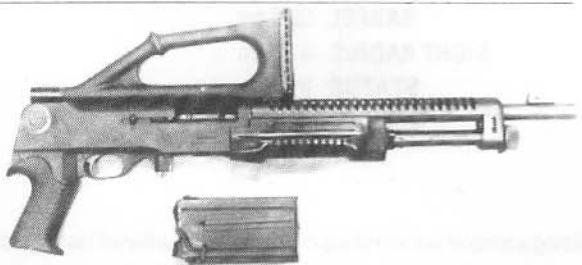

The M3P is most notable for being the first box magazine-fed shotgun to reach production status with a major arms manufacturer. The magazine is of standard layout, specially reinforced to withstand the shock of recoil without tearing free of the weapon. The action of the M3P can be easily switched from semiautomatic to manual pump action by the use of a locking ring at the front of the forend. 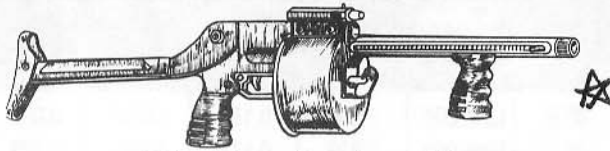

This unusual appearing weapon is a native design of South Africa and demonstrates a novel approach to enlarging a shotgun's magazine capacity. The Striker acts as a large revolver, firing in a semiautomatic mode and feeding from a spring wound drum. The result of this spring-assisted mechanical action is that the Striker will operate repeatedly, regardless of what load of shotshell is used. The enclosed rotating drum acts as the cylinder of an old style single action revolver, carrying all the ammunition in individual chambers. The drum rotates through the use of a radially wound spring and indexes on each pull of the trigger. As the drum does not finally align until the last ten percent of the trigger pull, accidental firings from dropping or careless handling are minimized. A drawback of the drum system is that each round has to be hand fed into an individual chamber while indexing the drum with the trigger while the safety is on. Each fired shell is also ejected by hand, using the long ejector rod on the right side of the barrel. The result of this is a twelve round weapon of excellent reliability that can fire all of its rounds in three seconds and be reloaded, empties ejected and fresh rounds inserted, in under thirty seconds. The design of the cylinder system prevents easily "topping up", that is reloading a partially empty cylinder, and this acts as something of a drawback in general combat conditions.

This is one of the two primary candidates for the U.S. Close Assault Weapons System and is a cooperative design between Heckler and Koch for the weapon and Olin for the ammunition. Heckler and Koch have chosen a bullpup layout to give a short, maneuverable overall length while still allowing for a sufficient barrel length for high velocity. The action is recoil operated and carried inside a multi-piece, reinforced plastic shell. With the action sealed inside the shell, it is protected from dirt that could cause jams, greatly adding to the design's overall reliability. The magazine is located behind the pistol grip which slows reloading somewhat but not a significant amount. The selector switch is in the pistol grip where it can be reached by the operator's thumb. The original design was capable of full automatic fire and this is what the CAWS is known for. However, the new design is semiautomatic but offers full auto fire as an option. The ammunition developed by Olin is a specialized 12 gauge (19.5 x 76mm B) all-brass belted case of a much higher chamber pressure than normal shotgun ammunition. The intent of the belted case is to prevent its use in standard weapons as well as adding strength to the design. Several loads are being developed with the best known being an eight pellet load of 000 buckshot. The high velocity of the weapon gives the buckshot load an effective range of 150 meters, more than triple the normal range. The HK design is able to fire both the specialized 19.5 x 76mm B round, and with minor changes, fire 12 gauge 3 inch magnum loads for training. One of the several sight systems being considered is a 1 power optical sight built into the handle. The reticle of the optical sight is a black ring that is very fast to pick up on the target and sized so that it can also be used for rough range estimation.

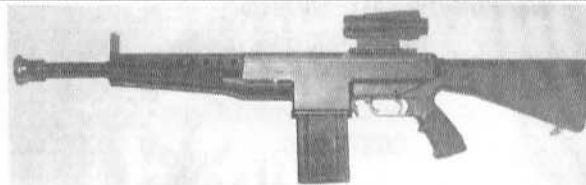

The AAI CAWS candidate is developed from earlier research performed by AAI for a 20mm weapon. The round used by AAI is an all plastic cartridge case using eight flechettes as the projectile. Earlier use of flechette shotgun shells in Vietnam found that, though the flechettes would be more destructive than buckshot at ranges from 30 to 100 meters, at ranges closer than 30 meters, the flechette had not yet stabilized for point-first flight and would cause little lethal damage. The new round developed for the CAWS weapon utilizes a drag-cone stabilization that gives the projectiles point-first stable flight from the muzzle to the target. To give the weapon an effective range of 150 meters, the chamber pressure of the rounds are much greater than normal 12 gauge ammunition so that the new round is slightly too large to fit into a regular shotgun. Use of an adaptor however, allows the AAI-CAWS to fire standard 12 gauge buckshot ammunition. The design of the CAWS is along standard rifle lines with the line of recoil kept low and in line with the stock to lessen muzzle climb on full automatic. The result of the stock design, combined with the weapon's recoil operated action and effective muzzle brake, is to give the CAWS the felt recoil of an M16 rifle. Even with the stock removed, the AAI CAWS may be effectively fired. A special reflex optical sight has been developed for use with the CAWS for fast target acquisition in a combat situation. Standard iron sights are also fitted for backup. The twelve round box magazine and full auto fire capability gives the CAWS maximum close-in firepower with a reload time of five seconds for a fresh, loaded magazine.

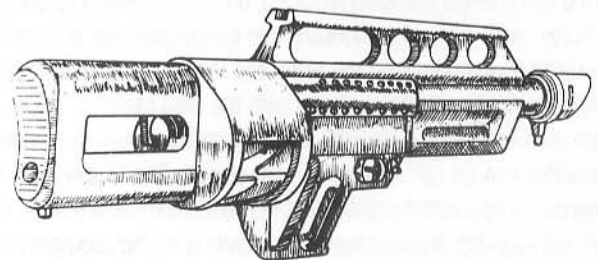

The Jackhammer is a new approach to solving the heating problem in a full automatic shotgun. When the heat from firing quickly builds up, such as during periods of rapid fire in combat or long bursts of full auto fire, the shotgun develops problems unique to the weapon. Most modern shotshells are made mainly of plastic for cost and waterproofing and the plastic can melt in a very hot chamber, acting as a glue and causing a very serious jam when another shell is chambered. In the HK and AAI CAWS, the ammunition is made either of metal or fiber-reinforced plastic and they do not have the melting round problem. The Jackhammer is intended to use standard shotgun shells which are carried in a cassette that acts as both magazine and firing chamber. The loaded cassette is placed behind the pistol grip in the bullpup design with the handguard in front of the pistol grip being pulled forward, then back to lock the round in place. When the weapon is fired, gas is tapped from the barrel to drive a piston and the barrel forward against a spring. The "Autobolt" attached to the barrel rotates the cassette half the distance to index a fresh round, and, as the spring drives the barrel rearward, finishes indexing a fresh round with the barrel. As the barrel inserts into the chamber and the opening casing seals the barrel, no gas leaks and the system runs efficiently. When the fired cases are removed with the used cassette, the waste heat goes with them, removing the heat problem from the weapon. Cassettes can be reloaded easily and reused. The trigger is of the progressive type with a slight pull giving semiautomatic fire and a long pull, full auto fire. A decocking/cocking lever is on the Jackhammer to allow the striker to be safely lowered on a loaded chamber and silently cocked immediately before use. The majority of the weapon and its cassettes are made of Rynite plastic for strength and light weight. The sights are of the notch-post type and are protected by the sides of the carrying handle. The inline design and operating system of the Jackhammer give it good control on full automatic fire.

The Remington 1100 was the first successful gas operated semiautomatic shotgun to see wide commercial acceptance. The gas system utilizes a piston that surrounds the magazine tube and fits into a short chamber attached to the barrel. The piston has a short operating stroke that works from a metered amount of gas, tapped off the barrel. The result of this system of operation is that the magazine tube is able to be extended, eliminating the limitations of earlier gas systems. The action is also very fast operating and somewhat self adjusting, allowing the 1100 to reliably operate with a wide range of loads. In short barreled form, the Remington 1100 is very popular among combat shooters and police agencies, usually with an extended magazine. The placement of the action spring behind the receiver prevents the attachment of a folding stock.

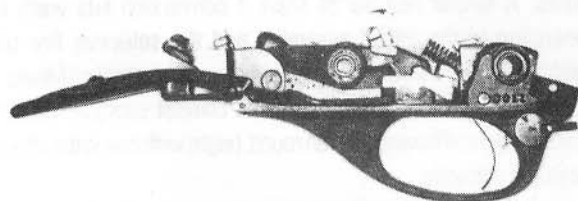

The Remington 7188 was a modification of the Remington 1100 for military use specifically as a selective fire weapon. Developed during the Vietnam war, the 7188 has the distinction of being the first successful, though limited, machine shotgun to see military use. British experience in Malaysia indicated that a full automatic shotgun would be of great use in a unconventional warfare situation and the 7188 was developed to test the theory. The standard Model 1100 was fitted with a modified trigger assembly and was otherwise unchanged. The trigger assembly has a switch in place of the safety that had a lever on the left hand side. The switch is rotated rearward for full automatic, forward for semiautomatic, and straight down for safety. The successful trials of the 7188 resulted in a limited number of 7188 Mark 1's being developed and manufactured. The Mark 1 is very much more military in appearance and intent. The barrel was fitted with rifle sights, a perforated handguard surrounded the upper part of the barrel, and a magazine tube extension was fitted to underneath the muzzle. The extension was also able to mount the M7 (M16 rifle) bayonet. A number of 7188 Mark 1's were made with the weapons having a dull parkerized finish, a rubber recoil pad, and plain walnut

stocks. A further number of Mark 1 conversion kits were made consisting of the barrel assembly and the selective fire trigger mechanism. The conversion kit would allow any standard Model 1100 to be converted into a short barreled combat shotgun, capable of selective fire and having a seven round, (eight with one in the chamber), magazine capacity.

The Sidewinder is a conversion of the Remington 1100 to make it a more versatile weapon. The conversion centers around moving the action spring from behind the action to around the magazine tube behind the gas piston. The result of this movement of the spring is that the Sidewinder is able to be fitted with either a pistol grip or a telescoping stock. The SW-PC model of the Sidewinder is the shortest model available. Intended for situations where size is a major consideration but controlled rapid firepower is a need, the SW-PC has a short barrel with a normal sized magazine and a pistol grip. A quick detachable stud and rigid loop are fitted to the SW-PC so that it can be hung from a sling or on a shoulder harness underneath a coat. A special telescoping stock has been developed for the Sidewinder that is a very strong design and will stand up to the severest abuse. The U.S. Navy has adopted the Sidewinder for use by some of its unconventional warfare units. The stock adds 1.338 kilograms to the weight of the Sidewinder SW-PC.

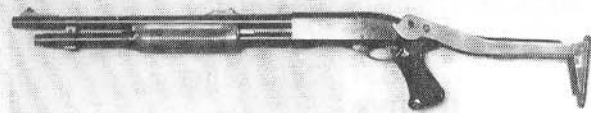

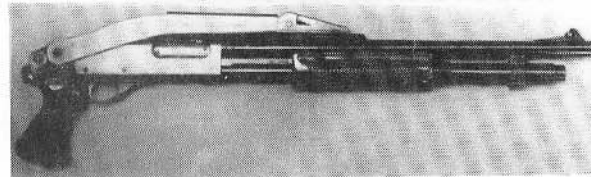

The 870 was the first post World War II pump action design, developed by Remington and first sold in 1950. Using principles tested in earlier weapons, the 870 is particularly rugged and reliable. The action of the 870 has the bolt locking solidly to the barrel by a locking block through the barrel extension. With the locking block doing most of the work and the bolt acting as the housing, the receiver is made lighter than earlier designs but still very strong for the job it performs. The bolt fits on a slide that is moved by the twin action bars attached to the reciprocating forearm. The barrel of the 870 is locked to the weapon by a barrel ring that surrounds the magazine tube. The manner of barrel attachment allows for easily changed barrels and does not cover the end of the magazine tube. With the end of the magazine tube open, magazine extensions could be added and Remington started offering extended tube magazines in the mid 1960's using designs developed for the Remington 7188. In 1972 a significant accessory was developed for the 870, the folding stock. Originally only available to police and military agencies, the folding stock has a full pistol grip and a formed steel stock that folds over the top of the weapon with the buttplate pivoting to lie flat. The 870 P described in the data is the folding stock model with an extended seven round magazine, giving eight rounds with one in the chamber. The folding stock locks into position either open or closed and the weapon can be operated with the stock folded but the sights are blocked.

In 1966, the U.S. Marine Corps put out a requirement for a new combat shotgun. The Remington 870 was modified to meet their requirements and was accepted as the best combination of firepower and reliability. The modifications include an extended seven round magazine tube with a large bayonet adaptor attaching the tube to the barrel of the muzzle. The adaptor allows the weapon to mount the M7 bayonet with the ring of the bayonet surrounding the end of the magazine tube. Next to the Remington 870, the Ithaca Model 37 is the most common shotgun found in U.S. police armories. First marketed in 1937, the Model 37 is made from a solid billet of steel machined for the receiver and most internal parts, resulting in great strength. The barrel is also made from a bar of solid stock first machined and then rotary forged, making an extremely strong barrel which is very resistant to damage. The action of the M37 utilizes bottom ejection giving the receiver one opening for both loading and ejection. With ejection going out the bottom, the weapon is easily used by right or left handed shooters. Generally, the action of the Model 37 is very reliable and positive in functioning but the bottom of the receiver has to be held above any obstacles to allow for clear ejection. A major point in the M37's design is the lack of a disconnecter although one can be added as an option. The lack of a disconnecter allows the weapon to fire when the bolt closes if the trigger is held back. The result of this is that the weapon can be rapidly fired by holding back the trigger and quickly working the action, giving the M37 the highest rate of fire for a pump action shotgun. In the late 1960's Ithaca recognized the need for extending the magazine capacity of the M37 and modified the weapon accordingly. The barrel is attached to the M37 by an interrupted thread at the breech and a lug that fits over the magazine tube, locked in place by a stud on the magazine cup. The method of barrel attachment requires the barrel lug to be moved further on the barrel to allow the

magazine tube to be extended. The model described in the data for military and police sales is the eight shot model with the long magazine tube holding seven rounds. The barrel of a given magazine length cannot be changed to one of a different length with the drawback giving a very strong magazine tube.

The Stakeout is a line of modified M37 shotguns intended to give maximum firepower in a minimum sized package. Available in two calibers, 12 or 20 gauge, the Stakeout has the barrel shortened to just in front of the barrel lug with the weapon retaining the four round magazine tube. The pistol grip has two sling swivels, one at the top and one at the bottom. With a simple loop having a snap connector, the Stakeout can be slung from the shoulder underneath a coat or jacket and be quickly drawn into firing position. The strap underneath the operating slide prevents the hand from slipping in front of the muzzle while firing. The twenty gauge is much more controllable in a weapon of this size, with the twelve gauge giving a massive muzzle blast and recoil rise. The lighter recoil of the twenty gauge gives a much faster recovery time and allows quick engagement of multiple targets. The Stakeout is presently the only production version of what was referred to as a "Whippet" gun made in the U.S.A.

This is the largest caliber commercially made semiautomatic shotgun available today. Chambered for the 10 gauge 3 1/2 inch magnum round, the Roadblocker is a very large and heavy weapon. Intended for use at roadblocks where it would not be carried for long periods of time, the large shot load or slugs fired by the weapon would quickly disable fleeing vehicles. The gas system is made of stainless steel minimizing corrosion. The placement of the gas system at the front of the magazine tube limits the magazine capacity to two rounds, three with one in the chamber. Another aspect of the gas system is its counter-recoil design, called "countercoil" by the manufacturer. This accounts for some of the length of the system in the magazine tube but it is outweighed by the lowering of the recoil impulse.

The Mossberg M500 series is a standard-layout line of economically priced pump action shotguns. The basic M500 action has a bolt locked to a short barrel extension by a rising locking block. With the barrel and locking block absorbing the energy of firing, the receiver can be made of lightweight metal, and in the M500, the receiver is made from an aluminum aircraft-alloy forging. The bolt has twin extractors to insure positive extraction as well as twin action bars connecting the bolt to the operating slide. The lifter that transfers a shell from the magazine to the barrel is of a skeleton design to allow a misfeed to be quickly cleared and lifts the shell to a level in line with the chamber for a smooth feed. The barrel is held to the action by a lug that fits over the end of the magazine and locks into it by a threaded stud. The attachment of the barrel prevents magazines from being extended so Mossberg offers two magazine capacities, the ATP 6 with a five round capacity magazine, and the ATP 8 with a seven round magazine. To accommodate the magazine tubes, the ATP 6 model has an eighteen inch barrel and the ATP 8 has a twenty inch barrel. The safety on the M500 is placed at the top rear of the receiver for quick activation by the thumb of the shooter's hand.

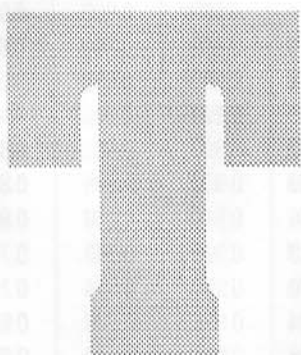

MACHINEGUNS



The development of the modern machinegun began in the middle 1800's with Dr. Richard Gatling's invention of a manually-operated repeating weapon. The Gatling gun used a number of rotating barrels, powered by a hand crank, for loading, firing, and extracting cartridges. Though the Gatling was used more as artillery (rather than the modern auto-weapon's role of direct support) it was a superbly practical design. In the 1960's when the armed services sought a high rate-of-fire design, the Gatling gun was reborn in the form of the Minigun and subsequent multi-barrel weapons.

Hiram Maxim is responsible for the creation of the first true machinegun, in which the power of the cartridge is used to operate the action. Weapons of this design were heavy, water-cooled guns, capable of sustained fire from long, linked-ammunition belts.

Between the wars, the invention of the Lewis gun and BAR introduced the concept of the light machinegun. A light machinegun is one that can be carried and operated by one man. During WW 2, the Germans established the general purpose machinegun concept with their MG-34 and 42. General purpose machineguns can be used as light MGs or mounted on tripods for sustained firing as a medium support machinegun. The world's major armies are presently armed with general purpose machineguns (the United States Army's M-60 is a typical example), and the trend is towards lighter calibers for individual use. ●

This is the light machinegun version of the AUG weapons system. Using the standard action/buttstock group, a special heavy barrel is mounted on the weapon with the barrel having a folding bipod mounted at the muzzle. The barrel is of a greater diameter than the standard AUG barrels with the additional metal acting as a heat sink, allowing for greater sustained fire. To take advantage of the greater fire potential, the HBAR AUG is normally used with the longer forty-two round magazine which is made of a translucent plastic, allowing the rounds to be seen. A specialized muzzle compensator is mounted on the heavy barrel to reduce recoil and minimize muzzle climb. The normal telescopic sight/receiver handle may be used on the HBAR but more often, a different receiver housing is used that has a standard telescope mount. When the weapon is using the scope mount receiver housing, the identification has a -T following the HBAR designation. The scope mounting will accept all standard sighting devices with

the model listed in the data above using the 6 power ZF-69 telescopic sight offered by the manufacturer. Another aspect of using a high power telescopic sight is the advantage that can be taken of the inherent accuracy of the AUG's closed bolt firing, combined with the heavy barrel's stability.

This weapon, also known as the MAG-58, is the most popular general purpose machine gun used in the Western world today. Developed during the late 1950's, the MAG is a very rugged design with the receiver being made of milled slabs of steel solidly riveted together. Most of the internal parts are also machined from solid stock, resulting in a very strong weapon which is made with precision fitting of the parts. The barrel bore and parts of the gas system are chromium plated to minimize wear and corrosion. The gas system is easily and quickly adjusted by the gunner to give more operating power to the weapon, keeping it reliable in difficult conditions. The air-cooled barrel has an integral carrying handle that is also used to quickly change the barrel and maintain a sustained rate of fire without damaging accuracy. With the MAG firing from the open bolt position, the problem of cook-off is eliminated but the manufacturer still recommends changing the barrel every 200 rounds when firing at the maximum rate. The front sight is completely adjustable, allowing all the barrels of a specific weapon to be zeroed to that weapon's particular characteristics. The folding bipod is securely attached to the gas piston tube and locks securely in the open or closed position. When firing the MAG from the ground, the bipod is solidly attached to the gas piston tube and locks securely in the open or closed position. When firing the MAG from the hip, the bipod can be folded and in this position acts as a front handgrip. The wooden buttstock is removable, allowing the MAG to be used on a variety of vehicle mounts where overall length is a consideration. A very reliable and successful design, the MAG is finding wide sales with the world's militaries.

Recently adopted by the U.S. armed forces as their new squad level automatic weapon, the Minimi is a small light machinegun which is capable of either belt or magazine feed. Chambered for the 5.56 x 45mm NATO round, the Minimi is normally loaded with a 200 round container that clips underneath the weapon and feeds a metallic link belt into the feed well in the left side of the weapon. An alternate magazine well is underneath the belt feed opening and will accept any size M16 magazine. When a magazine is inserted, the belt feed mechanism is automatically disengaged and the weapon switches to feeding from the magazine. The gas operation system has two settings, one for normal operation and a second, allowing more gas to be tapped from the barrel, for additional power to function in adverse conditions. When changed to the adverse setting, the Minimi fires at a higher than normal rate of fire and this can put excessive wear on the weapon. The receiver is made from precision stampings for lightness with many of the parts being machined forgings to help lower costs and speed production. The barrel is chromium lined to limit corrosion and extend its service life. There is a quick release catch on the barrel as well as a carrying handle to speed barrel changes and increase sustained fire. The bipod will fold underneath the gas system and latch into the front handguard. Inside the removable handguard is a cleaning kit which is sufficient to maintain the weapon. Another feature is a removable triggerguard that allows the Minimi to be fired when the operator wears heavy gloves.

This is the latest model of the HK21 series of light machineguns directly developed from the G3 rifle. The same roller delayed blowback system is used in the 21E as in all the major HK weapons with a considerable commonality of parts between the HK21E and the G3 series. The operation of the 21E is also of the standard Heckler and Koch pattern with additions to satisfy the role of light machinegun. The major addition, besides the belt feed, is the quick change barrel system. The very heavy barrel can be quickly unlocked and drawn to the rear of the barrel housing with the weapon being supported by the

bipod attached to the front bearing. A vertical front grip is also attached to the bottom of the barrel housing as an assist for hip firing. The belt feed mechanism takes several types of metallic belts and is easily removable to allow attachment of accessories that enable the HK21E to use G3 rifle magazines. The new trigger mechanism allows for semiautomatic, three round controlled bursts, and full automatic fire to be selected. The pistol grip of the new trigger housing also holds a cleaning kit for weapons maintenance. To make use of the inherent accuracy of the HK system, the sight radius is lengthened from earlier designs and a new rear sight is fitted of the drum type, adjustable to 1200 meters. The receiver has also been lengthened by 94mm from earlier models, to add to the sight radius along with increasing weapon reliability. The unusual buttstock is designed to be held in the European manner. The accepted hold is for the left hand to hold the underside flat of the stock against the shoulder with the weight of the weapon being supported by the bipod.

This weapon is a direct descendant of the German MG 42 developed during World War II. The MG 42 first used the roller-locking system that was later developed into the G3 rifle series but in the MG 42, the barrel is actually locked to the bolt by rollers and the system operates by short recoil with a gas assist at the muzzle. With the bolt to the rear, a handle at the right side of the barrel housing can be pushed forward and out so that the barrel will be withdrawn to the side and rear of the weapon in a very short time. This system of barrel change gives the operator the fastest changing time available without an assistant. In 1959, the new Federal German army adopted the MG 42 in 7.62 NATO as the MG 42/59. Later modifications resulted in the MG3 which has received wide sales and use. The 550 gram bolt of the MG3 results in a 1200 round per minute cyclic rate of fire and there is an optional 950 gram bolt available that reduces the cyclic rate to a more manageable 900 rounds per minute.

Utilizing proven principals in a modern package, the Ultimax is a very light weight weapon of rugged and durable design with high firepower and easy handling. To eliminate difficulties in handling long belts of ammunition, the Ultimax uses a drum magazine with the largest holding 100 rounds. Since the weapon is chambered for the 5.56 x 45mm round, a large capacity drum is feasible without being too heavy or cumbersome. Besides the drum, slightly modified M16 magazines may also be used. Arguments that the drum prevents sustained firing are answered by the fact the drum can be changed by one man on the run in under five seconds and a drum pack, holding four 100 round drums, is only 14 inches long and weighs 7.20kg. The operation system is a straight forward gas system with the piston above the barrel to help keep the line of recoil low, assisting in controlling full automatic fire. The gas system also has an easily adjustable regulator that can increase power to operate the weapon in adverse conditions or cut the gas flow off to allow rifle grenades to be launched from the flash suppressor. The folding bipod is attached to the front of the receiver assembly and, when unfolded, allows the weapon to roll or swivel through a 30 degree arc. Another unusual feature is a bayonet lug on the barrel, allowing the Ultimax to mount the M7 bayonet from the M16 rifle. The overall design of the Ultimax results in a very stable, reliable weapon, capable of holding the burst of an entire magazine on a small target. The Ultimax 100 Mark III is the lightest 5.56mm machinegun available on today's market and the weapon is being closely examined by a number of elite units. With the quick-change barrel, an unusual accessory has become available: a suppressed barrel with a 14 inch effective length and an integral suppressor mounted on the muzzle, giving the barrel the overall length of a standard model. The Ameli is a new design from CETME of Spain and greatly resembles a reduced MG3 (which is also produced by CETME). Internally, the Ameli uses the roller-delayed system of retarded blowback perfected by CETME and widely seen in the Heckler and Koch weapons. The frame of the weapon is made of stampings reinforced by plastic castings for the buttstock and pistol grip. The bolt and other internal parts are made from machined forgings with the result being an easily mass-produced weapon of low cost. An interesting feature of the Ameli is the barrel change mechanism. By grasping the front part of the upper carrying handle/rear sight, a catch may be unlocked, allowing the front part of the handle to rotate to the right, unlocking the barrel. By first pushing the barrel forward, it may be slid back from the right side of the barrel housing and a new barrel inserted in its place. Another interesting point of the Ameli is that by changing the firing pin carrier of the bolt (a simple procedure), the rate of fire can be changed to either 850 or 1200 rounds per minute, the rate of fire being inscribed on the body of the carrier. Metal ammunition boxes are available that hold either 100 or 200 rounds of ammunition. The Ameli is a very compact and reliable design, easily maintained in the field. The weapon strips down into 7 components including a 100 round ammunition box and these parts will fit inside a standard briefcase. The weapon can be assembled, loaded, and fired within 20 seconds of opening the case.

The L86A1 is a slightly modified version of the L85A1 assault rifle and is intended to give supporting fire as a squad level automatic weapon. To fulfill its intended purpose, the L86A1 has a long heavy barrel to absorb some of the heat of firing. The barrel is covered along its bottom side by a long support to which a folding bipod attaches just below the muzzle. A slight change to the action allows the L86A1 to fire from the open bolt for additional cooling when fired on full automatic and to fire from the closed bolt position for greater accuracy when firing on semiautomatic. A vertical rear grip and folding shoulder support on the buttstock assist in stabilizing the weapon for full auto fire. In spite of the modifications, the L86A1 shares over 80 percent of its parts with the L85A1 rifle and is also issued with the SUSAT four power telescopic sight as standard equipment.

This is the standard general purpose machinegun used in the U.S. armed forces and has been made since the late 1950's. The M60 uses a straightforward gas operation system with a large gas cylinder and piston assembly attached to the barrel. The barrel is a quick change type but has some serious drawbacks. The gas cylinder and folding bipod are both attached to the barrel greatly increasing both the cost of the barrel as well as its weight. The bipod being attached to the barrel requires the weapon to be supported while the barrel is changed, normally needing an assistant gunner. The carrying handle is attached to the weapon with there being no sure grip on the hot barrel so a special asbestos mitten is issued with the spare barrel to aid in changing it. The feed system of the M60 uses a metallic link belt and is copied from the German MG 42. The operating rod/bolt system is also copied from a World War II German design, the FG-42. The large forearm assembly greatly assists in the M60 being hip fired and a strong operator is able to shoulder and fire the weapon like a rifle. The long length of service of the M60 has resulted in a number of improvements which have added to the strength and reliability of the weapon. Ammunition for the M60 is normally packaged in 100 round belts contained in a pack that can be attached to the left hand side of the weapon. The pack also has a shoulder strap allowing several to be easily carried by the gunner.

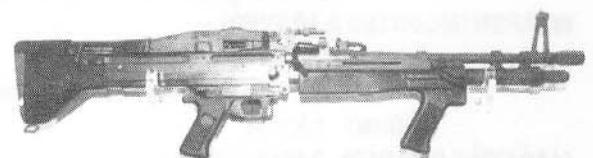

This is a modified version of the M60 machinegun and is a considerably lighter and more flexible weapon. The large forearm of the M60 is replaced with a smaller forearm with a vertical grip for control. The bipod has been lightened and moved from the barrel and attached to the receiver on the same mounting that holds the forearm. The barrel has been considerably lightened and is of a smaller diameter with a redesigned flash hider. The carrying handle has been moved to the barrel where it can be used to change a hot barrel, eliminating the need for an insulated glove. There are two lengths of barrel available, one of standard length, and a shortened barrel with the front sight moved to just in front of the gas piston and the flash hider attached in front of the sight. In the U.S. Navy, which has adopted the M60E3, each weapon is issued with both a long and short barrel. The front sight is now adjustable allowing each barrel to be zeroed to an specific receiver, something that could not be done on the earlier M60. The

internal mechanism has been modified for additional safety as well as increased reliability, and a more comfortable pistol grip mounted on the trigger mechanism. The trigger guard has been changed so that it can be folded out of the way to allow the trigger to be pulled while wearing gloves. 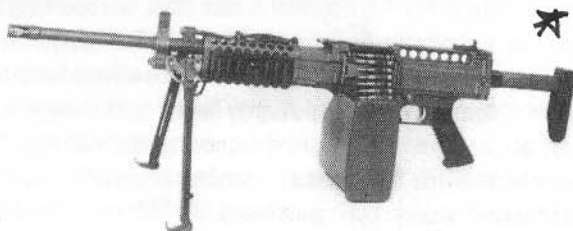

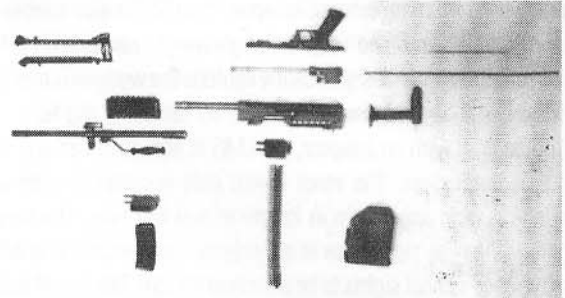

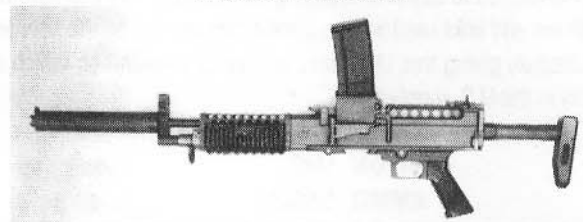

This is the new light machinegun design out of Ares, Inc. in Port Clinton, Ohio and is referred to by some as the "New Stoner," after Eugene Stoner, president of Ares and chief designer of the weapon. Firing from the open bolt position, this LMG is a very rugged and lightweight design which is capable of a wide range of applications.

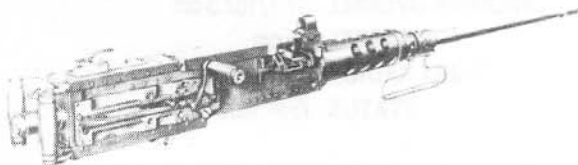
Normally fired from its removable bipod, the LMG is also usable as a heavy rifle with the bipod folded. A lightweight barrel with a large muzzle compensator that significantly lightens the weapon is available, but it also cuts down on sustained fire. By removing the feed cover and replacing it with an adaptor, the LMG is able to utilize any of the M16 type magazines. The stock layout aids in controllability when firing and is also adjustable in length to suit the firer. The forward portion of the rear sight base is an integral sight mount that allows many types of optical sights to be attached for use. The barrel is of the quick release type with a fixed headspace and an integral folding handle attached to assist in changing a hot barrel. The ammunition containers and links used are the same as those used by the MINIMI machinegun, giving this LMG easy access to ammunition which is already in the U.S. supply chain.

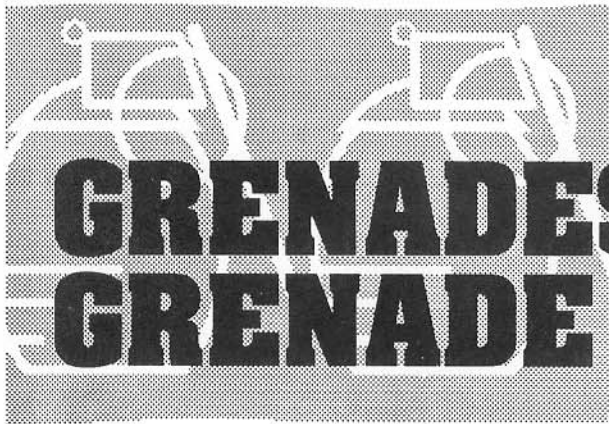

This is a massive weapon, just short of being in the machine-cannon class. Originally adopted in 1923 and modified to the M2 configuration in 1933, the M2HB has been improved several times during its service life and is presently the oldest operational design still seeing first line service. The M2 operates on the short recoil principle with the bolt locked to the barrel with the entire assembly moving backwards a short distance while recoiling. The bolt is unlocked by a cam and the barrel returns to battery while the bolt continues its rearward motion. While moving forward, the bolt recocks the firing pin, picks up a fresh loaded round and ejects the empty out the bottom of the receiver. A mechanism will lock the bolt to the rear after each shot, allowing semiautomatic fire if desired. If full automatic fire is desired, the mechanism may easily be locked out of operation and the bolt moves freely. A simple change of parts will allow the M2 to feed ammunition from the right or left sides. The cocking lever is also easily moved from one side to the other. The result of this is a simple mounting of twin M2's parallel to each other, one operating and feeding from the left side, the other from the right. The heavy barrel is unscrewed to change it and the headspace should be adjusted each time the barrel is changed. New weapons may have a quick change barrel system that uses a fixed headspace and this new option can be retrofitted to older weapons. The .50 M2 has a tremendous amount of power for a ground mounted weapon, but is quite heavy. The M2 must be fired from some type of mounting and a three man crew is able to move the weapon, tripod, and a limited amount of ammunition by man-packing it. Regardless of its drawbacks, the M2HB is a very powerful and almost unbelievably rugged weapon that will be seeing service for some years to come.

GRENADES & GRENADE LAUNCHERS

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mall pottery and metal jars were among the first hand-held weapons using black powder as an explosive. Though they have no definite date of invention, various hand-thrown bombs were in use by the 14th century.

Because of undependable performance, grenades had fallen out of use in the first quarter of the 1800's.

Before and during WW 1, there was a resurgence in the use of grenades. Now, every military group (and many paramilitary police) make use of the varied types of modern grenades: blast(offensive), fragmentation, smoke, incendiary, gas, stun, illuminating, and anti-tank.

The grenade launcher family of weapons includes rifle grenades, 30 mm/40 mm cartridge grenade launchers, and smoothbore shell launchers (usually for tear gas). Invented near the end of WW 1 to give greater grenade throwing range to the infantryman, rifle grenade launchers consist of a clamped tube or muzzle modification that directs the gas of a blank cartridge to drive the grenade, which has been slid over the launcher. Modern rifle grenades have a "bullet trap" at their base, allowing standard ball ammo to be used.

The more recent (1960's) launchers in 30 mm/40 mm actually fire a small shell from a rifled barrel. This sort of grenade has a far greater range and accuracy than the rifle-launched ones. The last type, tear gas guns, are the shortest-ranged weapons of the group. They use fin-stabilized projectiles because of their unrifled barrels. ●

This is an improved version of earlier designs and is presently the standard issue hand grenade for the Austrian armed forces as well as seeing good export sales. There are two versions of this grenade, the HG-78 fragmentation grenade and the OFF HG 78 offensive blast grenade with no fragmentation. In the HG 78, the plastic body is made of a cast matrix, holding 5,500 steel balls surrounded by a thermoplastic shell for physical strength. When the explosive filler detonates, the balls fly out at a high velocity as lethal fragments. The fragmentation is controlled by the type of explosive, an explosive waveshaper to control the detonation, and the strength of the matrix holding the balls. The small

size, 2.0–2.3mm diameter, and weight of the fragments also serve to limit their lethal range. At close ranges (5 meters or less), there are over 28 fragments per square meter, with no perforating fragments at 20 meters. The OFF HG 78 has a smooth outer shell and produces no fragments. The fuse is of the familiar bouchon pull ring and safety lever type with some noticeable improvements. The body of the fuse is cast plastic and has a number of retaining clips that hold the ring of the safety pin against the body of the fuse. The fly-off lever is shrouded over the top of the fuse and designed so that it must be released over a 50 degree arc to activate the fuse. The point of the safety pin is also covered by the fuse body, preventing it from snagging while being carried.

This is a miniaturized fragmentation grenade intended for use at close quarters such as house-to-house or in other situations where the power of a full sized grenade would be excessive. This is one member of a family of rifle grenades produced by MECAR of Belgium and widely sold throughout the world. The main advantage of the MECAR grenades is that they do not require the use of a special blank launching cartridge but may be launched with a bulletted round. The BTU in the grenade's designation indicates it is fitted with the Bullet Trap Universal which allows any regular ball round, either 5.56 or 7.62mm caliber, to be safely used to launch the grenade. The internal diameter of the tail assembly is 22mm which will fit over any NATO

standard grenade launcher or flash suppressor for launching. The fuze arms on setback when the grenade is launched, has a built in safety that delays arming until the grenade has traveled at least five meters, and will not fully arm until the grenade has traveled 15 meters. After it is armed, the fuze will function on impact with the grenade's tail fins insuring a nose-first strike. The upper body of the M262 contains the explosive and the interior of the body is notched to provide controlled fragmentation of the body into about 300 fragments.

This is a rocket assisted long range rifle grenade intended to be a possible replacement for light mortars. The M287 uses the MECAR bullet trap, allowing standard rifles using ball ammunition to launch the grenade at low velocity. Immediately after launch, a rocket motor ignites and propels the grenade to a high velocity, greatly extending its range. The four fins which stabilize the grenade in flight are spring loaded and can be unfolded before firing or held in place by a light cylinder which slips off when the grenade is launched. The fuze starts to arm after it has traveled 15 meters from launch and is fully armed 25 meters from launch. The body of the grenade is internally serrated to control breakup of the casing into at least 500 fragments. This is an unusual grenade developed in France and sold commercially by the Ruggieri company. The grenade has a plastic body that does not fragment and a flash compound filler that does not cause blast damage. When the grenade fires, it creates an intense dazzling flash of light that lasts for a few hundredths of a second. The dazzle effect on a group of targets will last up to two minutes, preventing any sighted action on the part of the targets. The effects are temporary and wear off completely within a few hours. This is one of the earliest available stun grenades and was reportedly used by GSG-9 at the Mogadishu rescue. The grenade is a canister type, carrying eight submunitions that it ejects out of the top. The body of the grenade holds the fuze and acts as the carrier for the submunitions. It will cause no dangerous fragmentation when the grenade functions. When the pull ring is removed and the safety lever released, the bouchon type fuze ignites a short 2.5 second delay. At the end of the delay, the eight submunitions eject from the top of the body as the fuze and cover blow away. Each of the submunitions is a cardboard cased thunderflash that is self-propelled and has a very short fuze. Each of the thunderflashes flies off in a random pattern and flashes after a 0.5 second delay. The flashes are each 175 to 185 decibels and several hundred thousand candelas in intensity with the cardboard cases harmlessly disintegrating. The thunderflashes are carefully engineered to be above the temporary disabling level but not of such intensity as to cause permanent physical damage. The blast and shock causes temporary psycho- and physiological disorientation, preventing any voluntary acts on the part of those exposed to the effects. The total disorientation is of short term, five to fifteen seconds duration, and the effects completely disappear within a short time. The scattering effect of the submunitions gives the NICO grenades an impressive effectiveness zone of 10 meters radius.

M7A3 CS grenade

This is presently the standard CS gas grenade of the U.S. armed forces and is the most likely one to be encountered. A canister style, burning type grenade, the M7A3 has a bouchon type, pull-ring safety lever fuze at the top. The fuze has a two second delay when initiated after which it fires a charge of hot particles into the filler mixture. The filler consists of a pyrotechnic mixture made up of a type of nitrocellulose powder that produces a large amount of dense white smoke as it burns. The CS agent (Orthochlorbenzalmalonitrile) is a white powder contained in gelatin capsules spread throughout the pyrotechnic mixture. As the pyrotechnic mixture burns, it volatilizes the CS agent in the capsules and carries it in the smoke out of the escape holes in the bottom and top of the grenade canister. The gas cloud thins fairly quickly, and so can be seen through. However, the effects of the CS gas are still strong, even when the cloud is difficult to see. CS takes effect on an individual within a few seconds of exposure to a visible cloud. The effects include severe pain and burning of the eyes and mucous membranes of the nose, mouth, and throat. Stinging and burning of the skin also begins to occur. As exposure continues for 30 to 60 seconds, sneezing, dripping of the nose, coughing, and tightness of the chest takes place. Even longer exposure, 1 to 2 minutes, will cause the eyes to close involuntarily in roughly 90 percent of the individuals exposed. Breathing also becomes difficult with breaths being short and labored after a few minutes exposure. Many individuals may panic, so difficult does

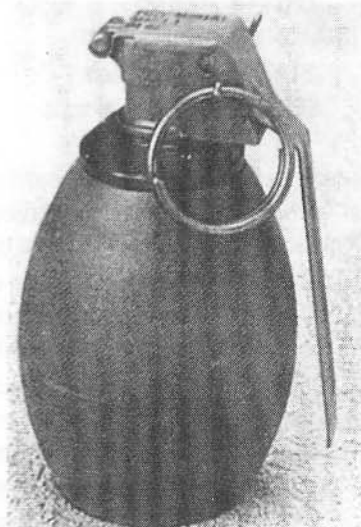
breathing appear to become. Symptoms disappear rapidly when a victim is removed to fresh air, usually within 5 to 10 minutes. Lethality is rarely a problem with CS gas unless it is used in a small enclosed space where death from suffocation becomes a real problem. One of the difficulties in using the M7A3 canister grenade is that while functioning, the exterior of the body may get as hot as 500 degrees, igniting possible combustibles.

The M25A2 grenade was developed to allow CS to be used in situations where the danger of fire is too great to allow burning type canister grenades to be used. The bursting type M25A2 grenade also releases all of its chemical agent in an instantaneous cloud, giving the CS a more immediate effect and preventing any possible throwback of a burning CS canister. The body of the grenade is a hollow plastic sphere with a control core containing the fuze and detonator assembly. The fuze is a spring loaded plunger that sticks out of the top of the grenade and is retained by a sleeve held by a pull ring and cotter pin. With the pull ring removed, the sleeve may be held in place with the thumb of the throwing hand. If the sleeve is allowed to move, it becomes very difficult to replace the pull pin if desired. When the sleeve is released, the plunger is driven into the grenade by a spring and strikes a firing pin starting a two second delay. After the delay, the detonator fires, rupturing the plastic shell and spreading the agent filler. The filler consists of 95 percent CS powder and 5 percent silica gel to keep the filler from clumping. The visible cloud of agent starts with a diameter of about 10 meters but is quickly elongated by any wind. With a 12 to 18 mph wind, a single M25A2 grenade can make a CS cloud that covers more than 420 square meters and still has the major effective symptoms of the gas. The powdered agent will contaminate an area for several hours at least and a person walking through the area will stir up enough agent to quickly affect them.

This is the original stun grenade first publicly seen when used by the SAS at the Princess Gate rescue. The grenade is roughly the same size and shape as an M26A1 fragmentation grenade but has a smooth plastic body with a flat bottom. The standard bouchon type fuze has a two second delay that starts after the safety lever is released. After the delay, a paper submunition is ejected from the base of the grenade where, after less than a second's delay, it detonates with a brilliant flash and loud report. In addition, the submunition creates a large cloud of dense white smoke that lingers for a length of time. The flash dazzles anyone looking at it and the loud report causes severe disorientation. Though the effects are short in duration, five to fifteen seconds, they effectively prevent any intentional act on the part of someone exposed to the blast. With the submunition being made of paper and detonating far, 2 or 3 meters, from the plastic grenade body, there is little damage the blast can do unless an individual is actually in contact with the submunition when it goes off. A drawback of this grenade is that the flash may set fire to fabric or other easily ignited material it contacts.

This is another specialized stun munition manufactured by Accuracy Systems, Inc. and like the Thunder Strip, is intended to be inserted into a room before it is entered. The rod will fit through any 3/4 inch hole in a door, wall, or floor and is sized to slip through the hole left by a 12 gauge shotgun slug. At one end of the rod is a standard bouchon type fuze with pull ring and safety lever. To insure that the rod is completely inside the target area it is first inserted into the hole and the pull ring removed. 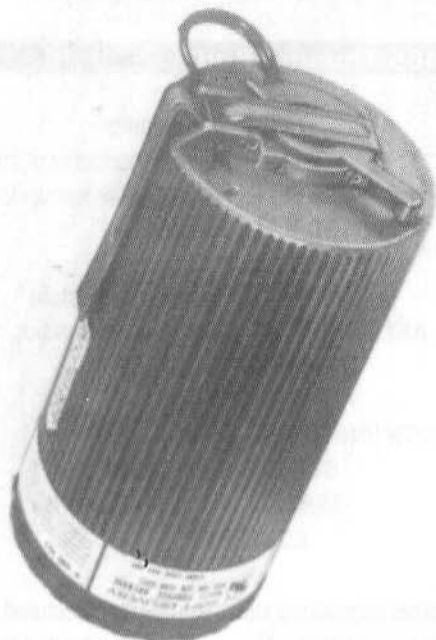

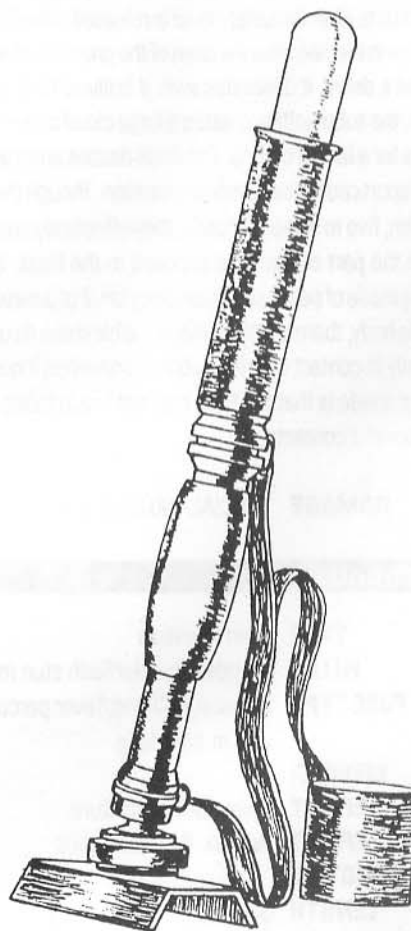

This grenade was designed from its inception as a safe, flameless way of disbursing CS agent without danger to the operator or target. A very large, plastic, canister type grenade, the MPG (Multi Purpose Grenade) is unique, both in appearance and action. Having a red plastic body with ribbed sides makes the MPG easily recognizable, even in the dark. The fuze uses the familiar pull ring and safety lever but also has a selector switch for determining the time delay. The lever is pushed so that the pointer at its opposite end points at either the raised number 5 or 2 on the grenade's top for either a five or two second delay. The two second delay is used for most purposes with the five second delay used for rifle launching the grenade or dropping it from a helicopter. After the delay, a small propellant charge inside the grenade fires, driving a piston towards the bottom of the body. The pressure created by the piston blows out the rupture disk at the base of the grenade and the CS dust agent is ejected in about one

tenth of a second. The agent is a micro-particle sized CS dust that quickly creates a large active cloud of agent. Since the piston remains inside the grenade's body, no propellant gas escapes and the chances of fire are none. As the agent is ejected in such a short time, the grenade cannot be thrown back and there is no danger of fragmentation. The MPG may even be hand held and fired with the base pointing at the target. When the grenade functions, the agent will be expelled as a jet-like cloud at the target. The MPG is extremely safe and will not burn, even if the body is ruptured by striking the target before the propellant charge has fired.

This is a unique grenade launcher that shares some of the characteristics of a light mortar. Also referred to as the FLY-K by the manufacturer, the NR 8111A1 uses a special propulsion system that results in a flashless, noiseless, smokeless firing signature, effectively a silenced mortar. Specifically, the FLY-K acts as a spigot mortar, that is, it has a rod over which the shell fits to launch and the short barrel has little practical effect beyond protecting the rod and shell. Inside the tail of the shells are special propulsion cartridges that are the heart of the FLY-K system. Each propulsion unit is shaped something like an inverted gun barrel with a sliding piston in place of a bullet. The rod, which also contains the spring loaded firing pin, fits up the tail against the piston. When the sleeve on the body of the launcher underneath the barrel is pushed down, it cocks the firing pin. As the sleeve is pushed further down, it releases the fixing pin which strikes a primer in the center of the piston in the propulsion cartridge. The primer ignites the propellant charge behind the piston and the expanding gas drives the piston violently against the rod, launching the shell. As the piston reaches the tail of the shell, a special detention ring slows and stops it before it can leave the end of the tail. With the piston caught inside the cartridge tube, all propellant gases remain inside the shell and all that is heard is a sharp "click" when the NR 8111A1 is fired. The spigot rod has three external ribs to help guide and center the round for firing. The range of the round is determined by the angle of the launcher and this can be set by using the simple bubble sight on the muzzle of the weapon which is graduated in hundreds of meters. Since the weapon does not need to hold in any pressure when firing, it is made of alloys to save weight. A simple curved baseplate is sufficient to support the weapon which is also

held by the operator while firing. The recoil of the FLY-K ammunition is severe and any attempt to fire the weapon without the baseplate being held firmly on the ground could result in severe injury to the operator or weapon. The NR 8111A1 is normally carried by one man along with a rucksack containing 10 rounds.

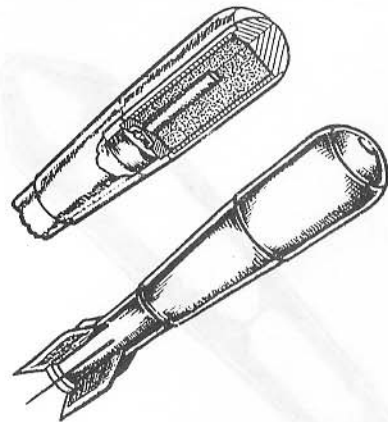

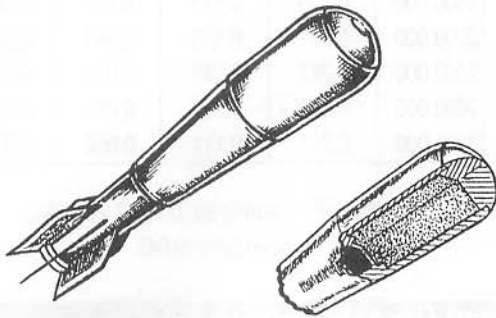
This is an illuminating shell for the NR 8111A1 that ejects a burning white magnesium parachute flare at altitude. The warhead holds the star flare and parachute in a plastic cylinder with the top of the shell covered with a pointed white cap. At the base of the warhead there is an ejection charge and a pyrotechnic delay fuze. The fuze is initiated when the round is fired, and after a built in delay, fires the ejection charge which both ejects and ignites the magnesium flare. The parachute slows the flare's fall until after the flare has burned out. The tail contains the FLY-K propulsion cartridge. The NR 209 is fired at a set angle which normally allows the shell to reach an altitude of 220 meters and a range of 450 meters before ejecting the flare. The flare will illuminate a 225 meter radius circle for 25 seconds with a central circle about 80 meters wide that is twice as well lit.

This is a multi-use round with the primary effect being a rapid smoke screen. Since the white phosphorus filler burns at a high temperature and spreads fragments throughout the burst radius, the round also acts as an incendiary and casualty producing shell. The warhead is a simple molded plastic shell that contains the white phosphorus. The fuze is a base detonating type with a booster charge to shatter the casing and spread the phosphorus. The fuze detonates on impact and is not armed until the shell is fired and has traveled at least 45 meters. The tail is finned for stability and carries the FLY-K cartridge. The burning phosphorus creates a dense cloud of white smoke very rapidly but the smoke will quickly rise and the cloud only lasts about 40 seconds.

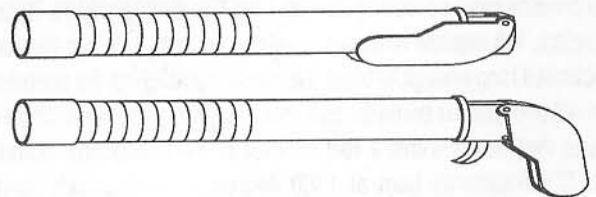

This is the most unusual "shell" fired by the NR 8111A1 as it consists of a multi-pronged grappling hook and rope. The round comes packaged in a canister that contains the grapnel and 41 meters of 9mm diameter nylon climbing rope. The grapnel is loaded like a standard round over the firing rod. The rope is attached to a shackle that slides to the end of the grapnel when it is fired. Launching at a 60 degree angle will give the grapnel a range of about 37 meters with a maximum altitude of about 15 meters. The light alloy grapnel is very strong and the tines are lightly padded with a foam coating. The tines have multiple hardened points and will unfold and dig in. The rope has a breaking strength of 2800 kilograms.

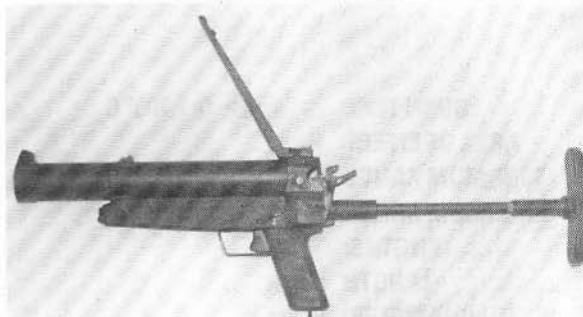
This is in effect a launched incendiary/smoke grenade that comes packaged in its launcher. The firing handle is folded over the trigger at the rear of the launcher. Depressing a safety button allows the handgrip to rotate 90 degrees downward, locking to the rear and exposing the trigger. Until the grip is locked to the rear, the trigger cannot be pulled. When the trigger is pulled, an aluminum capsule containing the red phosphorus filler is ejected at the same time that the pyrotechnic fuze in the capsule's base is ignited. After the fuze's two second delay, the projectile bursts, spreading red phosphorus over the burst area. Unlike white phosphorus, which ignites spontaneously on exposure to air, red phosphorus has to be ignited by outside means; the pyrotechnic fuze accomplishing this in the HAFLA. The fuze delay allows the capsule to travel 70 to 80 meters before it ruptures the case, spreading the filler over a 15 meter long, 10 meter wide oval. If the capsule should strike a target with a hard surface from 8 to 70 meters from the launcher, the capsule will burst with a brilliant flash and blinding smoke covering an area from 5 to 8 meters wide. Below 8 meters, the capsule does not have the velocity, nor has the fuze functioned long enough to burst the capsule and ignite the contents. The red phosphorus burns for two minutes, creating a large cloud of smoke that clears within a few minutes of the phosphorus burning out. The fragments burn at 1300 degrees C. and quickly ignite combustible materials. Three HAFLA's come packaged in a small belt pouch and the aluminum launchers are thrown away after firing. There are no sights on the launcher.

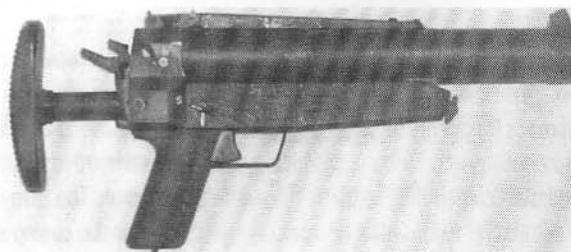

This is the German answer to the American 40mm M79 grenade launcher. This 40mm launcher replaces many rifle grenades in effect, and is more accurate in general. Using the High-Low pressure system, the weapon uses a small high pressure chamber inside the cartridge case to properly burn the propellant with a larger low pressure chamber that allows the gasses to expand and push the relatively large projectile at a lower velocity than otherwise obtainable. The low pressure push prevents the GrP from having too severe a recoil. Mechanically, the GrP is very simple to operate and acts somewhat like a break open shotgun. The locking lever, the upper of the two levers at the back, is pulled down and the barrel unlocks. The muzzle may then be pulled down opening the breech. Fired cartridge cases are removed by hand and the straight access to the barrel allows any length of round to be loaded as long as it is the proper caliber. The hammer is cocked by pulling down the longer of the two rear levers. The telescoping buttstock locks securely in the open or closed position. With the stock telescoped the launcher is able to fit in a special hip holster making it a very handy weapon. There is a simple flip sight for quick use up to 100 meters. Beyond that range, the ladder sight is unfolded, allowing accurate aiming at up to 350 meters.

This is an antipersonnel round for 40mm grenade launchers and was especially intended for use with the 40mm Granatepistole also produced by Heckler and Koch. The 40 x 46mm R round uses the standard high-low pressure system for propulsion with the primary attention being given to the projectile. A particularly complex fuze was developed for the DM-41 that is released by the setback created when the round is fired and arms from the centrifugal force of the round's spinning flight. The force of firing also ignites a delay fuze that burns for about four seconds elapsed time, roughly equivalent to a range of 400 meters. The self destruct feature of the fuze normally prevents any duds from occurring. Fragmentation is provided by a hemispherical plastic shell surrounding the explosive charge with 700 2.25mm steel pellets embedded in the plastic. Due to the small size of the projectile, combined with a relatively large fuze required for positive functioning, fragmentation has to be positive for efficient effect and the DM-41 easily matches this requirement.

The ARMSCOR Multishot Grenade Launcher (MGL) is a native South African design for a multishot 40mm grenade launcher. The MGL has a rotating cylinder that holds six 40 x 46mm R grenades of any type as long as their overall length is under 120mm. An interesting mix of mechanical and gas operation, the MGL is very similar to the Striker shotgun. By pulling the cylinder axis pin (the small hook in front of the cylinder) forward, the rear pistol grip assembly can be rotated to the right exposing the chambers. The spring loaded cylinder is wound with the fingers inserted into the empty chambers. With the cylinder wound, the chambers may be loaded and the rear grip and plate rotated back into position. A thumb safety is just above the rear grip on the left hand side where it is switched down to fire. The trigger is double action, and cocks and releases the firing pin each time it is

pulled. When a grenade fires, a gas operated piston unlocks the cylinder and allows it to rotate a fresh round into battery. If a round should misfire, the trigger can be pulled again to attempt to fire the round. There is a release button on the side of the launcher that unlocks the cylinder and allows a fresh round to rotate into place. The folding stock has three positions into which it can lock: straight back for normal use, slightly angled for long range fire, and folded over the barrel for compactness. The MGL may be fired with the stock folded and the weapon held by both pistol grips. The sight normally used with the MGL is the ARMSON OEG single point sight. With the OEG both eyes are open and the sight superimposes a red dot on the target. The dot glows for use at night. The OEG is mounted on an adjustable bracket that can be set for range from 50 to 350 meters in 25 meter increments. The MGL can be aimed and fired at the rate of one round per second. The weapon cycles a new round in place in 0.3 seconds with the maximum aimed rate of fire being 12 rounds per minute.

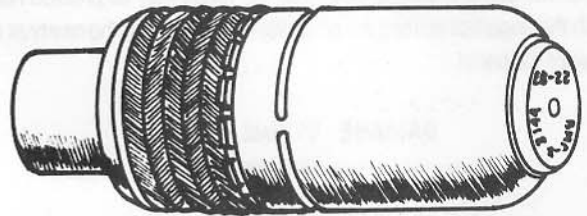

This is a relatively new weapon to the West with only a few captured examples coming out of Afghanistan. The BG-15 has been found mounted underneath the barrel of the AKS-74 rifle and cannot be fired unmounted. Capable of being mounted on any AK series rifle, the BG-15 has a clamp that latches over the barrel in front of the foregrip and under the gas cylinder. There is a very short pistol grip with a hole in it, possibly for the thumb, just behind the trigger. The trigger appears to be double action with a straight pull to the rear, cocking and firing the weapon. The rounds are unusual in that they are muzzle loaded with no retention in the barrel except for a slip fit. The high-low pressure system is used in a novel approach. The high pressure chamber is attached to the base of the round and holds the percussion primer in its center surrounded by 10 bleed holes. When the round is fired the propellant in the high pressure chamber ruptures a seal over the bleed holes and uses the breech end of the barrel as the low pressure chamber. The use of this system eliminates the need for a cartridge case but does give the BG-15 a reportedly heavy recoil. The short barrel is rifled for accuracy and the rounds have a pre-engraved band to engage the rifling. The sights are attached to the left side of the launcher where they can fold out of the way. The sight consists of a rod that can be angled according to an engraved range scale and has an adjustable post at one end and a simple aperture peep at the other.

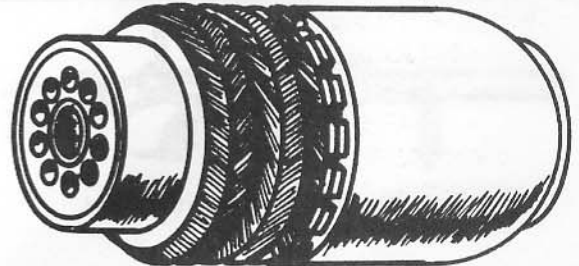

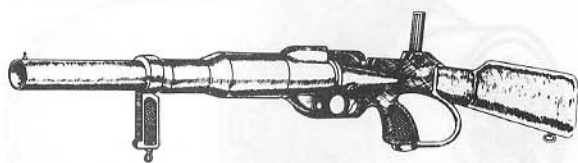

There are only two rounds presently known to be available for the BG-15 and both are casualty producing fragmentation rounds. The two rounds, one long and one short, have no difference in effect and their primary difference may be interpreted (from examination of the weapon's sights), to be in range. Examination gives the long round an effective range of 300 meters and the shorter, lighter round an effective range of 420 meters. The fuze is point detonating and fires on impact with an estimated minimum range of 5 meters. The explosive charge is relatively small, and so the grenade uses the notched wire coil system of controlled fragmentation which the Soviets are using with greater frequency today. The propellant charge is in an extended cylinder at the base of the shell and measures 25 x 14mm in both rounds. Immediately ahead of the shell's base is a band of four bore-riding gas retention rings tapped off by a pre-engraved rotating band. The shell would be loaded from the muzzle of the BG-15, being given a slight turn to align the rifling with the rotating band. The barrel is short enough that the round may be pressed home with the fingertips seating the propellant chamber into the cavity at the base of the barrel.

This is a shoulder fired smoothbore grenade launcher, widely used by the British forces and seeing good commercial sales. The general design is much the same as American tear gas guns: a simple break-open action resembling sporting shotguns. As the operating pressures of this type of weapon are low, the Webley-Schermuly is made of light weight alloys and precision forgings. The trigger mechanism is of the double action type with only a simple rearward pull needed to fire the weapon. A safety interlock and rebounding firing pin insure the weapon from accidental discharges. The rear sight is a simple bar mounted on the forward part of the buttstock that is raised for use. The sight bar has several apertures for different ranges with the furthest range being 150 meters. The weapon can fire all standard 37mm (1.5 inch) gas gun shells and is most often seen using baton or rubber bullet rounds. A major point in the weapon's favor is its flexibility for use. The barrel is easily removed and replaced with a short version. The stock is also removable, taking with it the long range sight and leaving the pistol grip. Removing the stock and changing the barrel results in the Schermuly pistol. There is a mounting available that lets the anti-riot gun in its long barreled version to be mounted in vehicle turrets in the place of a machine gun.

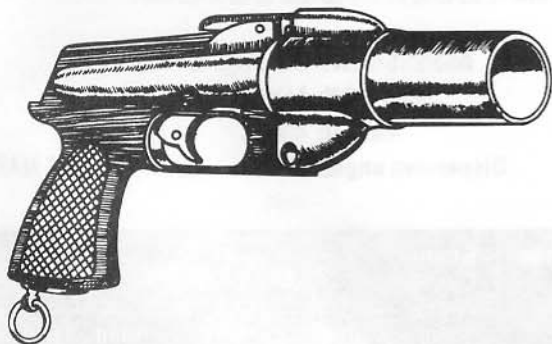

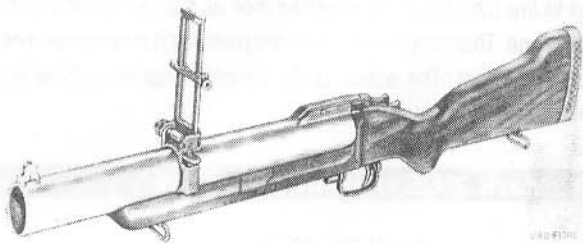

This was the first grenade launcher to use the high-low pressure system and it was first fielded by the U.S. military in the late 1950's. The basic design of the M79 was intentionally derived from single shot sporting shotguns allowing easy familiarity by new recruits. The breech is opened by pushing the locking lever on the top of the weapon to the right and pulling the barrel down, which partially extracts a fired casing, recocks the hammer, and resets the safety to safe. A fired case is removed by hand and a fresh round inserted into the chamber. Because of the low operating pressure the barrel is made of aluminum alloy and is rifled for accuracy with 6 narrow lands and wide grooves.

The buttstock has a high rear portion to allow good seating of the weapon when it is fired at a high angle for long range. A recoil pad is fitted to the stock though the M79 is not known for having excessive recoil. The flip-up rear sight is very tall when unfolded and somewhat prone to being damaged. There is a small fixed notch on the base of the rear sight that is used, when the sight is folded, for engaging targets of up to 100 meters range. When unfolded, the rear sight is adjustable for windage and elevation so that the weapon can be zeroed for a specific operator. There is a sliding notch that can be moved up or down on the sight to set for range. A scale is on the side of the sight for ranges from 75 to 375 meters in 25 meter increments. As the notch is moved for higher ranges, the sight automatically adjusts for drift. As the projectile spins with a right hand spin at 3,700 rpm, the tendency is for the shell to drift to the right; the automatic movement of the notch to the left compensates for this drift. A highly qualified operator rarely needs to use the sight for a group or close point target, as the slow flight and size of the projectile allows it to be seen in flight. Since the M79 is a break-open type action, any length of cartridge may be fitted into it, as long as the caliber is 40 x 46mmR.

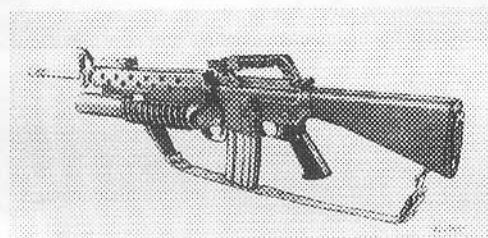

The major drawback of the M79 was its being a dedicated weapon with the grenadier carrying no other weapon than a pistol. The M203 was the final design in the development of a 40mm launcher that could be mounted underneath the barrel of the M16 rifle. Very light, the M203 is made up of lightweight alloys and fiberglass and can be mounted on any of the full-sized M16 series rifles. The barrel of the M203 is unlocked by pressing in a lever on the left side of the weapon above the center of the barrel and sliding the barrel forward against the stop. Any fired casing in the chamber is automatically extracted and ejected. A fresh round is inserted and the barrel slid back into battery to set the weapon for firing. There is a safety inside the trigger guard that, when it is on safe, blocks the inside the of trigger guard, preventing a finger from entering. There are two sights issued with the M203 the first, a simple leaf sight, folds up to use. Sighting with the leaf uses the front sight of the M16 rifle and is very quick to use. The leaf is graduated from 50 to 250 meters in 50 meter

increments. The second sight is a quadrant sight that mounts on the handle of the M16 on the left hand sight. The quadrant sight has a folding post and aperture and is adjustable for zero. For use, the quadrant sight is graduated in 25 meter increments from 50 to 400 meters. To use the M203, the rifle is held to the shoulder with the barrel of the 203 held by the left hand, while the right hand uses the magazine for a grip. The main advantage of the M203 is that, after the launcher is used, the grenadier has the 30 rounds of 5.56mm that are in the M16 rifle immediately available.

The M203 has been improved under the product improvement program of the U.S. military and the result has been named the Talon by the producing company. Operating in the same manner as the M203, the Talon has several improvements over the original weapon. A major change is the development of a quick release for the weapon combined with a universal mounting bar. By simple modifications to the mounting bar, it may be attached to a wide range of weapons including the AK-47 family, FN-FAL, G-3, G-41, AR-180, Galil, and a light folding stock for the launcher alone. Another modification is to the release system of the barrel. By pressing the barrel release, the barrel is slid forward to the stop as in the standard M203. By pressing the release a second time, the barrel may be slid forward an additional distance, allowing the loading of longer 40mm rounds developed for the M79. A replacement sight has been designed to take the place of the quadrant sight. The new sight mounts on the handle of an M16; other mounts are available for different weapons. The sight has an ARMSON OEG single point sight that is used with both eyes open and places a red dot on the target. The sight is adjustable for ranges from 50 to 400 meters in 25 meter increments. A special pistol grip stock is made for the Talon that allows it to be fired as a pistol, or with the folding stock opened, the weapon can be fired from the shoulder. With the stock folded over the weapon, the Talon pistol has a length of 45.7cm and a weight of 1.950 kilograms. Use of the mounting bar system has resulted in an unusual additional weapon that can be mounted under the M16. The Ithaca Stakeout model shotgun in 12

gauge will fit on the mounting rail when fitted with the proper brackets. This results in a pump-action shotgun riding underneath the M16. The obvious firepower is tremendous and is an especially good entry weapon for opening doors, using the shotgun for the hinges and lock while still having a fully loaded M16 at the ready. For the shotgun specifications, see Ithaca Stakeout under shotguns.

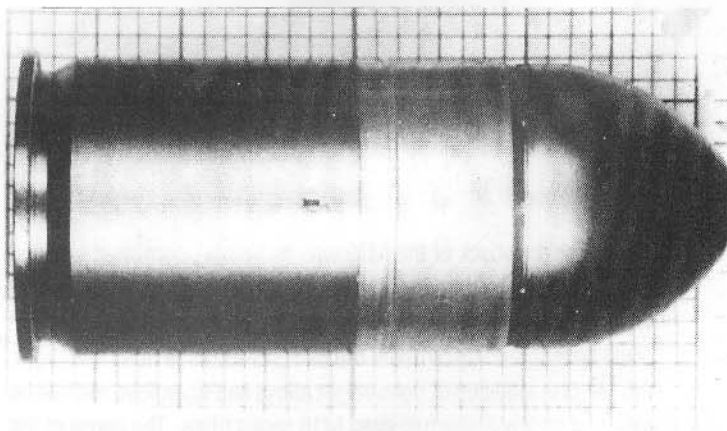

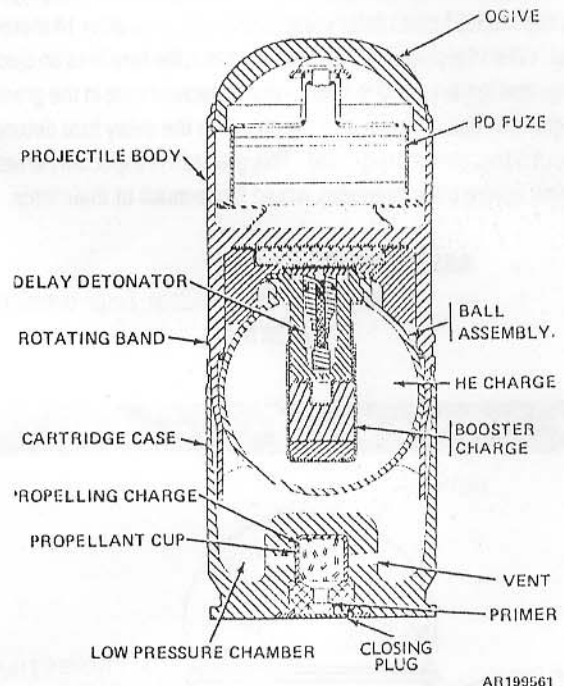

This is the most common round used in the 40mm grenade launcher. It is a fragmentation-type, casualty producing round. The heart of this, and of all the 40 x 46mmR family of grenades, is the aluminum cartridge case with the high-low pressure system. The cartridge case is made with a thick-walled propellant chamber, formed into the base of the casing and protruding into the low pressure area inside of the case. A thin-walled brass cup containing the propellant is inserted into the high pressure chamber and the base opening is sealed with an aluminum plug, holding the percussion primer. When the round is fired, the propellant, a double-base smokeless powder, burns creating a pressure of 35,000 psi inside the high pressure chamber. When the pressure reaches maximum, the brass cup ruptures, releasing the gas through the six bleed holes in the walls of the high pressure chamber into the low pressure chamber. In the low pressure chamber, the gas pressure has dropped to about 3,000 psi due to the larger area, and this pressure propels the projectile through the barrel with a softer shove than other systems would give. This shove, rather than a relatively sudden kick, allows the launcher to be shoulder fired with a heavy projectile without severe recoil. Propelling the projectile through the rifled barrel gives it a muzzle velocity of 250 feet per second with a right hand stabilizing spin of 3,700 revolutions per minute. The spin is what stabilizes the grenade in flight and also creates the forces necessary to arm the fuze. The fuze for a 40mm grenade is very complex for its size and it often makes up half of the grenade. In the M381 and M386 rounds, the only difference between them lies in the fuze. The fuze used in the M381 is the M552 point detonating fuze which arms from the centrifugal force of the projectile's spinning flight. The M381 projectile must travel 2.4 to 3 meters from the point of launch for the fuze to have spun enough to fully arm. The short arming distance makes the M381 round useful for house-to-house combat where it can be fired around a corner into a room and detonate when it hits the far wall. The drawback with the short aiming distance is that the grenade will arm while the firer is still in the area of the burst. If the armed round were to strike an object, the firer could easily be injured. To avoid this problem, the M386 uses the M551 fuze which is also point detonating and operates in the same manner

as the M552 fuze, but arms only after traveling at least 14 meters from the launcher. The M386 round is the more commonly issued round for standard troops because of its much longer safety zone. Both rounds have a small, ball-shaped grenade attached to the base of the fuze containing the explosive charge. The ball contains a spherical coil of rectangular steel wire, notched every quarter of an inch for fragmentation.

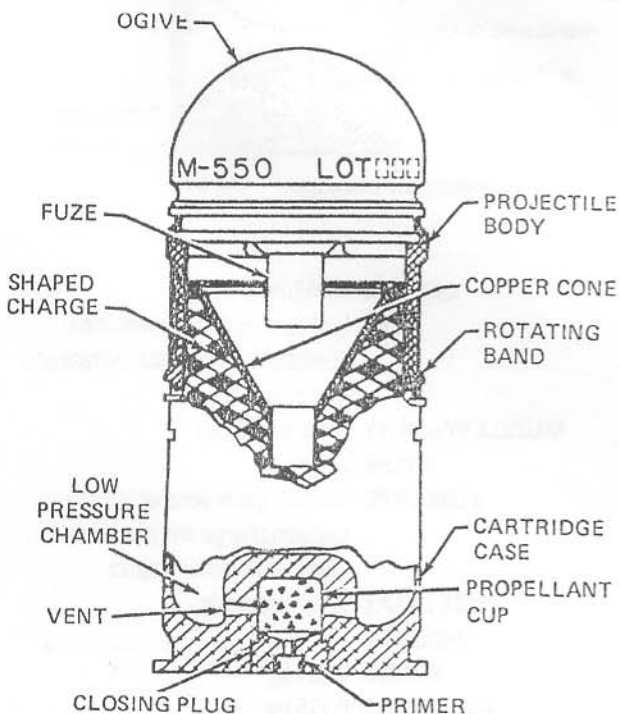

As most fragmentation grenades detonate at ground level, much of the fragmentation is absorbed by the ground, and so, the round is less efficient. A much more effective round would detonate in the air as an airburst and this is what the M397A1 attempts to do. The projectile uses the M536E1 point detonating fuze which arms after 14 meters of travel. When the projectile strikes the ground, the fuze fires an ejection charge and ignites an 80 millisecond pyrotechnic fuze in the grenade. The grenade ball is blown into the air when the delay fuze detonates it about 5 feet above the ground. This grenade is especially effective in snow where other grenades would lose much of their force.

This is a dual purpose impact type round intended to cause casualties from fragmentation, as well as penetrate up to 2 inches of steel. The cartridge case is a standard high-low pressure type with the projectile being particularly complex. The M550 fuze is the point initiating, base detonating type which arms from 14 to 27 meters from point of launch. When the round impacts, the fuze fires an RDX spitback charge which fires into the base of the explosive charge. The charge has a conical copper liner at its front to shape the blast into an armor piercing jet. This type of explosive charge is called a shaped charge and greatly increase the penetration effects of the rounds. The copper liner is vaporized into an armor piercing jet which actually causes the armor steel to flow away from it. The base and sides of the explosive charge are made up of serrated steel which fragments, giving the round its dual effect. Though the armor piercing jet is insufficient for heavy armored vehicles, it makes a very effective weapon against armored personnel carriers and other lightly armored targets.

This is a multiple projectile "buckshot" round that effectively makes the 40mm launcher a large shotgun. Originally intended to give the M79 some close-in antipersonnel capability, the M576 round will also work in any single-shot 40 x 46mmR launcher. The round is very short and the projectile consists of a squat plastic cylinder. Inside the cylinder sabot is a small shot cup holding 20 number 4 buckshot and being sealed with a snap-off cap. As the round is fired setback (inertia) causes the shot cup to move backwards in the sabot disengaging the cap on the shot cup. As the projectile leaves the muzzle, the several drilled air scoops along the circumference of the sabot cause it to quickly lose speed. As the sabot falls away, the buckshot are free to continue on to the target. Due to the low pressure of the round, the shot does not have a very high velocity and so the maximum effective range is a short 30 meters, while tactical use of the round indicates a practical effective range of only 15 meters or so.

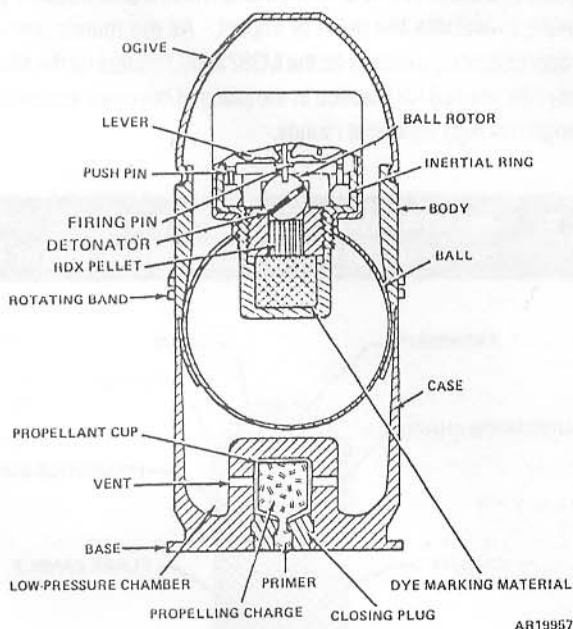

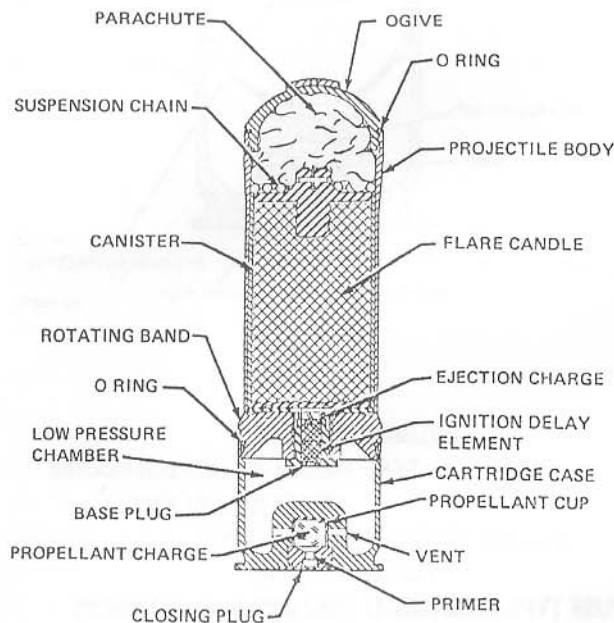

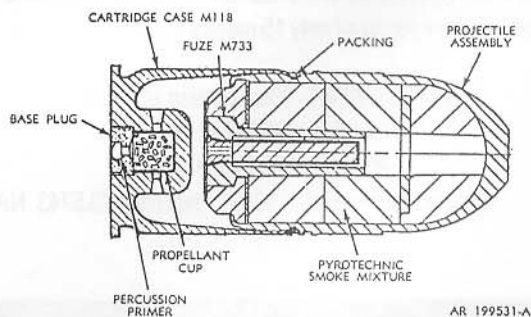

Each of these rounds fires a long projectile containing a single pyrotechnic star attached to a small parachute assembly. When the round is fired, a small pyrotechnic delay fuze is ignited from the propellant gases. After the four to five second delay, the round has reached an altitude of 500 to 700 feet and an ejection charge is fired by the fuze. The ejection charge ignites the flare candle and ejects it through the top of the aluminum projectile body. The flare lowers itself on a 20 inch wide parachute which slows its descent rate to about 7 feet per second. The body of the grenade is white with black markings and there is a raised letter on the plastic nose cap. The Ferret is a barricade penetrating, bursting-type CS round with little or no fragmentation potential and no possibility of fire. The round can be used in any 40 x 46mmR launcher that is capable of accepting its length. The casing is of polycarbonate plastic as is the projectile and the entire package is waterproof. This is a baton type round designed to deliver a punishing but not damaging blow. The cartridge case is a standard 40 x 46mmR high-low velocity type. The original Mark 19 was developed over a very short time in 1967 to provide riverine patrol boats in Vietnam with adequate firepower. It was improved and reissued in 1984. The Mark 19 Model 3 is a heavy machinegun capable of being tripod mounted and firing the 40 x 53mmR family of high-velocity grenades originally designed for helicopter guns. Using the blowback method of operation in combination with advanced primer ignition, the Mark 19 is operationally simple but mechanically complex. The ammunition is held in metallic disintegrating link belts that feed into the weapon from the left hand side. One of the cocking handles (there is one on each side) is drawn back twice to load the weapon. The bolt is locked to the rear and goes forward to fire the weapon. The movement of the massive (7.7kg) bolt changes the center of balance of the weapon considerably and normally requires a two-point mounting to allow accuracy with the weapon. The rounds fired use the high-low pressure system but are loaded to much higher velocities than the 40 x 46mm R rounds. Any attempt to fire the high velocity grenades in a low velocity weapon usually results in the destruction of the weapon and injury or death of the operator. Low velocity rounds could be fired in the Mark 19, but they would have to be singly loaded and would not operate the action. The major drawback of the Mark 19 is the weapon's size and weight as well as the bulk and weight of its ammunition. These drawbacks are considerably outweighed by the firepower of the Mark 19, especially when combined with the anti-armor and anti-personnel effects of the M430 HEDP round.

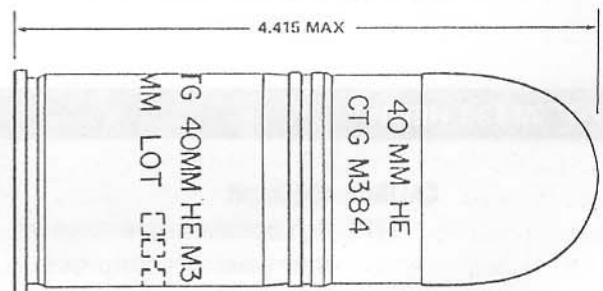

This is the high explosive, fragmentation round used for anti-personnel effects with the Mark 19 and other high velocity grenade launchers. 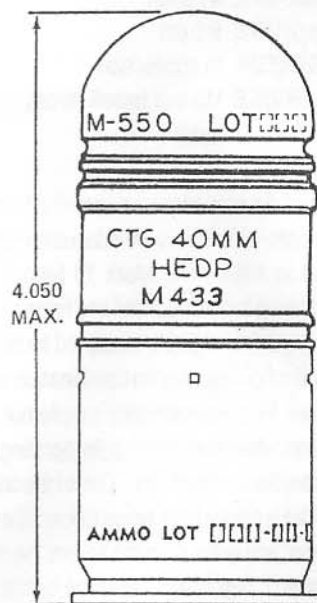

This dual purpose round has both an anti-personnel fragmentation effect as well as an armor penetration capability, and is considered the standard combat round for the Mark 19. The projectile is very much the same as the M433 low velocity round, but with a greater explosive capacity. 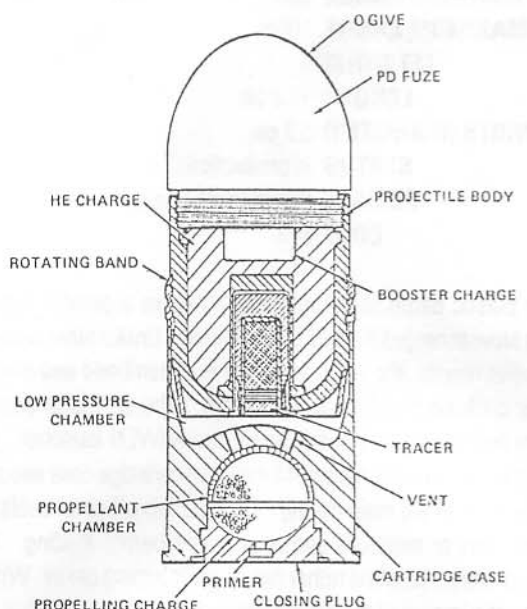

The ARWEN (anti-riot weapon, Enfield), is a multi-shot tear gas gun designed to give security forces the ability to fire more than one round without having to pause and load. The ARWEN works on a straightforward mechanical principle firing a family of rounds developed for it. Feeding is from an open-sided cylinder with the five rounds being rotated into position and ejected by a spring-loaded sprocket. The rounds are loaded through the ejection port on the right

side of the weapon and pressed against the sprocket which indexes one position for each round and winds the driving spring. The double action trigger pushes the bolt forward during the first half of its travel pressing the in-line round to seat against the barrel but not chamber. If the trigger is released before firing, the spring-loaded bolt is withdrawn, freeing the mouth of the cartridge from the barrel. Pulling the trigger fully fires the cartridge, and when the trigger is released, a fresh round indexes into place and the empty casing is ejected. The round is unsupported except at the mouth and base when fired and acts as its own chamber. The ARWEN is made from alloys and high strength plastics to keep its weight down. The rifled barrel has a foregrip adjustable to either side and a folding front sight. The rear sight is a simple folding peepsight attached to the trigger mechanism housing. Adjustment for range is done by sighting through the graduated scale on the transparent front sight. The buttstock is adjustable for six different lengths to fit a variety of operators.

This is a plastic baton round intended to strike a painful but not disabling blow at ranges from 20 to 100 meters. 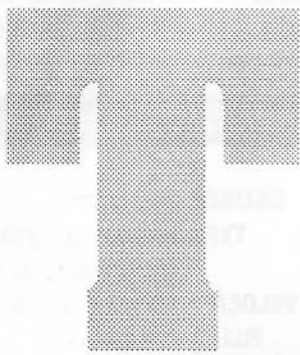

This is a penetrating CS round with the projectile based on the streamlined one used in the AR-1 cartridge. HEAVY WEAPONS



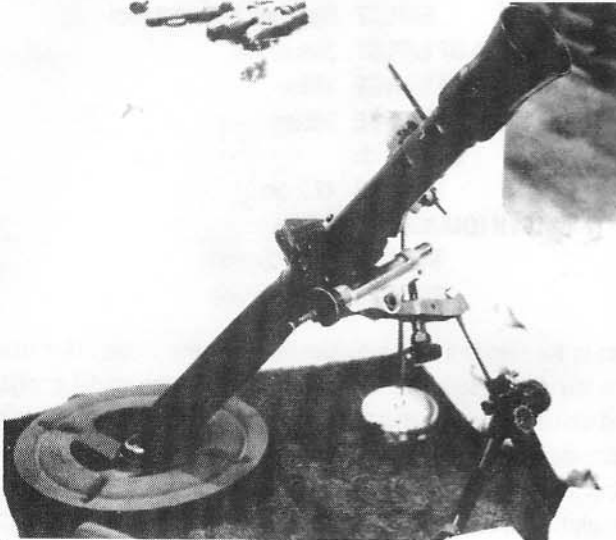
The class of heavy weapons are normally used to support the infantry when attacking strongly defended positions, or to destroy vehicles and aircraft. Most of them require a crew to carry the weapon and the ammunition supply,

but can be fired by a single soldier. Included in this class are: recoilless rifles, light infantry mortars, anti-tank/anti-fortification rocket launchers, hand-held surface-to-air missiles, and light autocannon.

In WW 2 the Germans fielded the first of a new form of man-portable artillery—the recoilless rifle. This weapon was based on the *counterblast principle* (a design in which vented propellant gasses are used to balance the cannon’s recoil). Despite their primary duties being replaced by grenade launchers and anti-tank missiles in the armies of major countries, recoilless rifles are still found in many Third World forces.

Among the forms of heavy weapon covered in this section is one of the oldest; the first mortars date back to the mid-1400’s. A mortar’s purpose is to launch a shell in a high arc over intervening obstacles, falling on the target from above. All modern mortars derive from the ideas of Sir Wilfred Stokes in 1915: a finned bomb with a firing charge is dropped down a smooth barrel. The charge ignites (launching the bomb) when it strikes a firing pin at the bottom. This is the most common type of mortar, and is referred to as a “drop-fire” weapon. Heavier artillery mortars are sometimes breech-loading or have rifled barrels for accuracy. ●

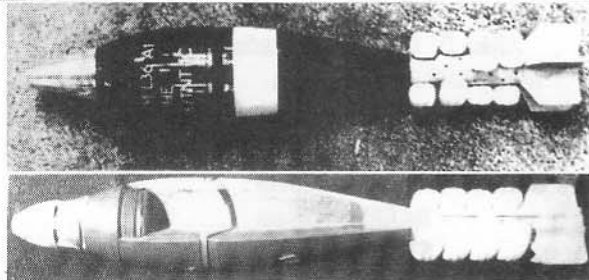

This is a British developed lightweight medium mortar that has also been adopted by the U.S. Army. The basic design of the weapon can be traced back to the Stokes 3 inch mortar of 1917 with the L16 operating in much the same manner. The weapon is made up of three major parts: the barrel, the bipod, and the baseplate with an optical sight mounting on the bipod. The barrel is made of high tensile alloy

steel that maintains its strength at high temperatures. The bottom bolt of the barrel is deeply finned to increase the surface area available for cooling. At the base of the barrel is a ball joint which fits into the socket of the baseplate. The firing pin screws through the ball and protrudes into the breech. The baseplate gives the gun tube (barrel) a 360 degree rotation. The bipod is designed so that the legs can be adjusted to fit rough terrain. The elevation and traversing mechanisms are sealed against dirt and are relatively maintenance free. The clamp at the top of the bipod quickly attaches to the barrel and has a bracket to hold the sight. The sight is fully adjustable for range and elevation and quickly allows the gun tube to be properly angled and aligned to the right bearing. The mortar can be assembled and layed (aimed) within a minute by a three man crew that is properly trained. A single man can also lay and operate the L16 due, in part, to its light weight. The weapon is operated by dropping a prepared round, fin first, down the barrel of the aimed mortar. When the round hits the base, the fixed firing pin fires the shotshell-like ignition cartridge (primary charge) which in turn ignites any additional powder charges and launches the shell. The high angle of the ballistic arc of a mortar round allows it to clear intervening obstacles and drop almost vertically on a target. This ability to strike at targets that cannot be seen behind obstacles makes the mortar an indirect fire weapon (indirect fire weapons aim at targets which the gunner cannot see). To properly use the weapon, someone, usually a forward observer, must be able to see the target and communicate with the gun crew. The FO sees the impact of a round and tells the gun crew what corrections are necessary to hit the target. Though the L16 is light and can be carried by a three man crew, the ammunition itself is quite heavy, and a three man crew can normally carry only six rounds with the mortar.

This is the standard high explosive round for use in the L16 mortar. The round is fin stabilized with a body made of spheroidal graphite and cast iron which shatters into efficient fragments when the filler detonates. The fuze is an adjustable impact type that can be set for an instant detonation or a slight delay so that the target is penetrated deeply before detonation. The fuze's safety pin is removed manually before the round is fired and the fuze arms from setback when the round launches. The round is bore safe and does not fully arm until it has left the gun tube. The tail contains the L33 primary cartridge which ignites the augmenting charges to increase the range of the rounds. As the mortar has a limited range of elevation and depression to further change the range of the round a variable charge system is used. The primary cartridge will give a range of from 100 to 500 meters, while if 6 additional charges are used, the range is 1,600 to 4,500 meters with 8 augmenting charges being the maximum.

This is a bursting-type white phosphorus smoke round with incendiary and antipersonnel effects. The L40 has the same ballistics and is handled in the same manner as the L36A2 high explosive shells. On impact, the fuze detonates a burster tube that opens the cast iron casing and spreads the phosphorus over the burst radius of 34 meters. White phosphorus ignites spontaneously on exposure to air. The burning phosphorus creates a dense white smoke cloud of phosphorus pentoxide which is only slightly toxic. The smoke, though dense and obscuring, is hotter than other screening smokes and so quickly rises away after the phosphorus has burned out. The burning temperature of the phosphorus gives it a very strong incendiary effect, allowing the L40 round to have a slight antimaterial effect. The phosphorus spreads as small burning particles and these will stick to an exposed individual, causing severe burns. This antipersonnel effect gives the L40 round a greater psychological impact than its actual effects merit.

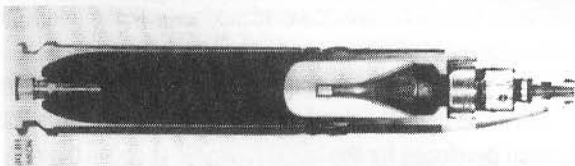

The ASP is an automatic, self powered machine cannon firing 30mm shells and capable of being mounted on any mounting that will accept the M2 HB .50 caliber machinegun, including the M3 tripod. The feed for the ASP is on the left side of the weapon and it uses the 30mm ammunition developed for the M230 Chain Gun used in the Apache gunship. The belted cannon shells give the ASP awesome firepower and this, combined with its easy mounting and relatively light weight, greatly adds to the firepower of ground troops. The gas operation system of the ASP is simple and particularly smooth in its action, giving the weapon a high reliability of operation. The short length behind the feed gives excellent balance to the ASP and allows it to be easily controlled from just its twin spade grips. There is no integral sight on the weapon and sighting systems are mounted as needed.

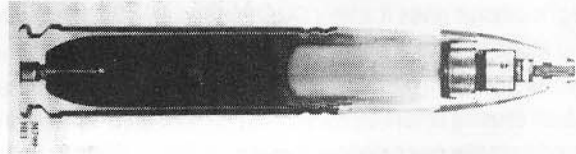

This is a dual purpose round with both a fragmentation antipersonnel effect and an armor piercing shaped charge. The aluminum cartridge case saves weight with the raised belt adding strength to the base. The fuze arms by centrifugal force and detonates on impact. When the fuze detonates, it collapses the cone-shaped copper liner into an armor penetrating jet of metal and gasses. In addition, the explosion of the filler shatters the steel casing of the round into antipersonnel fragments. The M779 round is a high explosive round with both a fragmentation antipersonnel effect as well as an incendiary antimaterial effect. The incendiary effect is obtained by mixing a powdered pyrophoric metal such as zirconium with the explosive. When the fuze detonates the filler on impact with the target, the shell casing is shattered, providing the antipersonnel fragments. The heat of the explosion ignites the metallic

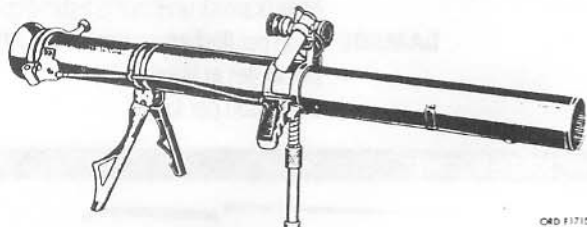

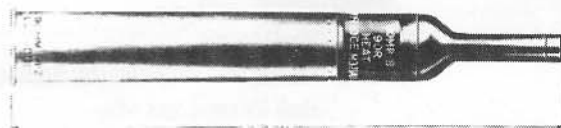

The M67 is the largest shoulder fired recoilless cannon produced in the United States. In use since the 1950's for antitank purposes, the M67 has

been replaced for that job by the wire guided missile, specifically, the M47 Dragon. With the advent of the light infantry unit, it, along with several other elite units, found the M67 an excellent house-to-house assault weapon for breaching walls, attacking bunkers, and antipersonnel use. The M67 uses the counterblast system to eliminate the recoil of firing. In a counterblast system, gasses from the fired round are vented to the rear of the weapon and accelerated through a venturi nozzle so that the effective recoil of the gas jet equals and cancels the recoil of the fired shell. The manually operated breechblock acts as the venturi nozzle, so it is a flared conical tube with a central support for the firing pin. Using the counterblast system results in a danger area behind the weapon where hot exhaust gasses, particles, and debris will cause casualties. The danger area of the M67 is cone shaped with its apex at the launcher. The blast spreads out in a 120 degree cone 90 feet long and 180 feet wide. The barrel of the M67 is steel and rifled for accuracy. The rear shoulder brace will unfold into two legs with the vertical front grip acting as the adjustable front leg of a tripod. The horizontal front grip holds the trigger and is connected to the spring-loaded firing pin by a long cable on the right side of the weapon. The telescopic sight has a graduated reticle for both range and movement of the target. There is a battery case that can be attached to the side of the telescope that will illuminate the reticle for firing at night. The M67 can be carried by one man but is normally used by a two man crew, one acting as the gunner and the other as the loader.

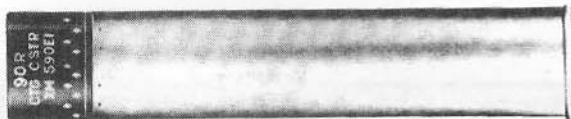

This is the standard round for the M67 recoilless rifle. The M371 HEAT, High Explosive Antitank, round is fin stabilized and will penetrate a good deal of armor or concrete. The cartridge case is aluminum and has a plastic rupture disk in its base to allow gasses to escape through the rear venturi. The propelling charge is 21 ounces of propellant wrapped in a bag around the tail of the projectile. The long nose of the round serves a dual purpose. The piezoelectric crystal that detonates the charge is carried at the tip of the nose so that it contacts the target while the nose provides the proper stand-off for optimum armor penetration. The explosive charge has a large copper cone at its front that collapses into a jet when the charge is detonated. The body of the projectile is of steel and provides some fragmentation effect around the impact site.

This canister round has the effect of turning the M67 into a 90mm shotgun. The M590 round fires a plastic and aluminum projectile designed to break up quickly upon leaving the muzzle of the weapon. When the

plastic cap breaks up, the aluminum body quickly falls away leaving the approximately 2,300 eight grain, fin stabilized, steel flechettes to continue in a widening cone. Effective maximum range of the flechettes is 300 meters with the pattern being 42 meters wide at that range. 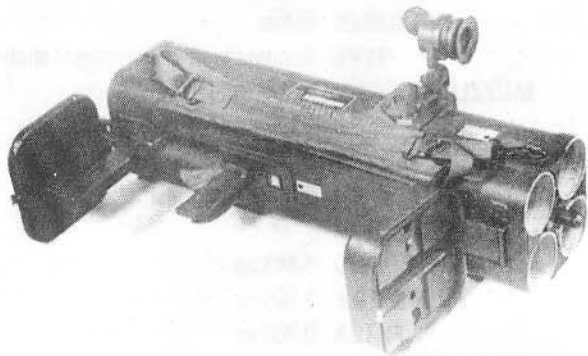

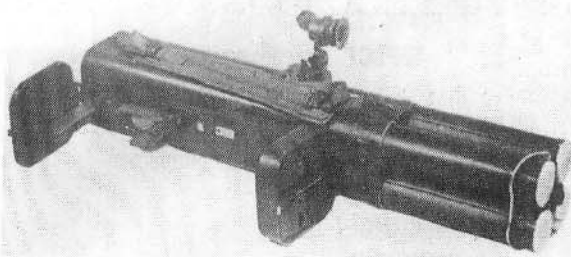
This round is an attempt to give the M67 a greater antimaterial effect. Essentially, the round fires a modified 81mm high explosive mortar shell with a bore-riding sabot and extended tail. The body of the projectile is made of thick walled, pearlitic, malleable iron which shatters into splinters when the explosive charge is detonated. Fragmentation is dense and widespread for a heavy casualty effect and the large blast of the round is destructive to material. The low velocity gives the heavy projectile a limited range and few of these shells were made. A new interest has risen over this round as a possible wall breaching shell for house-to-house urban combat.

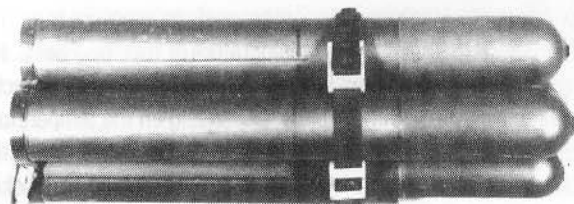

The M202A1 is intended as a replacement for the M9A1-7 and other flamethrowers. Using a four-round clip and having four tubes the M202A1 can place an incendiary rocket up to 750 meters away one round each second. The rectangular case of the weapon holds the firing mechanism, sights, and barrels for the rockets. Unloaded, the ends of the launcher fold up to cover the ends of the launch tubes. The sight and trigger handle also fold into the body of the weapon making a relatively compact unit. To fire, the ends are opened, trigger and sight unfolded and the firing pin mechanism extended from the rear. A loaded clip is slid into the rear of the launcher with the warheads fitting into the launch tubes and the retaining tubes at the clip latching onto the firing pin extension. The clip can be pressed into the body of the launcher by pressing a release. The rear cover will close over the clip and there is a wire handle attached to the clip to extend it for firing. The trigger mechanism is of the double action type with each pull of the trigger firing a fresh round. Each time the trigger is released, the firing mechanism rotates to the next tube. The open rocket tubes give no recoil when fired but there is a dangerous backblast area behind the weapon. The danger space of the backblast area is 15 meters long and 15 meters wide at its base. The launcher is made of fiberglass and aluminum and is considered to be semi-disposable with exception of the sight.

This is the standard round of ammunition for the M202A1 Flash. The rocket consists of an M54 rocket motor with six spring loaded folding fins. The M236 warhead is attached to the motor by an adaptor which also contains the M34 base detonating fuze. The acceleration of firing releases a spring loaded rotor in the fuze. When the rotor has moved to the armed position, the detonator is in line with the firing pin and will fire on impact. On impact with the target, the detonator fires a burster which ruptures the casing of the warhead, spraying the filler over a 20 meter radius. The filler consists of TPA, triethylaluminium pyrophoric agent which ignites spontaneously on exposure to air. The TPA burns for 8 to 9 seconds at a temperature of 1000 degrees C. and will ignite any combustibles in the area. As the fuel in the rocket motor burns in 7 to 15 milliseconds, depending on the temperature, the fuel is consumed before the rocket leaves the launcher, preventing the operator from receiving injuries due to the exhaust. The rockets come packaged in a four-round clip for quick loading into the M202A1.

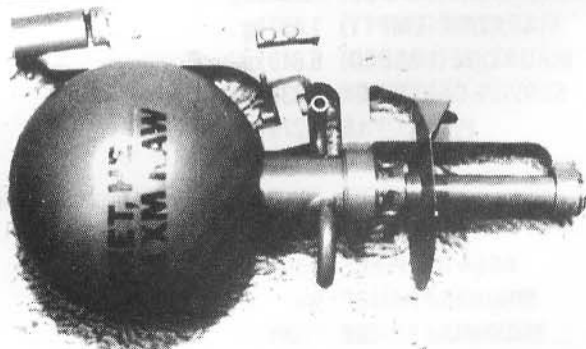

The Rifleman's Assault Weapon (RAW) has been gradually developed over a number of years and is presently being tested by the U.S. military. The potential for the RAW system is great in that a small package easily used by the standard rifleman is equivalent in firepower to a 90mm recoilless rifle. The RAW launcher mounts on the standard M16 rifles and secures itself to the bayonet lug and flash hider. With the arming switch set to safe, the firearm can continue to be used with ball ammunition. When set to arm, the RAW projectile is launched when the rifle is fired. A small amount of gas is tapped from the muzzle to operate a firing pin inside the RAW launcher to fire the rocket. As the motor ignites, the exhaust is guided through two turbine nozzles which spin the mounting while the warhead is still attached. When the rocket motor reaches full thrust, it breaks away from the mounting while spinning. The spin received from the turbine stabilizes the projectile throughout its flight. The flight of the round is line-of-sight to 200 meters or, it may be fired on a ballistic arc out to 2000 meters. The most developed warhead at this time acts as a stand-off satchel charge since it contains 3 pounds of explosive and will blast a man sized hole through a concrete wall. Several other warheads are under development, including an armor piercing shaped charge.

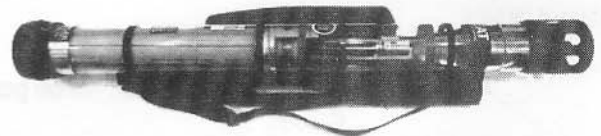

The ARMBRUST (German for Crossbow) is actually a recoilless shell launcher using the counter-mass principle to eliminate recoil. The manner in which the ARMBRUST uses counter-mass also results in it having no smoke or flash, limited noise, and a minimal danger area behind the weapon. When the pistol grip and butt plate are unfolded from the tube, the weapon is ready to fire. The propellant charge is in the center of the firing tube with a cup shaped piston facing away from the charge on either side of the propellant. When the charge is fired, the front piston drives the fin stabilized shell out the front of the launcher. At the same time, the rear piston drives a mass of plastic flakes, the equivalent weight of the shell, out of the rear of the weapon. When the pistons reach the ends of the tube, they are caught and held, and because the pistons prevent the gas from slipping past them, all of the smoke and much of the noise is prevented from escaping. The counter-mass is made up of thousands of plastic flakes which quickly break apart and are harmless. The backblast is so limited that the ARMBRUST can be fired with a solid wall as close as 1 meter behind the operator with no danger. The sound of firing is equal to the firing of a .22 pistol and is very difficult to locate. The shell contains a standard style of shaped charge which is effective against most armored targets.

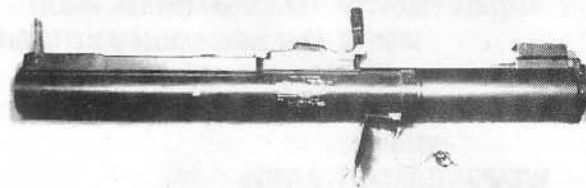

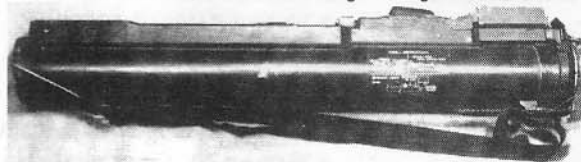

The 66mm Light Antitank Weapon (LAW) was developed as a disposable antitank weapon of simple construction that could be issued to any infantryman, giving him an antiarmor capacity. The M72A3 rocket uses the same M54 motor as the M74 and M96 rockets with six spring-loaded fins that extend as soon as the rocket leaves the tube. The fuel in the M54 motor burns within 7 to 18 milliseconds, well

before the rocket has left the launcher so that no exhaust will strike the operator. There is a danger area behind the launcher extending 15 meters behind the tube and 8 meters wide at its base. The LAW is prepared for firing by pulling a small ring pin at the rear of the weapon which releases the shoulder sling and both end caps. The collapsed launcher is extended until it locks in place. The hinged rear end cap acts as a buttplate to rest against the shoulder. The sights automatically pop up when the launcher is extended, with the rear sight being a simple peep sight and the front being a transparent plate with an aiming grid etched on it in black. The aiming grid accounts for range, windage, and speed of the target as well as having a stadia line for determining the range to a standard tank sized target (Soviet T-62). When the launcher is extended, the percussion firing mechanism is cocked and all that must be done is to release the safety before the weapon can be fired. Firing instructions are found etched on the side of each launcher in cartoon form. The M18A1 warhead uses a copper lined shaped charge for armor penetration. The light steel body of the warhead has little antipersonnel fragmentation effect but the detonation of the Octol explosive filler creates a sufficient blast front to damage anyone near the point of impact. The fiberglass and aluminum launcher tube is not intended to be reloaded and is discarded after firing.

NIGHT VISION & SIGHTING DEVICES

S

ince the earliest days of warfare, man has sought the ability to act at night. But all known methods of illuminating the battlefield had the drawback of granting this capability to the enemy as well. This stalemate continued into the late '40s, when a series of technical breakthroughs gave the individual soldier the power to "see in the dark."

The first night vision weapon sights were Active Infrared devices, such as the T3 sight used on the M3 Carbine in Korea. A note: The majority of existing electronic weapon sights and vision devices can be divided into two types: *active*, a unit with its own illumination source (usually infrared), and *passive*, which depends on available ambient light sources to be amplified or filtered. Due to certain drawbacks in the performance of active systems (weather, size of unit, detectability), the trend since the mid-'60s has been towards passive sighting systems; most counterterrorist forces will be so equipped.

Today, research and production of passive devices is concentrated in the US, Great Britain, and Germany, while the USSR and former East Bloc militaries study and refine the older active systems.

Approximately fifteen years ago, a new discovery was made in the area of active sighting systems. Advanced development allowed laser projection units to be produced small enough, and light enough to be used for projectile weapon guidance. The laser sight's greatest advantage is its intimidation factor, because a target can be made aware that a marksman is "dead on" to him. |

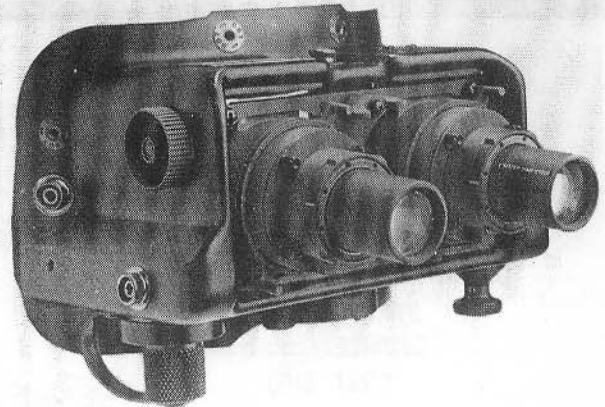

This is a second generation night vision sight which uses passive starlight means to allow a target to be seen at night. Used to create "near daylight" conditions for the user, the NVS-700 in effect multiplies available light thousands of times to allow the operator to see the target. Using available light is what gives this system a passive designation rather than active, which is used for the earlier infrared systems that had to illuminate the target. The system operates by available light being focused on the image intensifier tube. In the second generation system, the focused target light strikes a photosensitive screen where a small quantity of electrons are emitted from the opposite side of the plate. These emitted electrons are guided through minute glass fiber tubes, thousands of which are packed parallel to each other in what is called the microchannel plate (MCP). As the electrons travel down the channels, each time they collide with the wall of the channel, more electrons are released to also glide down the tube. It is this additional release of electrons that serves to "amplify" the available light. The emerging electrons from the MCP strike a second photoelectric screen which reproduces the visible light image that is represented by the electron stream. In the NVS-700, the image tube is 25mm in diameter, and shows a marked increase in strength and reliability over earlier first generation systems which are being removed from service. A major problem of first generation systems is "flaring" or "whiting out" when suddenly illuminated by normal light or even a muzzle flash from the weapon on which it is

mounted. Whiting out could take several minutes for the tube to recover from, or the tube could burn out completely. The second generation MCP systems have eliminated or greatly reduced this problem with white out recovery being only a few moments in the NVS-700 with its Automatic Brightness control. A daylight cover is available that allows the sight to be used and zeroed to the weapon in daylight. There are separate controls on the NVS-700 to allow the operator to adjust the focus to his eye as well as the brightness of either the tube or the reticle. The reticle appears as an illuminated red circle on the otherwise green image plate. The NVS-700 is relatively small and lightweight as well as being capable of mounting on any weapon system from rocket launchers to submachineguns. Though it cannot operate in total darkness, the NVS-700 allows a man sized target to be seen and engaged at 700 meters in moonlight and 450 meters in starlight. These ranges shorten accordingly by the amount of overcast in the sky, or cover that the target is under.

These goggles are intended to give the wearer the ability to operate normally in near total darkness. With the goggles properly adjusted and worn, they are completely hands free in operation, allowing the wearer to drive or fly a vehicle, or operate a weapon. Each lens is adjusted for the individual eye and contains a 2nd generation-plus image intensifier tube. The 18mm tube contains a microchannel

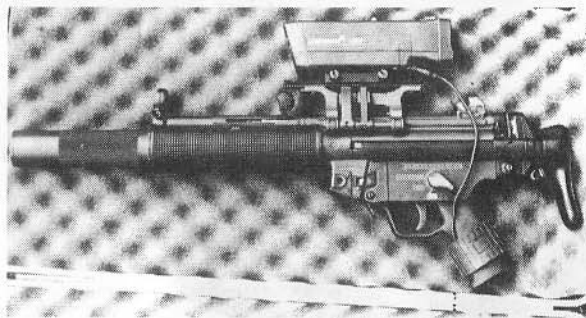
plate amplifier in wafer form to give a 20,000 gain over ambient light. For use when flying, a set of filters are available which block out instrument lights but allow vision through the windscreen. The drawback with this type of device is the limited peripheral vision along with the elimination of natural night vision. There is a special cutaway version of the M-909 goggles that are for use by pilots which greatly increase peripheral vision, but expose the glow of the eyepieces to outside observation. This glow is of no risk in an aircraft, but could result in an infantryman being observed at close range. For the ground user, the loss of peripheral vision is necessary to use the M-909 and they also make precise aiming of weapons difficult. The focus of the M-909 is easily adjustable down to a minimum of 30cm, allowing maps and control panels to be read. There is a small infrared light mounted between the lenses to illuminate maps for reading while not being visible to normal vision. A small switch must be held for the infrared light to be on preventing the light being left on and giving away a position.

The difficulty in aiming a hand held weapon while wearing night vision goggles has been largely eliminated with the development of this type of aiming device. The AIM-1 is a very small, solid-state laser that can be easily attached to most weapons; it projects an infrared beam that can only be seen by someone using a night vision device. Via a Gallium Aluminum Arsenide laser diode, the AIM-1 projects a spot on the target in the shape of a vertical line 2cm wide and 70cm tall at 100 meters. The adjustments on the laser allow the user to determine what point on the line will be the bullet's impact point, normally the top of the line is used. Being very small, the AIM-1 can be mounted on almost any weapon. The internal electronics are cast in plastic as a modular package making the AIM-1 virtually immune to most types of damage and easily repaired when damaged. There is both an on/off switch on the laser as well as a remote pressure switch that can fire the beam and be placed wherever on the weapon that the operator finds it most convenient. The AIM-1 also has a variable intensity switch, allowing the power of the laser to be increased for target identification. Even at maximum output and shortest battery life, the laser is of such a frequency and power that it is completely eye safe and does not require any special protection.

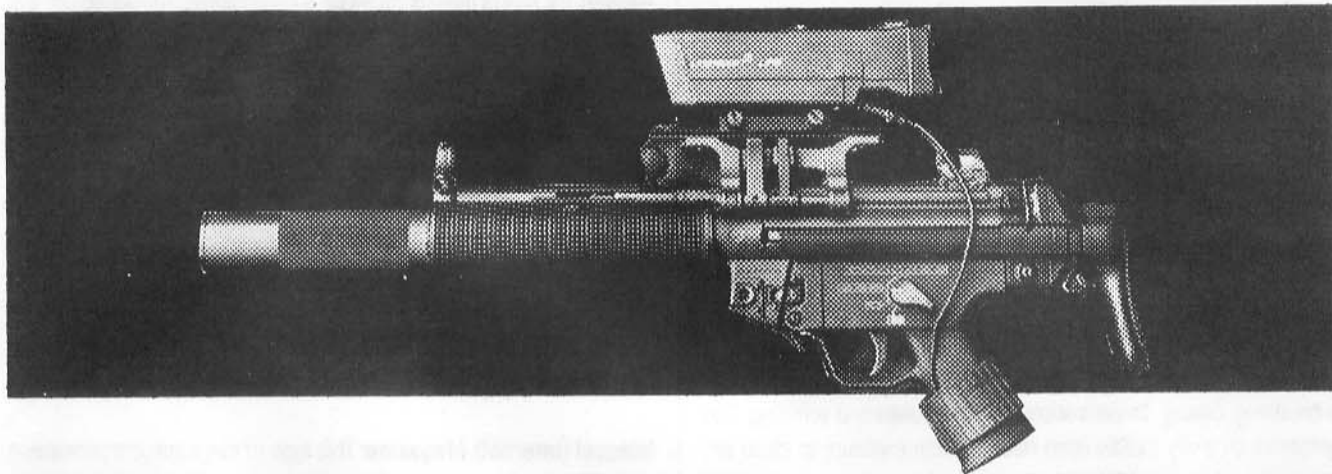

This is a visible light laser aiming system that projects a red dot on the target. The sight is adjustable so that the dot indicates the point of impact for the weapon. Using a Helium Neon gas laser, the LS 45 projects a relatively weak (1 milliwatt maximum), beam that cannot easily be seen, but creates a coruscating red dot that cannot be mistaken. If there is smoke, fog, or dust in the air, the beam is visible but the range is cut down considerably as the light reflects off particles in the air. There is a mounting bar on the base of the LS 45 that is adjustable to fit most standard telescopic sight mounts. The light weight and size of the LS 45 allows it to be mounted on pistols or almost any small arm. There is an open notch/post sight on top of the LS 45 (cast into the plastic body) to assist in rapid target acquisition. Properly adjusted, the red dot indicates the point of impact for most common combat ranges. The beam is straight and does not account for the ballistic arc of a specific round; this must be taken into account when the device is used at long ranges. There is a remote pressure switch that plugs into the LS 45 and activates the laser when pressure is applied. The back of the remote switch is covered in a velcro material that can be glued anywhere the operator desires on the weapon and still be easily removed. If the remote switch's plug is partially detached from the LS 45, it turns the device on until the plug is fully seated or removed. The LS 45 has a great intimidating effect on anyone who knows the device is trained on him, because the visible dot can be quite easily seen and is unmistakable as to its purpose.

APPENDIX "A": GLOSSARY



ASSESSMENT: This is the result of a firing test of the weapon, normally from a rest position unless otherwise stated. The measurement of the group size is from edge to edge of the bullets' holes, normally of a three to five shot group at a given range.

Example: 4 in @ 100 m indicates a group size of 4 inches (diameter of the circle which will enclose the group) at a range of 100 meters.

Where the Assessment of a weapon was not available from an actual firing test, the probable group size was calculated considering the type of weapon, sights, sight radius, and type of fire. Weapons where the assessment was calculated are indicated by the word "Assessment" being absent between the description of the weapon and the hit probability table.

Basic Load: This is a basic allowance of ammunition and magazines or other feed devices issued with a weapon. Basic Load is also a recommended amount of munition, such as hand grenades, to be carried.

Box Magazine: This is a removable box shaped, spring loaded ammunition feed device. Cartridges are held in the magazine by the feed lips that help guide them into the chamber of the weapon. The cartridges are pressed against the feed lips by the action of the spring loaded follower, a small platform on top of the magazine's spring. The box magazine is the most common feed device in semiautomatic and non belt-fed automatic weapons.

Burst Control: This is a mechanical limiter used on automatic weapons to set the number of rounds fired for each pull of the trigger. The number of rounds is set to prevent waste of ammunition on automatic fire.

Burst Radius: The radius of an area in which a munition has its effect. Within the radius, the munition has its primary effect, (i.e. fragmentation causes casualties, Smoke or Gas is at an effective concentration). Casualty causing munitions are considered to effect at least 50% of exposed personnel at the maximum distance of the radius with the percentage increasing closer to the function point of the weapon. The burst radius for smoke producing munitions is listed as the average size of the cloud under standard conditions.

Caliber:

(A) Caliber is the diameter of the inside of a rifle barrel stated in thousandths of an inch or in hundredths of a millimeter, (i.e. .308 Winchester, 7.62mm NATO).

(B) Caliber is commonly used to indicate the size and type of ammunition for which a particular weapon is chambered.

Chamber: The section of a firearm where the cartridge is seated to be fired.

Clip: A device used to hold a number of cartridges to facilitate loading a weapon. Also called a "stripper clip" or, in Great Britain, a "Charger." Sometimes used as a slang term for an ammunition magazine.

CN: The military abbreviation for one of the most commonly used tear gases, chloroacetophenone. Normally mixed with a smoke composition or dissolved in a solvent for use, CN causes immediate heavy production of tears, pain, and burning in the upper respiratory tract. In higher concentrations it also causes itching and burning of the skin. The effects of CN disappear within about 15 minutes of removal from exposure. CN is only slightly toxic and it would require at least a ten minute exposure to a very high concentration level to cause death. There have been no reported deaths from the use of CN.

Comp. B: Composition B is a powerful explosive used as a bursting charge in modern grenades and shells. The explosive is made of a mixture of 60% RDX, 39% TNT, with 1% of a wax desensitizer.

CS: This is the most powerful of the modern tear gases. CS is the military abbreviation for O-chlorobenzylmalononitrile. CS is normally mixed with a smoke producing compound for burning type munitions, with powdered talc, or as a 2% solution in kerosene for use as a liquid (Mace). CS causes extreme burning of the eyes with a copious flow of tears. The pain in the eyes increases with further exposure causing involuntary closing of the eyes. There is also increasing pain in the nose and throat with difficulty in breathing. Strong concentrations induce nausea and vomiting. The symptoms go away rapidly upon removal from exposure to clean air. Heavy concentrations of CS can be toxic though there have not been any reported deaths due to CS poisoning.

Double action: This is a type of firing action where a single pull of the trigger will both cock and fire the weapon. A double action weapon may also be fired single action that is, manually cocked and then fired. Some weapons are double action only and the action cannot be cocked manually.

Drum Magazine: This is a high capacity style magazine used primarily in automatic weapons. The drum style feeds rounds through a spiral built around the circumference of the drum. There is also a pan type drum magazine that lays flat across the top of the weapon's receiver. In the pan magazine, the cartridges are held flat across the radius of the magazine pointing to the center. Drum magazines are most often found on submachineguns with pans used more often on light machineguns.

EFFRNG: Effective range, the maximum range that an average qualified marksman can be expected to hit a standard target 50% of the time.

Feed Device: The feed device includes all the materials required to supply and feed ammunition to a weapon. The materials include all ammunition, belts, magazines, clips, ammunition boxes, or in some cases, loose rounds of ammunition.

Filler: The filler is the active agent in a grenade or shell. It can be, but is not limited to, explosives, chemical agents, smoke producers, flechettes, or inert materials.

Flechette: A small, fin stabilized dart used as a high velocity individual projectile or, in mass groups, as a "shotgun" like charge for a large bore weapon.

Full Automatic: In this type of fire the weapon uses the forces of firing (gas, recoil, blowback, etc.) to load, fire, extract, eject, and reload, continuously firing the weapon as long as there is ammunition and the trigger is pulled.

Gauge: The unit of measurement for shotgun bores. The gauge number is the number of pure lead balls of a given bore diameter that weigh one pound. Twelve 12 gauge lead balls would equal one pound.

HC: The military designation for a Hexachlorethane/Zinc dust mixture that burns to produce a harmless, dense grey-white smoke.

HE: The military abbreviation for High Explosive

HEAT: The military abbreviation for High Explosive Anti Tank. In the HEAT shell the power of the explosive is focused in a shaped charge to penetrate armor.

Integral (Internal) Magazine: This type of magazine is a permanent part of the weapon and cannot be easily removed. The magazine is often loaded through the use of a stripper clip.

Length: This is the overall length of a weapon. In the case of a folding stock weapon, the first number given is with the stock folded with the second being with the stock extended.

LMG: The military abbreviation for Light Machine Gun. A light machinegun often weighs between nine and fourteen kilograms and is fired from a bipod.

MAX RNG: Maximum range, the greatest distance a given projectile can fly, normally much greater than the effective range.

MG: The military abbreviation for Machine Gun.

MIN RNG: Minimum range, the shortest distance that a weapon will fully function. The distance traveled during the time it takes a projectile's fuse to Arm.

Munitions: All materials required to conduct offensive or defensive war including ammunition, weapons, transport, food, fuel, and clothing. The term is also used occasionally in place of Ordnance.

Muzzle Vel: Muzzle Velocity.

Ordnance: Military ammunition, explosives, combat vehicles, and weaponry.

Penthrite: Another term for the explosive PETN.

PETN: An abbreviation for Pentaerythritol tetranitrate, one of the most powerful explosives available. PETN has an R.E. of 1.66 compared to TNT.

Pyrotechnics: This is a type of ammunition including rockets, flares, and fireworks used for signaling, illuminating, or indicating targets.

Rate of Fire (RoF):

(SS) single shot: the number of aimed rounds that can be fired from a non-automatic weapon in one minute by an average qualified operator.

(A) Automatic: this is the recommended maximum practical rate of fire on full automatic. The practical rate includes time needed to change feed devices and to prevent overheating.

(Cyclic): The maximum rate at which an automatic weapon, given unlimited ammunition, could cycle (fire) in one minute. The cyclic rate is the maximum speed at which the weapons action can work.

Round: A complete piece of ammunition with all the parts needed to fire it. The projectile, a propellant, and igniter (primer) needed to fire a weapon once.

RDX: The military designation for the high explosive Cyclotrimethylenetrinitramine, also called cyclonite or hexogen. The term RDX is derived from the British Research Department formula X. A powerful explosive, RDX is used as the main ingredient for many plastic explosive compounds.

RPM: Rounds per minute.

SC: Star Cluster, a pyrotechnic that releases several, short burning length, stars as a signal.

Selective fire: This type of action allows the firer to choose between semiautomatic or automatic fire. In some modern designs, the selector may also have a burst-fire position in place of or in addition to full automatic fire.

Semiautomatic: Also referred to as autoloading. A semiautomatic weapon reloads itself automatically when fired but requires a pull of the trigger to fire each round.

Shaped Charge: In this type of explosive device, there is a hollow cavity in the explosive charge. When the charge is detonated, the cavity, often in the shape of a cone, focuses the blast of the explosive into a high speed jet of gases. The jet is moving at such speed that it pushes the steel of the target out of the way and can thereby penetrate

a much greater thickness of steel than a simple explosive charge of equal weight.

Silencer: A silencer suppresses the noise of firing a bullet by slowing down the escape of the propellant gases. Though with a specially designed weapon, a silencer can be very effective, it cannot control the noise of the weapon's action or the supersonic crack of the bullet if it has a velocity greater than 1,130 feet per second. Due to a silencer having to work on the escaping gases, it cannot be easily fitted to a revolver because of the gases escaping through the gap between the cylinder and barrel. The term silencer is a popular though incorrect term, the proper term for this type of device is a suppressor.

Single Action: This type of action requires the hammer to be manually cocked into the firing position for each shot fired.

SP: Star Parachute, this pyrotechnic device is also referred to as a "Star shell" when fired from a mortar or other artillery. The round ejects a magnesium (white) or colored flare suspended from a parachute. The Star parachute shell is used for either illumination or as a signal with a red star parachute being an international distress signal.

Suppressor: Also Sound Suppressor, the technically correct term for a silencer. Since a silencer does not silence a weapon but only suppresses the sound of firing, suppressor is considered the correct term. This type of device is also called a sound moderator in parts of Europe.

Tetryl: A military designation for the high explosive Trinitrophenylmethylnitramine also called tetralite or pyronite.

TH3: The military designation of a specific mixture of thermite and oxidizers, generally referred to as thermate. TH3 burns at about 2,200 degrees centigrade and produces white hot molten iron as a byproduct.

TNT: The common abbreviation for the high explosive Trinitrotoluene. With TNT being widely used and easily purified to a specific grade, it is used as an international standard by which other explosives are measured.

Tubular magazine: This type of magazine holds the rounds in a spring loaded tube either underneath the barrel or in the buttstock of a weapon. A limitation of the tubular magazine is that it must use either flat tipped or rimfire rounds. If a standard primed pointed bullet round is used in a tubular magazine, the recoil of firing could drive the primer of one round onto the point of a bullet behind it firing the round in the magazine.

WP: The military abbreviation for White Phosphorus. White phosphorus ignites spontaneously on contact with air, burning with a hot flame and giving off dense clouds of smoke. Primarily used as a smoke producer, WP rapidly produces a dense cloud of white smoke but due to the heat of burning, the smoke rapidly rises.

APPENDIX C:

Using Sword's Tables in Roleplaying Games

If you're planning to use **Edge of the Sword's** guns in your current RPG campaign, all you'll really need is the damage for the weapon (in your current system's statistics), and the accuracy modifiers (if any) that can be applied. These are listed in the table on page 212. The damage for each type of round (assumed to be a lead slug) is listed by round type and game system as well.

However, many people may find the extremely accurate tables for each Sword weapon very useful, and may even want to adapt their firearms combat to make use of these tables. The following adaptations allow game masters to convert the "handgun skills" of their current system into values which can use the Sword weapon accuracy tables.

One big advantage to this is that the common system allows you to have your Cyberpunk characters shoot it out with your Champions characters, while your Cthulhu character helps out the winning side...

Basic Sword System (Modified Percentile)

The Sword System breaks all marksmen into seven basic categories. Each category has a basic percentage chance of hitting at target under optimum conditions:

- 25% Familiar**
- 50% Marksman**
- 62% Sharpshooter**
- 75% Expert**
- 80% Sniper**
- 90% Competitive Shooter**
- 100% Olympic Class Shooter**

To use the Accuracy Tables, multiply the value of shooter by the percentage probability for that range and target. Example: You have a skill of 50 and are shooting for the body with a Styer GB. Range is 50 meters. On the table, percentage chance for a body shot at 50 meters

is 0.990. Multiplied by 50, this results in a 49.5% chance; rounded up this would be a 50% chance.

Percentile Based system (Call Of Cthulhu™, others)

One of the most common types of system around, percentile based systems are fairly easy to convert to use in Sword. Use the character's skill (for the type of weapon: Handgun, Rifle or Shotgun) as a base. For example, if John Smith has a 20% in Handgun, and is firing a **Walther PP** at a cultist's head at a range of 15 meters, is probability number would be 0.990. Multiplied by his 20% handgun skill, John has a 19.8 or 20% chance.

Sounds like you've gone the long way around to get the same number, right? At some ranges, this is true. However, let's have John fire the same Walther at the same target at a range of 125 meters. The probability drops to 0.567, which gives John only a 11% chance to hit the same target. When you want to factor in absolute ranges, types of target size, and individual weapons, the Sword system gives you a greater amount of exactitude.

Hero System™ (OCV based)

In the Hero System, gun skill is normally determined by adding the character's OCV (Dexterity x3) plus levels of skill. Modifiers for range, weapons and/or maneuvers can also be added or subtracted. The target's Defensive Combat Value (DCV) is subtracted from this total to get the value the attacker must roll equal to or under in order to hit.

With this many angles, conversion of Sword to Hero is a bit of a bother (but the same is true for RTG's Interlock, so bear with us). To fit Hero into Sword's combat tables, first multiply the character's base Dexterity by 3 to determine his Base Handgun Skill. For example, a character with a 10 DEX would have a base 20% chance, 5% more than the "Familiar" category in Sword. At the highest possible DEX, a character would have a 60% base chance to hit in Sword (a little less than the "Sharpshooter" category).

Note that this is just raw *natural* ability (one reason why Hero is a "superheroic" style game. You still need to add SKILLS into the mix. To do this, add an additional 3% for every level of actual Combat Skill the character has. Most Hero Skills range from 1 to 14, a spread of 3% to 42%. When stacked on top of the DEX number, this gives you a spread that tops out at 102 (or 60% DEX + 42% SKILL). Drop any value over 100% (the extra 2%) and you're even with the "Olympic class" shooter of Sword.

Sword works on the premise that people can't dodge bullets; hence, we've ignored the DCV factor entirely. Obviously, superheroes can dodge bullets. Therefore, in these cases, subtract the target's DEX times 3% from the attacker's total of DEX + SKILL. Additional modifiers for dodging, etc. are at a ratio of 3% for every DCV.

Interlock™ System (Cyberpunk 2020®, MEKTON II®)

Interlock skills are determined by adding a Weapon Skill, a Weapon

Modifier and a basic Reflex Statistic for a total value. This value is then compared to a To Hit Number based on the range of the target.

Here, the trick is to boil all these values down into a basic Gun Skill. You can toss out the Weapon modifier; it's factored into the Accuracy Table for each weapon. Simply add the Reflex, Weapon Skill and any targeting mods (for cyberwear, aiming, etc.). You should obtain a spread somewhere between 2 and 24. Multiply this value by 5 to obtain a Sword Basic Handgun Skill. Drop any value over 100% (the extra 2%) and you're even with the "Olympic class" shooter of Sword.

D20 Systems (AD&D™, others)

D20-based systems usually have no true firearms capacities. However, this can be worked around in two ways.

- Use the character's basic DEXTERITY. Multiply this value (normally a 1 to 20 value) by 5 to determine a basic Firearms skill. For example, with a Dexterity of 16, Thorvald Gunnerson would have an 80% Firearms Skill.

Now multiply this value by the Probability for the weapon, range and target. If Thorvald cuts loose with a Smith and Wesson 645 at 75 meters, aiming at an orc's head, he would have a 66% chance to hit. If the 1D20 system uses some type of weapon skills, you must determine the penalty for not having the skill, then subtract that from the Character's base DEXTERITY. If the Character chooses to Specialize, he would add the bonus received through this specialization to his Dexterity.

The big problem with this system is that it leaves your character with no way to improve, other than magically finding a ring that enhances Dexterity. There is another (better) way however.

Level can also be used to determine a handgunnery skill. Multiply the level by 5 to determine the basic Firearms Skill. Thus, As a 6th level character, Thorvald has a 30% Firearms Skill; at 8th level, he's at 40%; at 16th level he's up to 80.

1-10 skill systems (Twilight 2000™, etc.)

This system uses skill ratings from 1 to 10. The primary skills for using guns are Small Arms(Pistol) and Small Arms(Rifle). The base skill is doubled, halved or quartered, based on the range from the target, with the attacker rolling 1D10 under this skill number.

Most of the range factors of this system are factored directly into Sword's tables already. To make a skill conversion, you'll only need to convert the 1-10 skill ratings into a percentage; in this case, by multiplying the GDW system value by 10.

Mercenaries, Spies & Private Eyes™

In many ways, MSPE's system is not all that unlike the Sword tables; a base percentage is established based on range, target position and attacker position.

Add the character's DEX (3 to 18) and any points placed in the Firearms Skill (from 1 to 10) together. Multiply this value by 4 to determine the character's base weapon skill vis a vis Sword. Fit this value into the table and roll a percentage based on the range.

ABOUT THE DAMAGE TABLES

In most cases, damages are taken from the original statistics for each individual system. In cases where no actual game statistics existed, extrapolations were made, based on damages of similar weapons and information taken from the data within this compendium. To determine damage of a particular weapon, use the round type as a reference. Edge of the Sword projectile damage in the tables below is based on 4" of penetration (i.e., the average human arm).

The majority of the rounds listed in the tables are based on *standard ball* ammunition. Hollow point, semi-AP, KTW, Glaser safety and API rounds are not

listed here; this is because each type of system treats these types of rounds in different fashions; to determine the effects of each type, use the individual game system's information.

Special Note: **AP** rounds are designed to penetrate armor. This means they do not usually cause a great deal of explosive damage. As the Compendium is designed to cover Man to Man combat, note that explosive damages vis a vis AP rounds will be quite small. Assume an AP round striking a man-sized target will result in the target being automatically blown apart.

HOW THE DAMAGE WAS DONE

Damage ratings in Edge of the Sword are based on the tissue disruption caused by a projectile's impact and energy transfer. This is expressed as a two number formula: A/B; A= the total possible inches of penetration, B= the cubic inches of disruption per inch of penetration

In the case of multiple individual hits (i.e. automatic weapons) the damage is accounted for at the specific impact sites, but for overall body reaction, it is added together and applied as if it were a single hit striking the Torso in zone 2.

Wound shock effects are usually divided into unconsciousness and "knockdown," the body's nervous reflex reaction to the bullet wound. To determine shock effects, total the amount of damage received in a combat round and apply it to the following table:

Explosive weapons (grenades, rockets, etc.) are rated for damage in a different manner from projectiles. The ratings measure the "brisanance" or shattering (and overpressure) effects of the explosion's blast wave on the body. This is combined with the stunning effects of the explosion's overwhelming assault on sight and hearing. The formula is two numbers: C/D; C=blast points, D=stun points

example—HG 78 frag grenade 174 Blast, 100 Stun

Both stun and blast points drop off at a rate of 50points/1m from point of impact.

Stun points are the direct percentage chance of being stunned and helpless for 2 to 8 seconds. Blast points are compared to the victim's body points on the following tables F90 & F91

Find the victim's body points in the left column, read right along the row until you reach the number on the table that is \leq to the number of blast points inflicted, then read up to find the percentage chance of unconsciousness or death.

Fragmentation is expressed as a projectile disruption with an average damage quotient. All weapons produce the same fragmentation damage: 5/(2.28 MAX)

Incendiary weapons produce a fixed amount of damage per combat round.
